# Wine panic

# Contagious disease threatens industry

'Olive Ebola' is now threatening Mallorca's wine industry. The dangerous plant pathogen Xylella Fastidiosa has infected at least 14 vineyards across the island.

The contagious disease has already infected hundreds of olive and almond trees. It is dubbed 'ebola' because it is extremely contagious and kills almost all trees in its path.

Positive identification of the disease on grapevines have been made in Sant Llorenc, Felantix. Sencelles, and Manacor.

At present the outbreaks are restricted to small, private vineyards. If the disease is confirmed on large scale wine producing estates the results could be catastrophic for the island's wine industry.

EU scientists recently left Mallorca after evaluating the damage done to olive trees. They concluded that it will be necessary to cull and burn thousands of trees in order to stave off the spread of the disease. When the bacteria first arrived in Europe in 2013, Italy lost one million olive trees.

Agriculture minister Vicenc Vidal has held an emergency meeting with the affected wine growers and the island's larger producers. They have agreed on a containment plan which may still be feasible if the bacteria is restricted to small holdings.

Vidal himself has come in for heavy criticism after ecologists revealed that the bacteria may have been festering on Mallorca for up to 10 years. Earlier action may have prevented what is almost certain to be a disastrous few years for olive, almond and potentially wine producers.

# Arrests over stomach bug lies

SEVERAL arrests have been made as police go after British stomach bug scammers. The suspects are believed to have targeted British tourists outside hotels and encouraged them to make fraudulent claims.

Police made the arrests at addresses in Calvia and Palma. It is understood that the suspects told complicit Brits to buy diarrhoea medicine at a Mallorca pharmacy to support their false claims against the

Guardia Civil officers and a court magistrate participated in the raids. Investigators believe an organised criminal network is behind the avalanche in sickness claims in the past 12 months. They have rocketed by 500 per cent since 2015 and are believed to have cost Mallorca hotels €50 million last year.

They were acting on information from hotel groups, including Club Mac de Alcudia. which have hired private investigators to unravel the false sickness claims.

Action has also been taken in the UK, where the government withdrew the operating licence of a company which advised clients to invent stom-

ach bug claims. Allsure Ltd, based in Lancashire, is believed to be the first company closed down by order of the British government in relation to the scandal.

British investigators found that Allsure managers dictated to clients exactly what they should write on their claim forms in order to be successful. Those who passed the lax British consumer complaints laws often won thousands of pounds in compensation, or a free holiday. British foreign secretary Boris Johnson has pledged to clamp down on the claims industry.

A TOTAL of 14 people including 12 Britons have been held in Mallorca on suspicion of selling drugs to holidaymakers in Magaluf.

The arrests came after Spanish police swooped on 12 addresses in Palma and Calvia following a lengthy probe focused on party strip Punta Ballena

The sting, referred to by investigators as Operation Tatum, led to the seizure of 3.5 kilos of cocaine, 500 grammes of methamphetamine, an unspecified amount of hashish and €123,000 in cash.

Most of the cocaine was found in a car parked in a Palma garage, with more hidden inside a shoebox.

Detectives say that the group represents the largest network of drug dealers in the Punta Ballena area.

The drugs were allegedly brought to the island on private leisure boats which went unnoticed among the thousands that visit Mallorca every summer.

different addresses in Palma and Calvia with smaller amounts transported to Magaluf on a daily basis.

The enquiry was launched on the back of Operation Daju, which in June 2016 saw five British and Spanish suspects arrested and five kilos of cocaine seized.

They were known to supply street dealers in Punta Ballena. whereas those held in the latest arrests were targetting nightclub revellers, often while selling entrance tickets.

A Guardia Civil statement confirmed that 'of the 14 de-

tainees, 13 were in Mallorca and one in Barcelona who was a link between the Netherlands and Palma. where the middlemen were based, while the ticketing staff distributed the substances to the customers.'

# Punished for abuse

THE owner of a horse which

died from malnutrition was handed a six-month suspended prison sentence.

