Mystery campaign returns

THE controversial advertising campaign removed from a car park in Torre del Mar two weeks ago has returned in the form of banners flown behind three planes.

The advert, declaring Comeme toerhigo and featuring a picture of a naked woman with the word 'censored' across her buttocks. was flown over beaches in Malaga, Alicante and Cadiz.

Local newspapers reportedly received anonymous calls minutes before the stunt, giving them time to rush to the beach to see the banner.

They added the company responsible is registered in the Central American tax haven of Belize, and that a young man was employed to arrange the initial advertising space in the Torre del Mar car park, paying €80, although he denies being involved.

The campaign's website had been displaying a clock counting down to the time of the aerial campaign, with the message "people of Alicante, Cadiz and Malaga, see you on the beach."

Local Police have said the person responsible could be guilty of at least five crimes.

Politicians demand answers Sewage scandal

Representatives from the PSOE and Podemos opposition parties have demanded answers from Spain's Prime Minister, Mariano Rajoy, over Nerja's controversial sewage treatment plant.

The outrage comes after the company in charge of completing the project, Isolux-Cosan-Corviam, declared banckruptcy, leaving the plant 96 per cent complete with work on the main pumping station yet to begin.

As a result, the plant is unable to open while untreated sewage continues to pour into the sea. posing an ongoing risk to the marine environment.

Provincial delegates Miguel Angel Heredia and Guillermo Diaz have contacted Madrid criticising the latest delays to the works. and the former said: "The Rajoy government promised that this treatment plant would be fully operational in June 2016, and not only was it not, but now we are back to square one after the company's bankruptcy.'

Diaz said he wanted answers "once and for all," asking what the "plan B" is, claiming, "if the government does not have one

treated sewage into the sea via underwater pipes on Burriana and Torrecilla beaches. Waste is normally expelled 1,500 metres out to sea but the leaks have caused it

Families hit by huge water bill

ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-THREE families in Benaiarafe's La Esperanza urbanisation face their water supply being cut off after refusing to pay €38,000 in outstanding

The private estate, which is 60 years old, receives a monthly water bill of around €10,000, over four times higher than elsewhere in Velez-Malaga.

Residents say the extortionate rates are due to the poor condition of their water network, with up to 75 per cent of water lost to leaks and illegal connections.

They say water management firm Aqualia refuse to pay for the necessary repair work because the community is privately owned, leaving residents to foot the bill.

Workshop for domestic abuse victims

VELEZ-MALAGA Council has launched a programme to help women who have been the victims of domestic

The scheme, which will involve five psychologists from the town's Social Intervention and Family Treatment services, aims to allow women to regain control of their lives. They will receive between three and six counselling sessions at the Municipal Women's Information Centre (CMIM), depending on the severity of their condition.

Zoila Martin, councillor for Equality, said "at the CMIM we find a high number of women who require psychological intervention, who especially need immediate attention in a time of crisis, to alleviate as far as possible the effects of, and decrease the scale of, the damage."





The future is orange

FIVE companies are contributing to a €90,000 study by Malaga University into the cause of bright orange seawater appearing on the Costa Tropical. A probe has revealed that much of the material, which was initially believed to be a mix of red algae and fish eggs, is composed of minerals in suspen-

Fishy business

OFFICERS from the Guardia Civil have confiscated 10 fishing nets and a harpoon used for illegal fishing in Nerja. The raid, which took place on El Salon and Burriana beaches, was coordinated with the Fisheries Inspection Service of the Provincial Delegation of the Ministry of Agriculture and the Fisheries Department of the Junta de Andalucia.

Tragic end

THE body of Torre del Mar resident Manuel Jimenez Rosa has been found in a ditch near the El Ingenio shopping centre after he went missing last week. The alarm was raised after the 80-year-old failed to return home after going for a walk. He is believed to have suffered from a heart condition.

Fatal blast

A 75-YEAR-OLD British resident has died in Neria after a butane gas bottle exploded inside his mobile home. The victim suffered burns over 60 per cent of his body, particularly on his head and back, and died in hospital after a month-long battle.

On the last Sunday of July, hordes of revellers descend on the small village of San Asensio in La Rioja to shower each other with thousands of litres of pink wine in the annual Battle of the Clarete.

Smelling of rosé!

THE festival takes place on the Sunday closest to the Feast of Saint James (Dia de Santiago), the Patron Saint of Spain

Winemakers and co-ops donate up to 40,000 litres of clarete wine, a locally-produced pink tipple, for partygoers to fill their weapon of choice, whether it be water pistols, balloons, bottles or buckets.

The battle commences at 12 noon, when councillors lead the way to the Cerrillo Verballe district, referred to as the Bodegas quarter by villagers since it used to house some 300 private wine cellars.

Once the containers housing the wine are opened, the fun begins, the aim being to douse the enemy, who is anyone in the vicinity, with plonk.

As the wine-soaked madness descends, the compulsory white shirts become a sea of pink as the booze is poured, sprayed or hurled by any means possible.

