Islands fight back

BALEARIC residents may soon enjoy the same favourable tax regime that benefits citizens on the Canary Islands. The regional government launched a formal request to Madrid this week demanding substantial VAT cuts and higher subsides.

The comprehensive economic report details how the Balearic Islands lose a combined €8 billion per year due to the inherent disadvantages of being isolated from the mainland. Despite the broad variety of competing local interests and divergent political views, all parties and interest groups across the Balearics support the request.

Key demands include the reduction of VAT from 21 to 15 per cent, and the reduced rate from 10 to 5 per cent on the islands.

Tourist trap

Misleading holiday ads slammed

Advertising executives are under fire for portraying Mallorca as an empty paradise to foreign tourists. Extensive online advertising campaigns run by the government show deserted beaches, undisturbed waters, quiet streets and romantic plazas, with not a human in sight.

The Instagram account of the Balearic government shows 30 idyllic photos of Mallorca's most famous spots. On just two photos can any people be spotted. And they are presumably models or actors.

The campaign has been denounced as false advertising by media outlets across Europe and even by the Norwegian tourist office in Spain. Head of marketing Luca Bocci said that in Norway the government regularly listens to residents and includes their ideas in promotions of the Scandinavian gov-

But in Mallorca he was shocked to find that the authorities appear to have abandoned sustainability in favour of popularity. Eco-group Terraferida has also claimed that European magazines have expressed dismay that readers felt 'tricked' into visiting Mallorca.

The glossy images fly in the face of a woeful number of rubbish collection scandals, environmental degradation and rising pollution levels.

Unfortunately for tourism minister Biel Barcelo, the jig appears to be up. Surveys now show increased levels of dissatisfaction and disillusionment among visitors to the island who expected it to resemble what it says on the tin.

Savvy travellers can now find more accurate information on what a holiday on the island

really entails. The concern isn't that tourism numbers will fall. Instead the danger is that responsible travellers might give Mallorca a miss, increasing the proportion of partygoers who make headlines for all the wrong reasons.

The clock is ticking

THERE are just 645 days left until the UK officially leaves the European Union with or without a deal. Already it is 85 days since the triggering of Article 50 and one year since the referendum and there has been little or no definitive action from the British government.

The recent disastrous election result for the Conservatives, which saw them fall from a parliamentary majority to only the leading minority, has weakened the country's control over Brexit proceedings. This is despite assurances from Prime Minster Theresa May that the election would strengthen the UK's hand.

Within the Conservative Party alone there is a confused message about the UK's stance in negotiations. Mrs May has insisted that "no deal is better than a bad deal"; whilst the Chancellor Phillip Hammond recently

stated that no deal from the European Union would be "a very, very bad outcome."

With such a short time frame in which to untangle a 43-year relationship with the EU, the complications in the UK government question how prepared it is to handle the most difficult diplomatic negations in UK or EU history, in what will be a 27

versus one discussion.

In contrast, EU negotiators appear prepared and well organised. Europe's chief negotiator Michel Barnier, following his 2016 tour of member states has outlined key priorities which must be settled before moving on to trade talks. These include citizen's rights, the state of the Irish border and the contentious Brexit bill.

The complexity of such negotiations will not be complete until October 2017 at the earliest, but could run into early 2018. Barnier has stated that the talks will not progress until all 27 member states are satisfied with the outcomes

Despite assurances from David Davis that Barnier's plans were negotiable and could turn into the "row of the summer," the UK Brexit secretary immediately caved in to EU demands following the first round of talks on Monday June 19.

Time for talks are further limited as the European Union aims to conclude negotiations by October 2018, which leaves the UK with less than a vear to form trade arrangements before it is ejected with a deal in place or not.

With Westminster in chaos and time marching on, the door to the EU remains open only until the day it is slammed firmly shut.

ONLY a fifth of residents believe the Balearic government is doing a good job. A major political survey across the islands makes for extremely bad reading for the coalition government, which is still struggling to find its feet. The Gadeso Foundation poll found that 43 per cent of islanders consider president Armengol's administration to be performing 'poorly' since it took charge in 2015.

A CAMPAIGN combating sexual assaults during popular festivals has been launched across Mallorca. It will see information points established at key events with messages on how to behave and expert staff on hand. The announcement comes after a 36-year-old man was released on bail one month after allegedly assaulting a teenage girl at Soller's Moors and Christians festival.

SENIOR police officers have urged a radical rethink of alcohol policies at Balearic and international airports. Spain's seafaring traditions date back centuries, from the Conquest of the Americas started by Christopher Colombus in 1492 to having one of Europe's largest fishing fleets today, and close to shore mariners continue to be guided by a legendary lighthouse which is steeped in folklore.

Tower of strength

THE Torre de Hercules (Tower of Hercules) near the city of A Coruña in Galicia is the most ancient Roman lighthouse still in use today and widely considered to be the oldest in the

According to a myth mixing Celtic and Greco-Roman themes, it marks the resting place of the grotesque giant Geryon, who was slain by the hero Hercules after a three-day battle.

Hercules then buried the head of his foe alongside his weapons and ordered the lighthouse to be built on top, with an image of the structure atop a skull and crossbones appearing on A Coruña's coat of arms.

Another legend is recounted in Lebor Gabala Erenn, an 11th-century book, which tells how King Breogan, founding father of the Galician Celtic nation, built a tower so tall that his sons were able to spy a distant green land from the top, and that this vision lured them to sail to Ireland where they became ancestors of the Irish people.

The tower is known to have been in use by the second century, when it was built, or possibly rebuilt, under the emperor Trajan (53-117 AD) following a

One was entirely naked, the other wearing only a tiny thong. When they realised they were being filmed and oggled at by local men they quickly went red and tried to cover up.

The debacle took place on the Punta Ballena strip in Mallorca's party capital. It comes just a week after



Hitmen attack star witness

MORE sordid details have emerged from a key witness who claims two of Mallorca's top politicians engaged in drugfuelled orgies funded by nightlife kingpin Tolo Cursach.

The revelations come days after the prosecution's star witness survived what may have been an attempted assassination by two hitmen believed to have now fled the island.