The mare was euthanised by vets days after being rescued from the finca near Santa Eugenia.

Named 'Canela,' the animal was also

blind in her left eye and had an ulcer in her right eye when she died. She was in a miserable physical condition and had not eaten for days when Guardia Civil intervened.

They were tipped off by a witness to the horse's unfortunate condition. The mare was taken away and handed over to the Natura Parc of Santa Eugenia.

Just days after treatment by the vets, they decided the animal had to be put down.

The man has been banned from caring for or owning an animal for two years.

# \ roadside shocker



BEWARE: Wandering shirtless in Mallorca can lead to a hefty fine.

AMONG Spain's oddest laws is one in Els Alamus, Catalonia, which rules that all prostitutes - plying the oldest profession in the world - must wear high visibility vests when seeking clients on roadsides, with fines of up to €40 for those not doing so.

Police stress the law is to protect the women from the danger they can pose to drivers.

Meanwhile in Cadiz it is illegal to throw rice at bridal couples, in part to safeguard wedding guests slipping, and also to prevent pigeons flocking outside

Then in Madrid it's illegal to ask what time it is

there from 3.29pm - 6.47pm according to a centuries old law that appears to have never been removed from the city statutes.

Also in the capital city it is illegal to walk more than eight dogs at once. Three years ago Mallorca, seeking to attract more discerning tourists to the island, introduced a law banning people from going shirtless in public. Those ignoring it can be fined up to €600.

A similar law also exists in Barcelona, and Marbella is now said to be considering introducing such a law, though it has not been proved whether such laws have led to classier tourists visiting.

# Suspected pervert hunted down

POLICE arrested a man on perversion charges after he allegedly groped a 13-year-old girl in the street. The accused, aged 48, also assaulted the officers who tried to arrest him.

The incident took place in Son Gotleu, Palma early on Sunday evening. The girl claims she was walking home from the house of a private tutor when the man accosted

Calling her 'princess' he offered to take her for a kebab. She refused and began to run when he became aggressive and lunged for her genital area. She sprinted back to her tutor's house and the lady called the police.

They arrived to find the girl in tears but managed to extract a decent description. An hour later they found a man matching her portrayal nearby in the Pere Garau neighbourhood. When accosted the suspect attacked the officers, leaving one with a broken finger.

He was eventually pinned down and the girl identified him positively from inside a police car. He faces charges of sexually abusing a child. His nationality was not revealed by police.

# **Biggest** anti-tourism demo in years

A MAJOR demonstration against mass tourism is planned for Saturday September 23. It is being organised by environmental associations GOB and Terraferida.

Both have a long history of exposing environmental scandals on the island and protesting against tourist saturation. They are distinct from radical groups like Arran, which favour more aggressive action.

The march will take place in Placa d'Espanya and is also supported by local political party Mes, which is part of the ruling coalition in the Balearic parliament.

The main gripe is the holiday rental regulations which, according to GOB spokeswoman Margalida Ramis, "allows thousands of homeowners to become small hoteliers," without proper tax and controls.

"The aim of the demonstration is to find alternatives to the tourist economy, diversifying the islands so we no longer depend on tourism," she said.

Tourism minister Biel Barcelo, who is mired in multiple political scandals, will be the main target of the protestors, who are expected to number in the thousands.

GOB, which is active across the islands, has been fighting against mass tourism for a long time.

# Nuns make way for plush hotels



ONE of Mallorca's few remaining quiet spots is set to embrace the machine of mass tourism. Capdepera Town Hall has issued permits for the building of plush new hotels in the centre.

They will be the first major hotels in the community, which has escaped the tourist juggernaut unscathed while nearby Cala Ratjada and Canyamel entertain tens of thousands of foreign guests each month.

The biggest hotel is planned for Ca ses Monges. The building was constructed in the late 19th century and entertained only nuns until the end of the 1990s

Though much of Mallorca is in open revolt against tourist saturation, Capdepera feels left out according to the council's tourism chief Monica Vieio. The town isn't mentioned on tourist maps, or even highlighted on the road from Palma.