The only respite is the occasional break for a glass of clarete and a sausage bun known locally as a preñao, while a tour of local tapas bars is customary in the wake of the two-hour fracas.

The grape divide

CLARETE is produced exclusively in the Rioja Alta region around San Asensio, Hormilla, Badaran, Azofra, Cardenas and Cordovin, and is a staple in bars of Rioja, Cantabria and the Basque Country.

Despite hundreds of years of history, it remains undefined

under Spanish wine rules, being officially classified as a rosé despite a number of key differ-

While rosés are vinified in the same way as white wines, with the skins removed and macerated in the juice before fermentation, the skins are left on the grapes for a short time during clarete production.

In addition, claretes are made

grapes, typically garnacha and viura, whereas rosé from Rioja contains only red varieties.

The result is a pale, orange-tinted wine that is best served between 8-10°C.

Party people

THE battle does not have a long history, having been first fought in 1977 when members of the Peña Clarete social

club came up with the idea during a festive meal.

What began as a joke between friends is now a full-blown cultural tradition, with increasing numbers of tourists visiting every year. Its older and more well-known relative is the Battle of the Wine held in nearby Haro every June, which dates back to the late 19th century.



Shorter lives for those in England

FOR many years, doctors have been talking about the growth in life expectancy but a new report suggests that this has ground to a halt in England.

For more than 100 years, there has been a steady increase but according to Sir Michael Marmot of University College a study in England suggests that this growth has now slowed to almost nothing.

As governments consistently worry about their ability to cope with paying pensions for the elderly it may well be that the financial situation won't be so bad, but research elsewhere suggests that the English result may be a localised situation.

In other parts of the world, life expectancy continues to increase and it appears unlikely that those living in England have simply exhausted the limits of human life.

Sir Michael suggests that there may be a very real comparison between the last five years of austerity which has seen a reduction of funding for both the NHS and social care and the number of people who have died.

Understandably the British government rejects any suggestion that its policies could have anything to do with this latest study, but for those of us who enjoy the Spanish way of life this may be another justification for living here.

Three jailed over drugs kidnap

THREE people have been jailed without bail for kidnapping two young men in Velez-

The victims, aged 23 and 29, were treated in hospital following their ordeal and police are now investigating whether they were tortured.

The men had been held hostage in a house in the Cabrillas area after a drugs dispute turned sour.

Concerned relatives called police after the pair went missing, and investigators quickly identified one of the kidnappers, a Moroccan man, before arresting two more suspects the next morning in the Velez-Malaga wholesale market. The latter pair reportedly resisted arrest, injuring several officers.

Agents from the National Police and Special Operational Security Group were then led to the house where the victims were being held and freed them.

NEW MEASURES FOR AUTONOMOUS WORKERS

Despite a complicated process, these are the provisions that will be present in the new normative to regulate the activity of autonomous workers in Spain.

The Flat Rate, which corresponds to 50 Euro as a temporary contribution to the Social Security. This measure, which was valid for six (6) months, was extended to one year.

On this agreement, it is important to outline the reduction of the time to qualify for this benefit; the required period now will be from five (5) to two (2) years without making contributions to the Special Tax Regime for Autonomous Workers (RETA, for its initials in Spanish), considering the exemption of three years if the autonomous worker is unsubscribed and had already enjoyed the flat rate when he/she was previously registered in the RETA.

The number of workers in the family unit was extended, which until now could only be one member under 45 years-of-age. Now the autonomous worker can hire parents, children, siblings, partners, grandparents, in-laws, grandchildren, sons-in-law and daughters-in-law.

Autonomous workers who are mothers will also be able to enjoy the benefit of the flat rate (50 euros) during the year

following their reincorporation. This is a bonus for women who work on their own and return to their jobs after becoming mothers, within a period that does not to exceed two years from the time they left their self-employment for this reason (only if they choose the minimum basis for their contribution).

In case an autonomous worker hires an employee, the latter will not lose "bonuses or aid prior to the payment of their Social Security contributions."

Still an agreement must be reached on the text of Ciudadanos about the reduction of the surcharges currently present "for the delay in the payment of contributions" and the exemption to the autonomous worker from the fixed fee for those who have an income that does not reach the annual interprofessional minimum wage (€ 9,907.80 per year in 2017).

Noise pollution on the hit list

RINCON DE LA VICTO-RIA'S Council has imposed a series of measures to control noise pollution.

The legislation proposes creating almost 100 'sensitive acoustic zones' where noise and thermal vibrations would be monitored and regulated.

The scheme, which has the support of hotels and businesses, aims to protect the health and rights of resi-


dents, as well as improving the town. The bill establishes a detailed classification of public spaces according to their use. The areas will then be divided into protected zones, acoustically saturated zones, quiet zones and zones of acoustic conflict.

Amplifiers, TVs, videos and radios will not be allowed on terraces or shop facades except with special authorisation. However public musical performances will not be subject to authorisation as long as they do not harm the public.

Under the new law food and drink will no longer be served after 2am and firecrackers and fireworks will be prohibited outside of authorised zones. Pet owners will also be required to take 'necessary measures' to prevent their animal causing disruption to the community. If they are unable to do so and complaints are received from other residents, a series of sanctions will be in place.