The former madam of a Palma brothel made the astonishing claims against Popular Party chiefs Alvaro Gijon and Jose Maria Rodriquez last week. During her latest appearance in court she appeared covered in

bruises but defiantly continued her testimony.

She claims that the two political leaders, who have categorically denied the allegations, snorted vast quantities of cocaine, slept with prostitutes and never paid because they considered themselves above the law.

She spoke for eight hours straight, detailing the sexual proclivities of the two men and how she organised brothel parties for police officers and arranged regular bribes.

She said Rodriguez, the former president of the Popular Party, enjoyed having 'women brought to him from the street' and watching young boys have sex with prostitutes.

He had an apparent preference for Moet Champagne and spent hours on end at the club drinking and ogling people having sex on the floor.

The witness could not detail how many times the politicians visited but said they came regularly for years. On one occasion they wracked up a € 36,000 bill for just one day of personalised sexual escapades, paid for by nightclub boss Tolo Cursach.

Another incident saw a Brazilian prostitute hospitalised with a damaged spleen. She fled the country, fearful she would be punished for seeking medical care. When Rodriguez left the brothel, she said, "we had to change the mattresses."

Fighting back against hate

STRICT anti-hate laws are in place ahead of Mallorca's biggest Gay Pride parade next Wednesday. The vulnerability of the LGBTQ community has been a tense issue on the island following claims of transsexuals facing increased abuse.

Fines of up to €30,000 are now in place to punish people who discriminate, abuse or harass people on the basis of their sexual orientation. Incitement to hatred is also a punishable offence, one explored as a challenge to the extreme Catholic organisation HazteOir which recently tried to bring its 'anti-trans' bus to Palma.

According to LGBTQ defence group Ben Amics there have been three cases on Mallorca so far this year of young trans people being thrown out onto the streets after telling their parents they wanted to change sex.

Ben Amics are also hoping to reclaim Gay Pride parades for the queer community this year, arguing that a media dominated by heterosexuals has warped its image, focusing only on the most flamboyantly dressed characters rather than the underlying message.

June is Gay Pride month on Mallorca. Wednesday's parade will begin at 7.30pm from Es Baluard and finish at Placa de Cort where there will be live music and a huge party.



Survival saga explodes

THE adventures of a Mallorcan cave diver who was trapped underground for over 60 hours before being dramatically rescued are proving popular in Argentina. Xisco Gracia has been conducting interviews worldwide on his narrow escape and recently spoke to one of the South American country's top radio stars.

During the interview Gracia detailed his innermost thoughts

during his time trapped in a narrow space deep in the cave complex expecting to die. Fully expecting to pass out from a lack of oxygen his thoughts turned to unpaid bills and loose ends before he began hallucinating due to rising carbon dioxide levels.

The ordeal of Mallorca's most experienced speleologist has been compared to the plight of the Chilean miners when 33 men miraculously survived months underground. Gracia believes it is possible that he has his own guardian angel and is still shocked that he is alive and

Rescuers believe that Gracia survived because he didn't panic, relaxed his breathing and spared his oxygen supply far longer than the average Joe could possibly manage.

Charity slams ruthless investors

A RELIGIOUS charity has condemned ruthless property speculators for forcing many of Mallorca's residents into abject poverty. Caritas, a Catholic church institution, presented a dire warning for the island's future in the charity's end of year assessment

In it charity chief Margalida Riutort details how many working families see their rents more than double during summer, rising from a manageable €500 per month to an impossible € 1,000, almost a full average salary.

The group helped almost 800 people pay their rent last year but their assistance is a drop in the ocean compared to the wider property crisis facing some of Mallorca's and Spain's most vulnerable city dwellers.

Eviction rates have shot up across the country as investors buy up and renovate apartments in popular neighbourhoods, either as part of gentrification, or to punt them on short term to tourists. Foreigners are willing to fork out €1,000 a week for a four-bedroom apartment, and would still feel they are getting a ter-

Caritas worry that Mallorca is headed down a dangerous path whereby the rich will get richer at the expense of society's poorest members. The situation is particularly acute on Mallorca as there really isn't many other places for families to go once rents get too high. Unlike the mainland with its vast sprawling suburbs, tourism affects almost every corner of the is-

Royal black sheep

PROSECUTORS are appealing the sentence imposed on the in-law black sheep of Spain's royal family, Inaki Urdangarin. The husband of the princess Infanta Cristina, former Duchess of Palma, was recently sentenced to six years imprisonment over money laundering charges related to the aborted construction of the Palma Arena.

But state prosecutors are not happy with the decision from Mallorca's provincial court. They are appealing to the Supreme Court to demand that the former Olympic handball player serve 19 and a half years.

Urdangarin's current sentence comes from guilty verdicts on fraud, corruption and influence peddling charges. But police believe his influence in the notorious Noos case was more sinister, and that he may have masterminded the huge money laundering scam.

Almost €6 million of public money was diverted from state coffers to Urdangarin's 'charity fund,' the Noos Institute, which was supposed to build the new Palma Arena. Instead the funds were sent to overseas accounts in the UK and the Caribbean.

The scandal implicated his wife the Infanta Cristina, who was forced to testify in court. It ultimately led to the early retirement of her father King Juan Carlos and the removal of her title Duchess of Palma.



Twisted troll fined

A MAN who abused a dead police officer on Twitter and other social networks has been convicted and fined by a Palma court. The French national escaped jail on libel charges by reaching a settlement with the prosecution involving an apology and a \leqslant 720 fine.

Days after the tragic death of Local Police officer Biel Llull in September last year, the Frenchman wrote publicly that 'All cops are bastards' and that he was pleased to see that Llull had been killed, despite not even knowing the man.

He followed the insensitive comments with other abusive remarks before finally being arrested in October. Police had been tracing his remarks and raided his home following a tipoff under the aptly named Operation Respect.

He and another internet troll were charged with hate crimes and insulting moral integrity.

The death of Biel Llul shocked his local community in Palma. The much-loved policeman died when he was cycling alongside his eight-year-old son along the old Sineu road.