She wants this to change and has identified the old castle and other historic buildings as prime attractions for tourists of a more cultural bent. Capdepera can't compete with Cala Ratjada for coastal beauty and soft sand but it is one of the most immaculately preserved towns on Mallorca.

That won't change simply to rake in tourist money claims Viejo. A condition of the hotel licences is that shiny new buildings won't be constructed but

instead classic old ones will be strengthened and reimagined.

The Ca ses Monges project will have 26 rooms with 52 beds and be named Creu de Tau. It is expected to open next year, though at present looks like a 19th century relic.

Other projects include a spa and a posh restaurant in the town centre. The council is eager to attract people to stay for long weekends, rather than just a few hours' break from the sun

# Speargun diver reeled in

A SNEAKY diver was caught fishing in a protected area with a speargun. He was caught by Guardia Civil marine specialists at the Llevant Marine Reserve near Cala

Underwater fishing is expressly prohibited in the area, which enjoys a flourishing marine ecosystem thanks to strict regulations.

The Guardia Civil were told by an eyewitness that a man dressed in diving gear and wielding a specially adapted rifle was plunging around the waters of the reserve, anchored from a small boat.

Officials from the Underwater Special Operations Group (GEAS) were dispatched to the scene. They immediately spotted the man fishing near the Cala Ratiada pier.

When he noticed them the

diver plunged down to the sea floor and hid the rifle among posidonia fields. Possession of a speargun without a licence is an even graver offence than fishing in the protected waters.

The Guardia Civil divers ordered him to retrieve it but he feigned ignorance. Eventually they dived down themselves to recover the weapon.

He now faces triple charges of illegal possession, illicit fishing and lying to police.

# Toll trouble at tunnel

# Hopes dashed as free travel deadline expires

TOLLS continue to thwart free passage through the

Soller tunnel. Residents had expected the tolls to be abolished from September 1 but a last minute court ruling has postponed free travel, perhaps indefinitely.

Locals from Soller and Bunyola have held regular demonstrations outside the tunnel in protest. They are supported by the respective mayors of the two communities, Jaume Servera and Andreu Buiosa.

They describe the abolition of the toll as a "necessity"

and have accused the courts of enforcing a "political verdict" against the left-wing Mallorca Council. Judges had

put economic interests before the common good in their ruling in favour of the tunnel concessionaire Globalvia two weeks ago, they argue.

In the 11th hour judgement the court said the compensation paid to Globalvia was

too low. The company had demanded €31 million, but the Mallorcan authorities refused to pay more than €17 million

Technically Globalvia owns the rights to the tunnel until 2022. Despite charging expensive tolls it has failed to make the tunnel an economic success and infuriated local commuters and families.

Mallorca's council decided to terminate the contract five years early, pay Globalvia compensation, and move on with free travel for all.

Globalvia bitterly opposed the €17 million offer in the courts. With their victory it is possible that their ownership of the tunnel, and the tolls, might continue until 2022

Globalvia are supported in the dispute by both the conservative Popular Party and Ciudadanos.

# **Bollards** against terror

CONCRETE buffers have been installed on the Playa de Palma to repel potential terrorist attacks. The move comes one month after bollards and hefty flower pots were placed strategically around the city centre.

The new barriers are installed between resort areas one and seven. The area has been selected due to its immense popularity and also the ease with which a terrorist could have conceivably rammed a truck into bathers.

Mallorca is on high alert after the Barcelona attack which killed 16 people. An Islamic terror cell was also uncovered in Inca earlier this summer, believed to be planning a Londonstyle attack with knives.

The new bollards by the beach will make it more difficult for large vehicles to be driven off the road. Firefighters are satisfied with the arrange-

# Shotgun husband jailed

A HUSBAND who fired a shotgun twice near his wife was jailed for a year. He pled guilty and received a reduced sentence when the court accepted he

wasn't trying to kill her.