Fines for infringing on the new rules range from €1,000 for minor offences, to €30,000 for very serious infractions.

Terror victim remembered

MOTRIL'S Council has held a minute's silence to remember the 20th anniversary of the killing of Councillor Miguel Angel Blanco by ETA, as well as all victims of terrorism

Blanco was a Partido Popular councillor in Ermua, in the north of Spain, when he was kidnapped on July 10, 1997. The separatist terrorist organisation gave the Spanish government 48 hours to transfer all ETA prisoners to jails in the Basque Country, sparking demonstrations all over the Spain.

The government did not give in, however, and ETA shot Blanco in the back of the

head 50 minutes after the deadline passed before leaving him on the streets of San Sebastian. He died in hospital shortly after.

Motril joined thousands of cities throughout Spain commemorating the date, with Abel Caballero, President of the Spanish Federation of Municipalities and Provinces (FEMP), explaining the event remembered, "20 years of a terror, but also 20 years of exemplary and democratic citizen support and gives us the chance to say resoundingly and unanimously 'we have come so far.' This civic response was responsible for first isolating and then absolutely defeating ETA."

He added the event was, "a heartfelt and sincere commemoration of Miguel Angel, of all victims and their families and friends, but also, at the same time, a recognition of and homage to Spanish society."

Meanwhile Spain's largest trade union, Comisiones Obreras (CC OO), has pointed out workplace deaths have doubled this year in Malaga, from seven last year to 14 for the same period so far in 2017. They staged a protest against the increase in Malaga on Monday to highlight the issue.



Wilbur Ross, head of the US Department of Commerce, has pledged a "full and fair assessment" of the situation. Any unfair subsidies will be immediately removed, he said, while reiterating Washington's commitment to "free, fair and reciprocal trade with Spain."

Donald Trump campaigned on a pro-America and protectionist platform. The businessman turned president has made no bones of his intention to slap tough import duties on foreign products to protect domestic interests.

Take it or leave it for shareholders

SHAREHOLDERS in now-defunct Banco Popular have been offered compensation by Santander, which bought its troubled former rival for €1 recently. The compensation plan will cost Santander €680 million but will come in the form of 'loyalty bonds.'

Shareholders who are entitled to compensation must waive any rights to sue Santander for any reason related to the sale. Many large corporations with hundreds of millions in Banco Popular shares will receive no compensation at all.

Spaniards grow healthier, yet lazier

THE stomach of the Spanish consumer is awash with contradictions as health concerns grapple with budgets to transform supermarket shopping trends.

Meat consumption has fallen considerably according to a report from the Nielsen consultancy, which collects data from supermarkets, butchers, delicatessens, and local minimarkets.

Purchases of fresh meat have dropped 1.2 per cent in 12 months, although rising prices mean that profits haven't taken a hit. Consumer surveys show that developing attitudes spell trouble for fresh meat. On the one hand people are now growing more health conscious and embracing the emergent vegetarian scene, or at least cutting down on meat.

Meanwhile a different kind of consumer prefers the convenience of pre-cooked meals and packs of cooked chicken, pork and ham.

So while fresh meat sales have fallen, jamon (jam) is making a comeback, with sales rising 4 per cent last year.

Smart banking

A MOBILE banking survey found that BBVA has the best mobile phone app in the world. The app won plaudits for its different transaction options and ease of use. It beat competition from 53 banks across 18 countries.

Motor demand

SPAIN and Italy are leading the way in new car sales as the growth in registrations slowed across the EU. Demand in Spain is far higher than in the UK, which saw sales dip in June.

Digital spies

NEW technology from Roambee will transform the Spanish logistics sector. Digital devices will be placed on truck, train, boat and plane cargo to monitor temperature, routes and location to help minimise loss and breakage.

Paltry rise for pensions in Spain

PUBLIC pensions in Spain are expected to rise by a paltry 0.25 per cent per annum until 2022. Given the average pension paid by social security stands at €920, the figure would result in an average annual pension increase of less than €3.

The estimate is provided by the Independent Fiscal

Responsibility Authority. Its analysis suggests that an increase higher than 0.25 per cent would throw the social security system into an unmanageable deficit until 2022, when some debts are expected to be cleared.

Inflation forecasts indicate most pensioners will lose purchasing power in the next five years.

BARISTAS BEWARE BEAN-LOVER FIGHTBACK Spanish geniuses invent internet coffee

TWO Spanish companies have created the first espresso machine connected to the internet. The 'coffee machine of the future' isn't only designed to make a better brew, but to also monitor usage and prevent fraud by unscrupulous café owners.

The machine is the brainchild of Iberital and IoTsens. Iberital is a Catalan company which have been making coffee machines for 40 years and now sells them in more than 100 countries worldwide.

They were recently granted EU funds to create the 'coffee machine of the future' and decided that internet connectivity would be fundamental to such an invention. For this they enlisted Spanish tech specialists IoTsens.