The 44-year-old was hit by a French tourist driving a rental car. She tested positive for alcohol at the scene and is currently awaiting prosecution. Fortunately Llull's son escaped unharmed.

A quiet week for the euro

Commentary by Moneycorp

EUR weekly currency update

From an economic point of view it was a quiet week for the euro. Industrial production in the euro zone was up by 1.4% on the year and 1.5%more people had jobs. April's trade surplus was smaller than forecast. On the political front the picture was mostly positive: The party of Emanuel Macron, France's new president, put in a good showing in the first round of voting for the legislature and the European Council approved the latest round of Greece's bailout finance.

Following its post-election trashing sterling did reasonably well, strengthening by two thirds of a cent on the week. It was not easy going but the Bank of England did its bit to help. The Monetary Policy Committee kept Bank Rate unchanged at 0.25% but three of the eight members voted for an increase. That came as a surprise to investors and they marked up the pound.

USD weekly currency update

The only two US ecostats that really mattered were retail sales and the consumer price index and neither of them looked very good from the dollar's point of view. Sales were down by a monthly -0.3% and inflation slowed from 2.2% to 1.9%. Still, neither of them deterred the Federal Reserve from delivering the promised quarter-percentagepoint interest rate increase.

The dollar went up by two thirds of a cent

against the euro and it was unchanged against the British pound, which did fairly well following the beating it took in the immediate aftermath of the general election. Slower UK wage growth and falling retail sales might have done for it had not three members of the Monetary Policy Committee voted for higher interest rates at Thursday's meeting. No immediate increase is likely but the tilt is now apparently in that direction.

CAD weekly currency update

The Loonie was the week's major currency leader by a goodly margin. It strengthened by one and a quarter US cents and went up by three cents against sterling. The employment data provided some help, with the addition of 55k new jobs in May. The Bank of Canada provided much more when deputy governor Carolyn Wilkins dropped heavy hints about higher interest rates.

Sterling did not get any help from the UK ecostats. Industrial production delivered another disappointment and retail sales fell in May. Inflation came in at 2.9% (CPI) and 3.7% (RPI) while the pace of wage increases slowed to 2.1%, squeezing disposable incomes still further. However, three members of the Monetary Policy Committee voted to increase interest rates. It does not mean an actual increase is imminent but investors saw their decision as a big positive for the pound.

AUD weekly currency update

The Aussie was the second best performer among the major currencies, behind the Canadian dollar. Against sterling it strengthened by one cent and it added half a US cent. It got two statistical legs up, the first coming when weak retail sales and slowing inflation in the States cast doubt on the upward course of US interest rates. The second was home-grown, in the form of unexpectedly strong jobs data that showed employment increasing by 42k in May.

Sterling was fortunate not to extend the losses it suffered in the immediate aftermath of the general election. UK industrial and manufacturing were disappointing, as were retail sales. Inflation accel-

erated to 2.9% (CPI) and 3.7% (RPI),

outpacing the 2.1% increase in wages and putting a further squeeze on household spending power. The pound was saved by the three members of the Monetary Policy Committee who unexpectedly voted for higher interest rates. No actual increase is imminent but there won't be any

NZD weekly currency update

On average the Kiwi, the pound and the US dollar were all roughly unchanged on the week against the other dozen most actively-traded currencies. The NZ dollar received some help from a point-and-a-half improvement in the Business NZ purchasing managers' index but none whatsoever from news that the economy expanded by 0.5% in the first quarter: Investors had been hoping to see growth of 0.7% so were disappointed.

Following its post-election beating the pound did fairly well despite some poor data that showed declines in UK industrial production and retail sales. Inflation was higher at 2.9% (CPI) and 3.7% (RPI) while wages were up by only 2.1%, reducing consumers' spending power. The Bank of England helped the pound out of its hole when three of the eight members of the Monetary Policy Committee voted unexpectedly to increase interest rates. No actual increase is imminent but the thought is there.

'We don't want your rubbish'

MORE details have emerged about the new Waste Act set to take force on Mallorca in 2018.

Balearic environment minister Vicenc Vidal revealed the precise regulations included in what he desrcibes as the most radical wastebeating bill in Europe.

Central to the law is the outright banning of plastic bags, cups and disposable packaging from shops and supermarkets. Biodegradable and reusable bags and materials will be promoted instead. Even meat and fish will have to be sold in nonplastic wraps or containers.

Plastic tableware and cutlery will also be banned. That means picnic-goers, hikers and bathers will have to find alternatives to the

ubiquitous cheap plastic plates, forks and knives used for decades. Children's birthday parties will be changed forever.

Only organic material will be used as fertiliser. Vidal has also pledged to recycle vastly more waste than at present. He has admitted that today 85 per cent of all waste either ends up in landfills or is incinerated, with only 15 per cent being recycled.

Significantly the law will also ban the import of rubbish for burial on the Balearic Islands. Unbelievably mainland companies have been getting away with paying landfills on Mallorca to dump their toxins and rubbish. Vidal says the Balearics will no longer

be the landfill of Europe. The law doesn't, however, say anything about importing rubbish to be burned on Mallorca.

Message in a bottle

A FASCINATING message from a nottoo-distant past was found on Mallorca. Archaeologists pottering around an old Palma masonry found a sealed glass bottle with a note and a coin in-

The letter was dated February 26 1952 and appears to be a diary entry style address to no-one in particular, just whatever future generation happened to find it. Archaeologist Llorence Villa believes it is a key document reflecting the times says it was likely written by a day-labourer working in the house.

In it the author complains about being given nothing to eat despite toiling physically all day, "we work only to starve" he concludes, ending with the message "Long live liberty and die slavery." The note is signed JBB and littered with poor spelling and punctuation in the semi-literate era.

The coin is revealed to be a gift "a reminder of our lives to the one who finds it." It is dated from 1945 and is a 10 centimos piece with the eagle and arrow of Franco's coat of arms.

The find was made in the old town district of Canamunt. Vila believes the man worked in a house managed by Franco loyalists but is still trying to identify who exactly lived there at the

HOLIDAY RENTALS: An extra 50,000 tourist beds have been established this year.