IoT refers to the Internet of Things, a quickly growing field in the technology world responsible for all manner of futuristic contraptions, including fridges connected to the internet which can be controlled remotely by mobile phones, and 3D

The new espresso machine sends real time information about its location and consumption to the distributors. In Spain distributors often lease out machines to hotels and bars, expecting to be the exclusive supplier of coffee beans in return.

But all too often clients will buy cheaper coffee elsewhere and neglect machine maintenance. The smart coffee machines will combat this problem by broadcasting detailed information on exactly what beans are being used, when the machines are being cleaned, switched on and off, and maintained.

It will make it almost impossible for baristas to cheat on

suppliers and consumers by providing low-quality coffee beans with excess water, served from an unclean ma-

The new machines also cut energy expenditure by around 50 per cent and use healthier materials which greatly reduce the amount of heavy metals found in a mug

Royal **Ferraris** sold

A PAIR of Ferraris donated by former King Juan Carlos to the Hacienda were auctioned off for a total of €443.842. Tax officials have been trying to offload the luxury cars since 2015, when they aborted efforts to raise a combined €695,000.

The expensive wheels were donated to the King by the United Arab Emirates in 2011. Both are Ferrari FF F151s and were bought last week by two separate private bidders. Neither have more than 800 kilometres on the clock, making them as good as new.

The former king originally donated one of the cars to the Museum of the Royal Guard, but faced pressure to raise public funds from the

RETAIL WORKERS ON BREADLINE AS SALARIES FALL

Spain's 'third world' wages slammed

SPAIN'S employment minister has urged companies across the country to increase worker's salaries. Fatima Bañez warned that Spain risks having "third world" salaries for another five to 10 years unless pressure is piled on the business community.

Spain sits atop the European league table for stagnant wages. Labour costs in the first four months of 2017 rose by an average of 1.7 per cent across the EU's 28 member states.

In Germany they shot up by 2.5 per cent, in the UK 1.5 per cent. In crisis hit Portugal they rose by 2.6 per cent. Spain posted the lowest figure of the lot at just 0.1

Though unemployment figures have gone down as the wider economy recovers, there are still 3.36 million jobless in Spain, meaning companies have little incentive to raise wages.

A report from Spanish employment observation group ANAC

found that the salary of the average Spanish worker has actually declined this year, despite overall labour costs rising slightly.

There are now more Spaniards earning €15-20,000 per annum, while less are in the €20-25,000 wage bracket. After taxes and social security payment, the average worker in 2017 clears a little over €800 per month.

Juan Rosell, President of the Spanish Confederation of Business Organisations, has acknowledged that "it's very difficult to get to the end of the month with a salary of €800." He voiced his support for Bañez's call for higher wages.

In the retail industry workers earn an average of just €13,662 gross. Primark recently published a list of all its salaries, showing that not one of its shop workers in Spain earned above €20,000.

Secret aspirin empire

SURGING sales in China have made a northern Spanish factory the world's biggest supplier of aspirin. The German-owned Bayer plant in Asturias celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2017 and is enjoying its most profitable year in history.

The factory was briefly under Spanish control after Germany's Second World War defeat, but has since been bought back. Today it produces 5,500 tons of the acetylsalicyclic acid, the active ingredient in Aspirin Cardio.

The drug is rapidly gaining in popularity across Asia as traditional herbal heart disease and painkiller cures are replaced by western pharmaceuticals. More than 200 million aspirin tablets are consumed daily across the world.

Spain commits to serious UK investment

SPANISH companies pledged to build trains and trams in Britain and commit millions of pounds to their UK interests during King Felipe's three-day state visit to the country.

Prime minister Theresa May was delighted with the flurry of announcements which came after high-level discussions on bilateral trade between the countries, which exceeded €30 billion last year.

"The sheer scale of Spanish investment in Britain demonstrates Spain's continued confidence in the strength of the UK economy, and shows that we can and will maintain the closest possible relationship," the Conservative leader said.

Investment highlights include Spanish manufacturer CAF ploughing €40 million into a Welsh train and tram building factory, and Spanish airport manager AENA pledging €100 million to expand Luton airport.

Despite all the royal pomp of the state visit, King Felipe was keen to get down to Brexit business, directly addressing the bewildered elephant in the room during a speech at Mansion House.

The referendum had "generated uncertainty and doubts for our companies, businesses and especially small and medium-sized enterprises," the King warned, calling for a resolution that minimises trade ob-

An estimated 140,000 jobs in the UK depend directly on Spanish investments. There are 261 Spanish companies with British bases across key sectors. The UK is Spain's third largest export market but the number one for foreign investment by Spanish companies.

Not all Spanish leaders are concerned about Brexit. Gerard Lopez, president of huge Spanish IT company Plexus, was optimistic that Britain could become a more attractive business destination.

"The economy, its geographic location and a currency that is respected could make the UK the hub that has the advantages of a certain independence with all the advantages of being an accepted trade partner to the EU and the US," he said, in comments echoed by the head of Telefonica, Jose Maria Alvarez-Pallete.

Pupils get money lessons



LEGALLY SPEAKING

Smoking ban welcomed

AS part of a new series, we answer some common driving questions, kindly provided by members of the Guardia Civil based in Torrevieja, Costa Blanca, who set up the N332 website and Facebook page to help break down barriers.



SMOKING in cars is not currently banned in Spain, unlike in England, but it would appear that more than half of the population would welcome such a ban.

The figures came following a survey conducted by the Spanish Society of Family and Community Medicine, which was made public during this year's World No Tobacco Day campaign, which is a global event promoted by the World Health Organisation.

The survey showed that 51.6 per cent of Spaniards would be in favour of a ban, at least in the presence of minors, following in the footsteps of England, France, Australia and South Africa. A further 38 per cent believe that the ban on tobacco should be advanced even

Whilst there are obvious health risks associated to smoking in a vehicle, smoking whilst driving is also a dangerous distraction. It is estimated that lighting a cigarette means you

take your eyes off the road for four seconds. Whilst driving on a motorway at 120km per hour, this would mean you were distracted from the road for at least 132m.

Lighting up can also cause the driver to drop a spark which could potentially fall on the driver or seats causing alarm and a reaction that could turn your attention away from driving and subsequently lead to a more serious accident.

In addition, it is estimated that 3 per cent of forest fires, some 21,000, in the last 10 years were started as a result of cigarette butts being dumped or thrown from a vehicle's window whilst driving. Despite increased campaigns on the dangers of forest fires, particularly at this time of year, discarded cigarettes still remain one of the biggest concerns to forests, fields and wildlife. Those found guilty of throwing objects from cars in motion, including cigarette butts, face fines of €200 and could lose four points on their driving licence.

SPAIN'S Attorney General Jose Manuel Maza shilly-shallied over choosing a successor to Anti-corruption Public Prosecutor, Manuel Moix.

Moix was obliged to resign after he was linked to some dodgy decisions and found with a share in a Panama-registered company.

The post has now gone to Alejando Luzon, an anti-corruption fiscal since the department was created in 1995. and originally tipped to get the job that went to Moix last February.

Luzon was not Maza's first choice, insiders said. For reasons best known to himself he preferred Maria Angeles Montes, a fiscal who had not headed a team since 2011 and lacked experience in finance and

Live fast, die young... the curse of The 27 Club

Trudy Stewart May contain traces of nuts.

THIS Sunday, it will be six years since Amy Winehouse died, aged iust 27 years old.

The English soul singer, bestknown (ironically) for her song Rehab, died from alcohol poisoning. having been found to have a blood alcohol level over five times the legal drink-driving limit.

Three years before her death, Amy had expressed a fear of dying at that age like so many other influential musicians had before her.

Between 1969 and 1971, Brian Jones (Rolling Stones), Jimi Hendrix (Jimi Hendrix Experience), Jim Morrison (Doors) and Janis Joplin, died aged 27. Although their causes of death were different, they were all known to be users of alcohol and drugs.

It wasn't until Kurt Cobain, lead singer and guitarist of Nirvana, died over two decades later, that the idea of the '27 Club' was born.

Thanks to the internet, there are

various theories why so many celebrities die at this particular age. There are some strange coincidences but no real evidence: for instance, Kurt Cobain, Jim Morrison, Janis Joplin and Jimi Hendrix were all found to have white lighters in their possession when they died.

One, more outlandish, theory is the reason for their untimely demise is due to a contract with the devil for fame and fortune which. expires at this age.

There's a legend that blues musician, Robert Johnson, had no talent for the guitar but longed for fame. A voice told him to go to a crossroads by a plantation at midnight. where he was met by the devil in a

The devil tuned his guitar and offered it to him in return for his soul. He agreed and became a blues sensation overnight but in 1938, aged (you've guessed it!) 27, he was poisoned with strychnine and

In 2011, the British Medical Journal (BMJ) published a study into why it's such a deadly age for celebrities.

Their conclusion was that 'The

27 Club is unlikely to be a real phenomenon. Fame may increase the risk of death among musicians, but this risk is not limited to age

There is an increased risk among musicians in their 20's and 30's, but this seems to be due more to the associated lifestyle of excessive drug-taking and alcohol abuse.

The good news is, that lifestyle is dying out and today's musicians are treating the music industry more like a business than an escape from a troubled

While I can't definitively rule out the devil's part in it, the 27 Club will hopefully become just another oddity, unexplained and not claiming any

Manic Street mystery

ANOTHER victim of the rock 'n' roll lifestyle and perhaps the 27 Club, is Richey Edwards from The Manic Street Preachers.

On February 1, 1995 he was due to fly to the US for a promotional tour with band frontman, James Dean Bradfield. Instead it seems, he drove to his Cardiff flat (leaving behind his passport and credit card) then on to a service station near the Severn Bridge, before vanishing.