ISLAND activists Terraferida have lambasted the government for not placing a moratorium on holiday rental licences while pushing through new legislation. Instead the ecogroup say ministers are trying to legitimise as many properties as they can by processing tourist accommodation properties at a record pace.

Terraferida say an extra 50.000 tourist beds have been established on Mallorca this year, bringing the effective total to almost 400,000, practically half the island's population. More licences have been granted in the first five months of 2017 than in all of 2015.

The group, which has a history of exposing ecological crimes on the island, believe the government is effectively offering an amnesty to property owners who have illegally rented out properties for a tremendous profit.

By and large these are not plucky citizens earning extra income. Various companies and professional landlords own hundreds of properties across the island, earning millions from high short term rents.

Terraferida accuse tourism minister Biel Barcelo of encouraging people to apply for

tourist rental licences. They believe the government cynically want to be able to claim they reeled the rogue rental business in by ensuring people operated within a taxpaying legitimate framework

But, from an environmental perspective, it makes no difference if holiday rental accommodations are legal or not.

Terraferida's cause is the devastation unleashed on the island's natural resources by ever growing numbers of guests.

They want a temporary ban on the granting of tourist rental licences while the new legislation goes through parliament and an absolute ceiling on the total number of beds offered in hotels, apartments and villas.



POLICE in Valldemossa are chuffed with their brand new zero-emission electric patrol car. The Tramuntana mountain unit is the first on the Balearic Islands to own a set of electric wheels and they have been making good use of them.

Chief of police Sebastia Bonet said the car was terrific fun and that he regularly lets his staff mess around behind the wheel. Violent crime is hardly an issue in the sleepy village. apparently leaving officers with plenty of time on their hands.

Bonet savs he has even driven all the way to Palma and was delighted to find that the Nissan Leaf battery recharges during the entirely down-

The car was presented to Valldemossa as part of a new strategy from the top manufacturer to spread its well-regarded electric Leaf model to police forces across Europe. The Japanese company is at the forefront of the electric game and is well

aware of Mallorca's green credentials and philosophy.

Thomas Hausch, the firm's managing director in Germany, Austria and Switzerland visited Valldemossa last week to discuss the possibility of integrating more vehicles and charging points with Mayor Nadal Torres.

The force's Nissan Leaf can travel for 172 km on a fully charged battery and can easily reach 150kph. It takes just 30 minutes to recharge the battery from empty.

Toxic air threat

A DANGEROUS combination of extreme temperatures and pollution is increasing the toxicity of Mallorca's atmosphere according to environmental experts. Ecologists in Action note that ozone levels are rising, putting those with respiratory or cardiovascular issues at risk.

Air pollution is already a major problem on Mallorca. The question now is whether the traffic calming measures seen regularly in cities such as Madrid and Paris will have to be implemented on the island during heatwaves.

Unfortunately there appears to be little escape. Quiet mountainous villages are at even greater risk than Palma as air pollution from the city moves

Repeated studies have found that tropospheric ozone and nitrogen dioxide levels are frequently above maximum levels permitted under Spanish and European law. Upwards of 100,000 people are thought to be exposed to air pollution risks across the Balearic Is-

Night of fire!

A celebration defined by fireworks, jumping in the sea at midnight and leaping over flames, the San Juan bonfires festival is one of the main events on the Spanish cultural calendar. Taking place on June 23, the shortest night of the year, it is a magical celebration that ushers in the summer season.

What the blazes?

traced back to an ancient Pagan tradition, centred around the belief that the shortest night of the year meant the least amount of time that evil spirits were able to roam freely, which was a cause for cel-

In later years, this festival merged with the Catholic celebration of Saint John the Baptist giving the festival its name.

The memorable image of the bonfires on the beach started as a symbol of worship to the sun at the beginning of its most powerful months. It is also a way to ward off the evil spirits and witches who were thought by the Pagans to be at their most powerful as the sun started it's movement southwards.

The burning of effigies over the flames,

originally of Judas Iscariot who betrayed Jesus, has in recent times transformed into setting likenesses of local and national celebrities alight, and is said to bring them good luck.

Jumping over the open flames of the bonfire will bring luck and clean the soul for the year to follow.

San Juan is all about fresh starts and plunging into the sea at midnight is a key part of this. According to legend, washing your face three times in the water will allow you 12 months of happiness and luck, eternal beauty, and three wishes which will come true before the next year.

Wherever San Juan is celebrated, it's important to remember the ancient superstitions which surround this magical night.

Stay safe for San Juan

THE Spanish love affair with grand spectacles based around fire is reflected in most of the nation's summer

San Juan is perhaps the biggest of them all with many of the key attractions involving fire, fireworks and pyrotechnic marvels.

These displays are among the reasons that San Juan is such a popular event, but it is important to stay safe when on the beach.

Lighting bonfires is strictly prohibited in most areas. This rule is in place to protect environments which are

fragile and stop fires from being lit where they are likely to spread out of con-

The San Juan celebrations in 2011 earned notoriety after six people were killed across Spain.

Authorities also recorded many injuries most of which were burns.

The Spanish government's desire to protect their own culture resulted in them overturning an attempt by the European Union to improve fire safety in 2009 which could have contributed to avoiding instances like those which occurred in 2011.

The EU directives included banning under-12s from handling fireworks and requiring that everyone stands at least 15 metres from firework displays.

These measures were deemed to be an attack on Spain's cultural heritage and resulted in protests across Mediterranean regions.

However, over the last 15 years the number of injuries has been declining and on the whole safety during San Juan is improving, according to local authorities.

From Malaga to Mallorca

Most towns and villages will stage their own version of the San Juan celebrations, with local council websites tending to be best for information.

Alicante

ALICANTE is known for the sheer size of the San Juan festivities which take place there. Celebrations commenced last Tuesday with bonfires on the beach which are lit in the evening and continue until Saturday.

Every year since 1932, Alicante has elected a Bellea del Foc (Beauty of the Fire) to lead the celebrations. The job requires the chosen lady to host events and kick start festivities all over the city. This year's representative is Sofia Escoda, aged 22.