It is believed he jumped from the bridge but he has never been found. There have since been reported sightings in Goa, India and the Canary Islands but these have never been confirmed. In November 2008, he became officially 'presumed

SUMMER is a time for travel, fun and exploration, but for some it signals a time of sickness. Around 60 per cent of travellers will suffer from an acute intestinal infection that causes severe diarrhoea commonly known as 'traveller's diarrhoea.'

In four out of 10 cases, it even forces the sufferer to change the course of their journey and may require bed rest for several days. It can also cause vomiting, abdominal pain and fever.

In 90 per cent

of cases, traveller's diarrhoea has its origin in intestinal infections produced by bacteria from contaminated food and beverages.

Several studies indicate that the destination of the trip is the major risk factor associated with this infection, which usually appears during the first week of stay in a foreign country. Intestinal problems are one of the most frequent reasons for medical visits during travel with a higher number of cases of traveller's diarrhoea occurring in the Middle East, South and Southeast Asia, South and Central America, and the

are North and Central Europe, the United States, Canada, Japan and Australia.

To help combat traveller's diarrhoea, Spanish pharmaceuticals company Ferrer, has developed Xilaplus, a health product formulated from components of natural origin including an active ingredient extracted from tamarind which forms a protective barrier in the intestine, rapidly reducing symptoms and nausea.

But you can also try and avoid contracting traveller's diarrhoea by avoiding eating from street vendors, don't eat raw or undercooked meat, fish and shellfish, only drink bottled water and use it to clean your teeth and avoid ice in drinks. Beware of sliced fruit and vegetables that may have been washed in contaminated water so try and opt for fruit you can peel such as bananas and oranges.

Toxic cocktail awaits retirement

WE are all living longer, but the quality of that life is not as good, as unhealthy lifestyles now mean today's youth can expect to spend their retirement in poor health.

Obesity, lack of exercise and smoking are cited as the main problems leading to what experts are calling a 'toxic cocktail' of back pain, diabetes and dementia.

With women expected to live to an average age of 83 and men until 79, people can expect to spend those last two decades suffering from poor health.

Public Health England said a report found only 57 per cent of English adults carry out the recommended 150 minutes of weekly exercise and 29 per cent do less than half an hour. Two in every three adults are now also overweight or obese.

A report has also shown that retirement, rather than being a fun and frivolous time, can actually be just as stressful as working, particularly for those leaving lower-paid positions as they struggle with the pressure of making ends meet on their pension.









Will you suffer hearing problems this summer?

OVER 70 per cent of Spaniards will suffer from barotrauma this summer.

Barotraumna is a common complaint of the ear and is caused by increased air or water pressure, such as during flights and scuba diving. This pressure change causes discomfort and leads to perforations of the eardrum which can often heal on its own, but this can take weeks and hearing may be affected during this time.

In Spain, around 40 per cent will suffer when travelling by plane or train, while 31 per cent will be as a result of bathing in the pool or sea, with the number of cases increasing during the summer when more time is spent travelling, swimming and being at the beach.

Summer is also the season in which 36 per cent more Spaniards suffer from earaches, according to data from a recent study by Oi2 Hearing Centres.


They also looked at the awareness of hearing protection and found that 79 per cent of Spaniards said they did protect their ears in summer with different measures. Among them, 20 per cent avoided being exposed to loud noises; 18 per cent tried to keep their ears dry during swimming; 17 per cent avoided contact of water through the use of earplugs; 14 per cent said they avoided unhealthy waters and do not bathe in unhealthy waters; while the remaining 10 per cent claimed they didn't use cotton buds in their ears.

In contrast, 21 per cent of respondents said they did not take any action to protect their ears during the summer.

The Oi2 said that although awareness of the risks is increasing, there is still a long way to go in terms of awareness of the damage hearing can suffer in the summer.

Historical run

VELEZ-MALAGA'S Council has presented the first ever edition of the town's Run through history, which sees runners race through the town's historical sites.

Operating costs now account for over 50 per cent of turnover

GOOD FOOD, **GOOD WINE AND GOOD FRIENDS** WITH GARRY WAITE

UNNING a restaurant business can be a precarious thing to do as many readers can probably testify. Overheads, as with all businesses, can be a killer and the age old adage has never been truer; 'it's not what you take, it's how much it costs you to take it.'

Here in Spain, not unlike several European countries, the biggest overheads are staff and more importantly social security, currently running at 42 per cent of

The report carried out by ALMR Christie & Co Benchmarking Report says "that while there is confidence in the UK market, overheads have now risen to over 50 per cent." Now I am not sure where they are getting their figures, but in my many years experience the average restaurant works on the following percentages. Thirty three per cent food and beverage costs and if you are very lucky your wage bill will come in at around 25-30 per cent. With average other expenses, rent, light, sundries, repairs and renewals, legal etc accounting for a further 10 - 15 per cent that would show total overheads running at 75-80 per cent.

This, in principal, shows a gross operating profit of 20 - 25 per cent which is quite acceptable.

So I am intrigued as to where the report finds overheads of 50 per cent which means a gross operating profit of - 50 per cent? Maybe it's me!

WHEN the first mobile phones came out I admit to being one of the people that wanted to play with this new toy! My first one was actually a car phone.



Hilton Exeter Airport.

Guests activate the service before arrival through the Hilton Honours app. When their phone comes into range they press the button in the app and the green light on the door appears and the lock clicks open.

Through the Hilton Honors app members can now choose their room (Hilton has created floor plans of every floor in every hotel), check in remotely, open their bedroom door and check out.

In the future Hilton plans to introduce a preference setting where its 60 million members can set their preferred temperature, lighting and television - both in terms of preferred channels and apps - in advance.

Amazing? Absolutely! And there's another thing one can do with a smart phone - make phone calls!

Homes making a splash

SPAIN'S property market throws up a huge variety of business possibilities for savvy entrepreneurs. One of the latest revolves around the country's estimated flotilla of one million private swimming pools.

Most of them were built fairly recently, within the past few decades. But quick construction, cost-cutting and general wear and tear mean that the average swimming pool has a functional life expectancy of around 18 years.

New pools built today with modern technology can cost upwards of €30,000.

Yet only a quarter have experienced some form of renovation according to a 2016 study from the Spanish Association of Swimming Sector Professionals (Asofap), which could only exist in Spain.

That is paving the way for a new breed of pool builders. Renovations and new pools in 2017 are slimmer, sleeker and shallower, a place to entertain guests around, rather than to

New materials arriving from America can make pools longer-lasting and more cost-effective. Stairs in the pool, underwater benches to sit on, and depth of only 1.4 metres, make changing the water vastly cheaper.

A focus on comfort and aesthetics also make people more likely to use their pools. Hundreds of thousands lie largely empty across the county as owners guiltily never find time to swim, while forking out hundreds of euros per month to keep them clean.

New pools built today with modern technology can cost upwards of €30,000 but are guaranteed to last longer and be used more frequently. Highlights include stainless steel or quartz panelling, sandy areas and palm trees, and saline electrolysis to avoid chemical treatments.



PROPERTY SALES: Are hitting new heights.

Sales skyrocket in Spain

HOME sales are hitting new heights in sunny Spain. Statistics just released show that more properties were sold in May 2017 than in any other month for more than six

With 44,782 homes exchanging hands, averaging almost 1,500 each day, the month recorded a 23 per cent jump on April and showed potential investors that Spain's property market is in

Second-hand homes were the biggest market players,

accounting for eight out of every 10 properties sold. But new builds also saw their numbers shoot up by a healthy 12.6 per cent.

The substantial difference between April and May can be largely explained by the Easter celebrations which saw many buyers, sellers, and agents slip out of market activity for a few weeks.

That suggests that strong sales in May as not an aberration but an example of the market's consistent growth, especially when considered

alongside other positive indi-

The sales explosion has been concentrated in Madrid and along Spain's Mediterranean coastline, with Andalucia clocking up the highest volume and the Balearics seeing the highest increase in sales.

Data from property appraisers Tinsa shows that in the first half of 2017 prices rose by 2.8 per cent across the country, with the biggest rises in the Balearic Islands at 7.2 per cent. Across major cities it averaged 5.2 per cent.

To lease or not to lease

WITH rents rising astronomically across Spain, buying a property with the intention of renting it out is increasingly appealing for many expatriates.

Short term rentals, largely to tourists, offer the most lucrative, immediate reward. But recent crackdowns on the practice are making it much harder to earn money without going to extensive trouble.

Arduous and expensive registration processes, health and safety requirements, and huge bankruptcy-inducing fines for non-compliance mean now is perhaps not the best time to jump on that particular gravy train.


But the long-term rental market shows few signs of slowing down. In major cities and along the coast, rents have shot up by 10 per cent this year, earning thousands of landlords a small

The key question is, how long will it last? Carme Trilla, president of the Metropolitan Observatory of Housing, said last week that the rise in rents has "hit a roof." "There will be a bottleneck in price rises be-

cause it is impossible to have sufficient demand with the current rents," she said.

She was referring to Barcelona, where the average rent now stands at €845 per month, but it should only be a matter of time before rents across the country begin to sta-



The marvel of Peru - an overlooked but useful plant

GRAEME TYRRELL

IF you like a perfumed garden in summer then you need to know about Mirabilis jalapa. It was a

very popular garden plant in Victorian times but has lost much of its popularity as it is a herbaceous perennial, meaning it looses its foliage in autumn, withdrawing to just a tuber over

winter before emerging again in spring.

In warmer climates such as the Mediterranean it can also become a little invasive, sprouting from seeds wherever they have fallen. Usually the long dry summer will eliminate escaped plants but care should be taken to not dispose of seed heads carelessly. Despite these drawbacks, it makes a wonderful addition to the garden and is very hardy in a container.

The trumpet like flowers appear in profusion in July and the flowering can last until October. It has a heavenly scent that permeates the zone around the plant. In northern climates it is called the 4 O'Clock or Tea Time plant as the scent is released around this time in the afternoon when the temperature changes with evening approaching.

I have found that the scent is released in the morning in my Mediterranean garden when the coolness of the morning releases the scent filling the house with its perfume through the open windows. The evenings here don't get

cool enough to allow the scent to be released.