In the Plaza de los Luceros from today (Thursday) to Saturday an impressive pyrotechnic display, known as a mascleta, will take place at 2pm. Introduced by the Bellea Del Foc this event follows in the San Juan tradition of being very busy and extremely loud.

The international Folklore Parade takes place down the main street in Al-



icante on Friday June 23. This parade is a celebration of mostly Latin American cultures, with displays from Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Mexico, and Peru. For a few hours bands, floats, and dancers will move down the street in an intense display of colour and life.

The Brazilian dancing ladies are the last performers every year and are

known to be the highlight of the event.

At a minute past midnight on Saturday spectators gather on Postiguet beach for an enormous fireworks display followed by the traditional dive into the sea.

Nightly firework displays will then continue until Thursday June 29 as part of an international competition.

Malaga

SAN JUAN is a huge part of the local culture in Malaga, where locals tend to build many smaller fires on certain permitted beaches.

The most popular city beaches to visit are Misericordia and La Malagueta, where fireworks and bonfires will draw huge crowds.

Free access to an event organised by MegaStar FM Radio will start at 9.30pm on Malagueta beach. Musicians and DJs will perform throughout the night including Borja Rubio, Henry Mendez, Feder, DJ Valdi, Barei, Alex Guerro, K-Narias, and Calum.

At a minute to midnight tomorrow (Friday) the rag dolls, known as Juas,



shaped like different characters will be burned on the Misericordia beach, followed by the midnight plunge. Music and dancing will continue through to the early hours of Saturday

Mallorca

PALMA DE MALLORCA is the site of the main San Juan celebrations on the island. With events taking place in clubs and across the city it has earned a reputation as the party location for San Juan. DJs and music will fill venues until the early hours of the morning both tomorrow (Friday) and Saturday.

In Parc de la Mar, the main attractions will take place. These include street parties, firework displays, music, and of course devils running through the city with firecrackers trying to scare tourists and create a ghoulish atmosphere.

For a more peaceful celebration,



visitors can head to Son Severa. The celebration of their patron saint, John the Baptist, takes place in the weeks leading up to Saturday June 24 and

ends on this night. Visitors can expect to find agricultural markets, fairs with local games and competitions, and regional dance demonstrations.

Spanish tax evasion fears

ACCORDING to the Spanish General Council of Economists association (CGE), tax evasion is costing the economy more €25 billion a year.

The main problem appears to be the fact that many Spaniards believe that tax evasion in one form or another is fair game, especially when so many politicians and industrialists have been proven not only to be tax evaders but in many cases have got away with it. Whilst foreign-born footballers

The general conclusion is that Spanish tax law is confusing and

that people are not encouraged to ask for assistance because of bureaucracy and the high level of fines if a simple mistake is dis-

This means that many companies employ people 'off the books' saving social security payments and not deducting income tax and in numerous cases accepting payment in cash so that IVA is not charged.

There are also a number of manual workers, particularly in construction and domestic employment who work cash in hand.

Spain threatens loan to Greece

SPANISH Finance Minister Luis de Guindos speaking on behalf of Spain, Italy and Slovakia has threatened to veto a new €8.5 billion

A major row has broken out over a decision made several years ago to charge officials from those three countries who sat on a privatisation panel.

They are accused of alleged embezzlement and breach of duty but the accusation which is supported by a number of Greek lawyers has dragged on since 2015 without going to trial.

Now the three countries have lost patience with the Greek government and want the matter resolved if the loan is to proceed.



Taxi drivers and councils complain

European Parliament wants to control sharing economy

WHILST the concept of the 'sharing economy' seemed like a good idea at the time, the European Parliament feels that new legislation is needed.

The definition of a sharing economy is an economic model in which individuals are able to borrow or rent assets owned by someone else.

The two most obvious examples of this concept are best represented by companies like Airbnb and Uber and these two companies as well as others offering similar services have been the cause of much criticism as well as some praise in Spain.

The concept is social media based and sees individuals able to rent properties in major cities and towns or order 'mini cabs' for transportation.

In the case of private room hire, both local authorities and many residents are opposed to the concept as the authorities argue that the rentals avoid tax and flout rental regulations whilst locals see long term rental prices either increasing or the availability of property decreasing.

With private car hire, taxi drivers are up in arms as they are not only being undercut, but the value of a taxi licence which can be sold on, has been seen as a form of pension as at one time it was worth well in excess of €100,000 and is now dropping in value.

The European Parliament passed a non-binding resolution asking for measures across the Union in order to fight abuse and ensure that these platforms respect workers' and consumer's rights as well as ensuring that they also meet their tax obligations.

To some extent, a number of countries don't feel that there is a major problem with these companies, as they tend to generate new employment opportunities but others are concerned that they need to be regulated to ensure that taxes in particular are paid by both the companies finding the clients and those performing the service.

There is also a need to ensure that consumers are protected in the event that anything goes wrong as it is feared that adequate insurances may not be in place nor are there clear paths for complaints or

It is also felt in Brussels that there is a need to differentiate between individual providers of services and professionals as it appears that in Barcelona alone, a high proportion of the properties advertised for short term let are owned by just a few professionals who give the impression that they are private individuals.

City finance danger

IT is being suggested that the European Commission will require oversight of major euroclearing operations currently undertaken in London following Brexit.

To a government that has indicated that it wants to leave the European Union in order to gain more freedom, such a demand will most likely be anath-

The problem however is that if it can't agree to this demand then a number of firms currently operating in London are likely to have no option other than to move their euro dealing to an EU member state.

This will have an immediate impact on the importance of London as a major currency centre which will see a loss of jobs and the disappearance of hundreds of billions of euro deal transactions

At the end of the day, whilst not the friendliest of moves, the EU negotiators will argue that their role is to do what is best for the remaining 27 states, even if the UK loses out.

Swiss bank buys in Madrid

SWISS Bank UBS has spent €35.15 million to purchase two large warehouse properties in Madrid through its Asset Management division.

Using clients' funds to purchase the properties, it has already secured tenants on long term leases which will generate a regular income for its investment clients.

This is a very attractive market for the bank as the Spanish economy recovers and industry needs to expand but may not have funds available in order to purchase property, so leasing is a work-

At one time the Chinese were purchasing large numbers of large commercial properties, whilst the Russians were taking smaller commercial properties looking for quick returns.

Certainly USB gives the impression that it sees itself in Spain for some considerable time.

CRANES SIGNAL BETTER TIMES ON COAST Sky-high sign!

CRANES on Costa del Sol skylines are a clear indication that after years of hard times, things are steadily returning to more normality locally, especially in construction.

While things may generally be in a state of flux in the UK with the General Election and the lengthy Brexit negotiations still to take any definite direction, sky-high cranes on building sites in southern Spain are an indicator that the local building industry and property are in healthy recovery.

No-one politically or in property is saying it is back to the boom times in Spain of the early noughties (2000 -2006), but more than fledgling shoots are now apparent of a recovering healthier construction industry.

"In the last eight years cranes on the sky-line have been basically non existent," said one local developer who asked not to be named said.

"But just look around, now there are cranes everywhere, a sign that the con-

struction world is on the move, and while many properties remain with For Sale signs up, some of the new developments are proving really popular.

A Brit expat who moved to El Faro from Abu Dhabi in 2006 just before the property bubble burst said: "Little has developed around here in recent years, but now on our urbanisation three villas are being upgraded by new foreign

owners and in nearby La Cala there are six or seven cranes on the sky-line.

"It's not like Dubai where I once counted 39 cranes on the sky-line, but things are definitely moving positively, which is great to see.'

There is a certain irony that the 'Bad Bank' Sareb which is managed by a consortium of 'Good Banks' and the Spanish government has a huge stock of older property which was surrendered during the financial crisis, but people appear more interested in purchasing brand new property.

Spanish to be busy in Africa

AFTER 30 years of planning, the government of the Democratic Republic of Congo is slightly closer to building a colossal dam with Spanish help.

The intention has been to create a huge hydro-electric facility to increase the power supply to the capital Kinshasa and also to allow the Congolese to export electricity to South Africa.

There are currently two companies bidding for this construction work, ACS from Spain and the Three Gorges Corporation from China and in an unusual

move, the Congolese government has asked the two competing companies to work together in order to undertake and complete the job more quickly.

Although no decision has been made as yet by the two corporations, the concept may be attractive as it would cut the financial risk to each company as the country has a history of instability and as recently as last year, the World Bank withheld a \$73 million (€65 million) grant which was to be put towards the project.

The fall out starts for **Banco Popular directors**

ALTHOUGH the decision to sell the Banco Popular to Santander for €1 was prompted by the European Central Bank, repercussions are now being felt.

Even the Spanish government appears in hindsight to question the hurried decision and now wants to know the thinking behind the accountants Deloitte's review of the Bank which supposedly had € 1.3 billion of assets at the time of the sale.

This report was not immediately published, but has been criticised by Banco Popular shareholders and privately in part by the Bank of Spain according to reports.

Almost 10,000 private shareholders, represented by the OCU consumer body are suing

the directors of Banco Popular in respect of their losses as their shares are now worthless and other parties are accusing the board of false accounting and possible fraud.

Emilio Saracho the Spanish businessman and adviser to the hugely successful Inditex was appointed as President of Banco Popular in December 2016 and claims that in the runup to his appointment, he was not aware of the real financial state of the bank,

He admits that he may have made mistakes, especially at an April shareholder meeting where comments made led to the start of the fall of the bank's shares, but he will work with Santander for three months as the hand over continues.



Theresa May lost her majority through a combination of hubris, incompetence and personality. Having billed herself as a great tactician, she made serious errors of judgement.

Her stiff, formal language and reliance on pointless slogans endeared her to few voters. And while Corbyn inspired the young, she (with the 'dementia tax') terrified the old.

She apparently learnt nothing from last year's EU referendum, failing to put forward a coherent, unifying, energetic vision, relying instead on trying to frighten the electorate with dire warnings about voting for the opposition. Didn't work then, didn't work now.

The major problem facing the Conservatives is the mast they've pinned their sails to. Theresa May isn't Margaret Thatcher. Never was, never will be. Thatcher had a clear vision regarding what she wanted to accomplish and didn't hesitate to appoint ministers with the ability - and freedom - to implement that vision even if they were potential rivals.

And she wasn't opposed to taking risks: not just the Falklands war, but commitment to the EU single market and outspoken opposition to the euro.

Theresa May appears risk

TV 'debate' was with her husband, while as Home Secretary she could have redesigned a department unfit for purpose for decades. Border/immigration control, the police force, the deportation of foreign criminals and illegal immigrants and asylum process all in disarray. It was only with the police force she really got involved but concentrating more upon con-

frontation with the police federation rather than root and branch reform. She wasn't dubbed the 'submarine' for nothing.

Election after election it's the same, right? A bit like each new M&S 'fashion collection.' when we keep getting as-

wearable stuff this time." Or a bit like a desperate ex who keeps promising he's changed but he never does...







LEGALLY SPEAKING

Fines for not moving

AS part of a new series, we answer some common driving questions, kindly provided by members of the Guardia Civil based in Torrevieja, Costa Blanca, who set up the N332 website and Facebook page to help break down barriers.



NOT washed your car in a while? Well be careful, you could be fined for that! Many drivers are unaware they could be fined without even being on the road or moving their car, but these fines do exist and are real.

Even if the vehicle isn't moving, the lights, reflectors and number plates must be kept clear and if the vehicle is moving, the windows must be clear also. A fine of €80 can also be issued if officers decide your number plate is in a poor condition.

If you do need to wash your car, be careful where you do it, hand washing a vehicle in the street or carrying out repairs can also result in a penalty for the owner. Water, oil and other deposits can interfere with the road surface and can become a risk. There are also environmental concerns over the disposal of waste such as water or other fluids.

Car wash facilities have complex recycling and drainage systems so as to minimise waste of the precious commodity of water.