I have only the pinky mauve colour from some seeds a friend from London gave me, but they have spread around the garden in an enclosed courtvard wonderfully with only the need to remove ones in inappropriate places.

The colour range of this plant is amazing though. Some flower with red, yellow, crimson or orange colours and combinations of these colours in individual flowers or even different coloured flowers on the same plant. I had some like these growing while living in New Zealand.

The plant itself is attractive with succulent like stems and tropical like foliage that beams with lushness. The stems are delicate and can break off easily but they are quickly renewed with new stems as it is very fast growing up to a metre high and wide. The plant itself though is extremely

hardy due to its tuber root system retaining moisture and nutrients allowing it to survive dry periods very well and renew growth once it receives moisture

Over winter I just leave the tubers in the ground where they are but they can be dug up and rearranged or repotted when dormant.

It just needs a reasonably good soil with some added compost or a good potting mixture to grow in and occasional watering and it will return abundant flowers, sweet orange blossom like perfume lush foliage and ease of maintenance.

It was a medicinal plant for the Aztecs in the Peru region of the Andes where it naturally occurs. It has naturalised in many warmer countries around the world and is often called the Beauty of the Night in some languages as it appears to flower and disperse its scent at night in these regions.

AT one time fish was thought to be a major cause of skin disease in cats. Now we have all come to realise that the flea is the main culprit when it comes to skin irritation in cats and dogs.

However not many pet owners are aware our pets suffer food allergies which can cause dermatological discomfort. In fact according to Nigel Taylor the Express vet, 1 per cent of all

Stop the milk! skin problems in cats and

dogs are caused by dietary allergies.

Allergen reactions may be triggered in minutes, hours or days. Once an allergy to a protein is established, sensitivity is often

Dogs are mostly sensitive to beef and milk, while cats often do not get on with beef, milk or fish. Some dogs can digest the lactose in cow's milk.

Give a pet dog or cat milk and the undigested lactose provokes an upset stomach in no time. This is not a true allergy but demonstrates how sensitive to certain food pets can be. Stop the milk and your



pet's life will look up immediately.

Most pets will react in some way by incorrect feeding and apart from allergic reactions one can expect flatulence and inconsistent stool quality and large smelly motions. Incorrect feeding can cause failure to put on weight and if the balance of the food is

not correct, a display of hyperactivity or indeed low activity can result.

Most animals can be assessed by their coat and skin vitality. There is always a possibility that the protein is being utilised for energy with a subsequent loss of health and vitality.

Many owners give far too many vitamins and one should remember that a well-balanced diet should not have to be supplement-

Ritualistic scratching and licking could well indicate that there is an allergic reaction to the food and the eating of grass, twigs and roots sometimes is an indication that the food is not

being digested properly. Tissue stealing and fibrebased destruction could be another indication there is a craving for fibre to help the digestive process.

It is a good idea to speak to your vet about feeding pets and to make things easy for you there are many good commercial dried pet foods with selected proteins like lamb and chicken that are unlikely to cause allergy already in them.

Many pet shops and vets are now selling 'Chewies.' I would steer clear of anything which has a colour since this must have an additive. Chews have been known to cause hyperactivity and low activity.

If you dog needs something to chew then take a look at a Kong Ball or Cube, these can be stuffed with goodies (put some in the freezer) and will occupy your pet for hours.



A DREAM came true for 79vear-old Brit Rosemary Smith who sped around a French circuit in a Renault Sport F1 car with 800hp.

She is reckoned to be the oldest person to ever commandeer the Renault F1 and certainly among the most senior drivers in history behind the wheel of such a powerful car.

Mrs Smith was the first winner of an ongoing competition celebrating Renault's 40th anniversary. Anyone test-driving a Renault at a dealership is automatically entered into a draw, with 10 winning the chance to drive an F1 car.

Helping prepare her for the spin around the Le Castellet track was official Renault driver Jolyon Palmer. But, oddly enough, Rosemary Smith didn't need much preparation.

She is a former rally driver and driving instructor, who won the Tulip Rally in 1965.

Designed by Formula One

engineer Adrian Newey, the Valkyrie is expected to go into production late next year, with just 150 models in the pipeline.


Tipped as the fastest, most powerful non-F1 car in history,

Aston Martin chief Andy Palmer says it will "lap Silverstone as fast as any F1 car."

It has been described as "95 per cent" done by design director Miles Nurnberger. Projected price is at least €2.5 million for one of the limited edition beasts.

Tweaks will be made until it is perfect in the eyes of Red Bull man Newey. The headline news is that the extraordinary engine will provide 1,000hp, while the car itself will weigh just 1,000kg. That's an astonishing 1-1 horsepower to weight ratio that will be coupled with some of the finest aerodynamic technology the world has ever seen.

Offering slightly more space than the deceptively compact Valkyrie seems to from a distance, it can cram two normal, even tall, humans into the front seats. They have their feet up just like an F1 car. In the same spirit all the controls are stuck on the steering wheel to maximise space.