Remember you can also be fined for smoking at petrol stations which poses a serious safety risk, but also for leaving your engine running, your radio or or for using your mobile. Any of these activities can result in a fine of up to €200 and the loss of

You can also be fined for moving house and not informing the DGT of your new ad-

In the event of an accident or breakdown. you can be fined for not wearing a high visibility face or for not placing the warning triangles around the vehicle warning others of vour presence.

So remember, whilst speeding and driving whilst using a mobile phone are the two most common reasons to be fined, there are also ways you can be fined without even moving.

1. Is it legal for me to ride my bicycle while recording on my helmet camera?

Burning question



The Red Cross is carrying out support, training and awareness-raising activities, networking and coordinating with other social organisations and the authorities

Since the start of the year the Red Cross in Madrid has already contacted 1,135 people over 65, vulnerable to abuse, through a telephone campaign offering them safety and prevention advice. The next steps of the initiative will focus on sensitisation and information sessions given by



the Spanish Red Cross, National Police and Guardia Civil to address all content related to the issue of violence against the elderly.

The Red Cross said the implementation of the project has been possible thanks to the collaboration agreement established with the Secretary of State for Security.

Every year, the Spanish Red Cross serves more than 15,000 elderly people throughout the Madrid region, offering them help, support and advice against loneliness and healthy living.

Elderly abuse is not just a national issue. It is a social problem that affects the health and human rights of millions of older people around the world. According to the UN, the global population of people aged 60 and over will more than double, from 542 million in 1995 to around 1.2 billion in 2025. It is estimated that between 4 to 6 per cent of older people from all over the world have suffered some form of abuse and mistreat-

uni and 59 per cent for those who didn't.

Medical experts also say they believe that better educated people are more likely to choose healthier lifestyles and have better socio-economic factors.

What is melanoma?

Melanoma is usually, but not always, a cancer of the skin. It begins in melanocytes - the cells that produce the pigment melanin that colours the skin, hair and eyes. Melanocytes also form moles, where melanoma often develops.

How can you spot it and what are its symptoms?

The most common sign of melanoma is the appearance of a new mole or a change in an existing mole. This can occur anywhere on the body, but the most commonly affected areas are the back in men and the legs in women. Melanomas are uncommon in areas which are protected from sun exposure, such as the buttocks and the scalp.

In most cases, melanomas have an irregular shape and are more than one colour. The mole may also be larger than normal and can sometimes be itchy or bleed. Look out for a mole which changes progressively in shape, size and colour. See your GP if you notice any of these changes.

What causes melanoma?

Melanoma is caused by skin cells that begin to develop abnormally. Exposure to ultraviolet (UV) light from the sun is the cause of most melanomas. There is also evidence to suggest that some may result from sunbed exposure. The type of sun exposure that causes melanoma is sudden intense exposure. Such as when a person is sunbathing on holiday, which can lead to sunburn.

How can it be treated?

The main treatment for melanoma is surgery, although your treatment will depend on your circumstances

If melanoma isn't diagnosed until an advanced stage, treatment is mainly used to slow the spread of the cancer and reduce symptoms. This usually involves medicines that target specific genetic changes in the melanoma, such as BRAF inhibitors, or medicines that boost the body's immune responses to the melanoma.

Who are the most at risk of suffering from melanoma?

Certain things can increase your chances of developing melanoma, such as having lots of moles or freckles, pale skin, red or blonde hair and having a close family member who's had melanoma. More than a quarter of skin cancer cases are diagnosed in people under 50, which is earlier than most other types of cancer.

How can you prevent it?

Melanoma isn't always preventable, but you can reduce your chances of developing it by avoiding getting sunburned (even going pink in the sun). Always use adequate sun protection products while outdoors and dress sensibly while in the sun.







Couple's cave dream Luxury districts rise up

During the episode they are told that they have only until the end of July to complete the project. If it's not finished by the deadline a court order will prevent architects completing any more work.

Our Dream Hotel is a British TV series which focuses on the trials and tribulations of first time hoteliers setting out on their new adventure.

Prices rocket as salaries stall

HOUSE prices are rising at around five times the rate of salaries, prompting speculation as to how working families can possibly afford homes in metropoli-

The average Spaniard would today have to work for 6.8 years, saving every penny of their net salary, to buy an average-priced home. In 2007 when prices were at their peak it would have taken 8.8 years. Experts believe an optimum level is around 4.5 years.

Prices are now rising steadily at a rate of 5 per cent per year, while

salaries have largely stayed stagnant. Salaries actually fell by 0.8 per cent last year, though they are expected to rise in

The discrepancy between the two is more acute in large cities which have seen double digit percentage increases in home prices. On top of stricter risk analysis from mortgage lenders, the property price and salary divergence is making it much more difficult for families without a substantial income to buy a new home.

Gentrification also plays a key role.

In major cities across Spain there are large chunks of prime real estate in enviable locations which have remained derelict and abandoned for decades.

That phenomenon has largely disappeared in recent years with developers and investors snapping up old buildings and transforming them into modern properties. Spain still has a long way to go before it reaches the purchase power discrepancy seen in Hong Kong. Average home prices in the world's most unaffordable city are 18 times average annual salaries.

Strong spell for landlords

GENERATION rent might not be as influential in Spain as it is across the rest of Europe, but it is getting closer. New figures show that the rental business now accounts for more than a fifth of financial activity on Spain's wider residential property market.

Not since the early 1960s have such a large proportion of Spanish residents been renting rather than buying. The increase is a natural consequence of tighter mortgage restrictions and the emergence of a stronger, younger professional class who are still unable to climb the housing ladder.

The 20 per cent of properties which are rented is still some way off the Eurozone average of 30 per cent, but it still marks a substantial transformation for Spain, a country where even the poorest may have three homes to their name.

Rental prices are rising quickly too. The average cost per square metre rose 10.2 per cent nationally in the past year to €8.02 per month. Though rents have risen sharply in the past few years, this is still akin to 2011 levels. At their historical peak rents reached € 10.12 per square metre per

Regional differences are just as pronounced as for the buying market. Barcelona rents are almost double the national average at €15.14 per square metre, well above €11.96 in Madrid. Between them the two large metropolitan areas account for almost half of all of Spain's rental activity thanks to huge professional and student populations.

Low maintenance and hardy succulents

GRAEME TYRRELL

IF you love having a garden but have little free time to tend a conventional garden there is a solution.

A garden that, if you forget to water at times, will not have shrivelled up to a stick with dried leaves on it, is a great bonus for a busy per-

If the plants can spring back to life after neglect and produce spectacularly larger than average flowers for the size of the plants it can be

The plants themselves offer a range of colours that can be contrasted and blended to great effect in containers or the garden. Maybe it sounds too good to be true.

It is possible with the naturally occurring desert and arid zone succulents. These amazing succulent plants have the ability to store water

in their leaves, stems and/or roots. They also have an uncanny ability to draw moisture from morning dew and

Succulents differ, in many classifications, from cactus in that they do not have spines or prickles, which makes gardening with them easier.

A most popular succulent in Spain is the Jade Plant (Crassula ovata) which you will often find growing in containers to grand dimensions in historic courtyards all around Spain. Other traditional Spanish favourites include Kaffir Lily - Clivia Miniata and Housetree Leek -Aeonium Arboreum. These all make great outdoor containers plants or contrasting additions to the garden.

There is also a huge range of smaller or more compact succulents that be combined in containers to form a mini landscape. This includes the Paddle plant - Kalanchoe

Miniature succulents in pots.

thyrsiflora, various Sedum species (such as Stone Crop, Burros Tail, Propeller Plant), Sempervivum species (such as Cobweb and Red Houseleeks), Portulacaria species (such as Moss Ross,

Purslane), Delosperma (Ice Plants) and many more.

They are a great way to have an indoor or balcony garden display

That they store water means they have to be given water regularly to build up their reserves, but they will tolerate long periods without water if it is not too often as they need to become replen-

ished. It is best to water them

once the soil starts to dry out

so as not to overwater.

The soil mix they grow in should not be too nutrient rich so a well composted soil mixture for pots or lightly improved garden soil for outdoors is sufficient.

If your water quality is tending towards hard water or very alkaline you will need to repot the plant every year or so to reduce the mineral build up. A way to prevent this build up is to use rain water to water your succulents.

Succulents need good light but not always direct sunlight so they can do well indoors close to a window or other light source.

Most succulents are very easy to grow by division and cuttings usually take readily if given a moist environment until strong roots form.

There is a huge range of succulents available if you want to have an interesting addition to your garden that is low maintenance and hardy.

Gender chores

IT made sense for women to do all the cleaning in the past, but times have changed and more women go out to work these days. The problem is that they still have household chores to take care of and children to look after, so are men pulling their weight nowadays or are they still stuck in the 'men don't clean' attitude?

It has been reported that male approaches to household chores might have something to do with class and earning levels, with those on a lower income helping out and those earning more doing much less. Women still do most of the housework and men use the

excuse that they're useless at cleaning, but ironically believe in gender equality.

The movement towards closing the household chore gap is slow and this is the result of the deeply embedded belief that women are responsible for the domestic domain. Recent studies have shown that Scandinavian countries and the US lead the way in closing the gap in time spent on housework. Other countries vary, which could be linked with national policy and ideologies related to gender.

Before the first decade of the 21st century, women in Italy and Spain did more housework than women elsewhere and Italian and Spanish men did less than men in other countries. A more recent survey has revealed that just two out of every 10 men in Spain share household chores equally with their

In general, over the past 50 years, the time that women spend cleaning has decreased, while the time that a man spends cleaning has actually increased. Therefore, there is still hope that men and women will one day, be on an equal footing, but this will probably be witnessed by future generations, when everyone will have a household chore-

DOGS have always been credited with the power of sensing supernatural influences, as well as being able to see ghosts, spir-

its, faeries or deities which are invisible to human eyes.

In Wales only dogs could see the death-bringing hounds of Annwn; in ancient Greece the dogs were aware when Hecate was at a crossroads foretelling a death. Dogs are believed to be aware of the presence of ghosts, and their barking, whimpering or howling is said to be the first warning of supernatural occur-

In England, there are many instances of black dog ghosts which are said to haunt lanes. bridges, crossroads, footpaths and gates, particularly in Suffolk, Norfolk and the Isle of Man. Some black dogs are said to be unquiet ghosts of wicked souls, but others are friendly guides and protectors to travellers. The Barguest of northern England could also appear as a pig or a goat, but was most commonly a huge black dog with large eyes and feet which left no prints.

Tales of packs of ghostly hounds have also been recorded all over Britain, often said to be



heard howling as they pass by on stormy nights rather than actually seen. These hounds generally foretell death, (or at least disaster) if they are seen then the proper action is to drop face-down onto the ground to avoid spotting them.

When a dog howls in an otherwise silent night, it is said to be an omen of death or at least of misfortune. A howling dog outside the house of a sick person was once thought to be an omen that they would die, especially if the dog was driven away and returned to howl again. A dog which gives a single howl, or three howls, and then falls silent is said to be marking a death that has just occurred nearby.

Dogs were feared as carriers of rabies, sometimes a healthy dog could be killed if it had bitten someone, because of the belief that if the dog later developed rabies (even many years afterwards) the bitten person would also be afflicted. Remedies for the bite of a mad dog often included the patient being

forced to eat a part of the dog in question, such as its hairs or a piece of its cooked liver.

Dogs were also used to cure other illnesses. One old charm which was often used for children's illnesses, was to take some of the patient's hairs and feed them to a dog between slices of bread and butter. The ailment was believed to transfer to the animal, healing the pa-

In Scotland, a strange dog coming to the house is said to mean a new friendship; in England, to meet a spotted or black and white dog on your way to a business appointment is considered lucky. Additionally, three white dogs seen together are considered lucky in some areas; black dogs however are generally considered unlucky, especially if they cross a traveller's path or follow someone and refuse to be driven away. Fishermen traditionally regard dogs as unlucky and will not take one out in a boat, or mention the word 'dog' while at sea.