The incident took place at their Palma home earlier this year. During a tense domestic dustup he picked

up the gun and fired two shots in the kitchen. One hit the fridge, the other put a hole in the wall.

His wife fled the house and called for help. Soon dozens of armed National Police were on the scene but their suspect had disappeared out the back door.

Hours later he telephoned his wife at home where police were watching over her. With officers eavesdropping on the call he said "Tell the officers by your side that I swear you are going to be Mallorca's 11th victim" (of women killed by their partners).

Police traced the call but the man had vanished once again by the time they arrived. His shotgun was found in a nearby field.

Eventually police managed to track the man through friends and convinced him to turn himself in. He was denied bail and kept in custody until this week's trial.

The 47-year-old had no licence for the firearm. Police later discovered that it had been stolen from a house in Manacor years earlier.

MALLORCA is shaping up to be the new battle ground between Spain's taxi drivers and technology. A decision from Spain's supreme court on whether to grant thousands of Uber licences on the island is expected soon.

Uber is a taxi company that allows people to pay using an online mobile phone application. They can track the car on their phones, don't have to pay the driver anything directly, and pay vastly lower fares

> than traditional taxis.

> The American company is desperately trying to make inroads into the lucrative Mallorca market. where taxi drivers operate a monopoly and charge ex-

tremely high rates. But the Spanish courts, influenced by the taxi lobby, have until recently banned Uber, and similar businesses such as Cabify, from the country.

The sole exception has been a trial run of a few hundred Uber cars in Madrid. But the pressure to allow competition is increasing even faster than taxi fares.

There are two cases before the supreme court pertaining to the granting of 200 and 700 Uber taxi li-


cences on the Balearic Islands. They are joined by dozens of other smaller cases from local companies and also rental hire firms.

Uber is looking to form a partnership with hire firms on Mallorca, whereby they would rent cars and use them as taxis. A fleet of thousands of vehicles is expected to soon make life easier for tourists and residents and become enormously profitable for Uber.

The threat to Mallorca's taxi firms is existential. There are 1,237 taxis in Palma, which would be easily overwhelmed by Uber numbers. Drivers pay €200,000 for their licence and charge outrageous rates to make up

the shortfall. In many countries Uber is more than 90 lar taxis.

# Pressure group comments on Brexit

AS the third round of talks took place between British and European Union Brexit negotiators in Brussels, campaigning groups made their voices heard.

British in Europe, an umbrella body lobbying for citizen's rights includes Bremain in Spain which looks to try to protect British citizens living in Spain and as the name suggests is generally opposed to Brexit.

The coalition has assessed the joint UK/EU technical note on citizens' rights, which displays some agreement concerning recognition of professional qualifications and the right to set up businesses after Brexit.

It has come to the conclusion in both cases that this right will probably only be valid in the country of residence and not across the EU 27, thereby affecting crossborder workers.

Chair of British in Europe, Jane Golding, comments: "Both parties agreed that frontier workers should be covered by any agreement but we're concerned that this definition is too narrow to cover the myriad ways in which UK citizens work cross-border."

Sue Wilson, Chair of Bremain in Spain, comments: "Before the negotiations even started this week, both sides were suggesting that the expectations for progress were low. We saw little to convince us otherwise.

"The EU has constantly stated that the burning issues of citizens' rights. Ireland's border and the exit bill must come first, and that talks on any future relationship cannot start until 'sufficient progress' has been made on these issues. How-

ever, the UK continues to want to focus on trade talks

"When I listened to David Davis and Michel Barnier speaking at the press conference on Thursday August 31, it was hard to believe they were discussing the same negotiations. While Davis insisted there had been 'concrete progress,' Barnier said there had been 'no decisive progress on the key issues'."

She continues: "One of those key issues is citizens' rights. We have repeatedly been told we are number one priority. Yet, after the third set of negotiations, we are not much further forward."

British in Europe is, however, pleased that the third round of negotiations saw pension aggregation confirmed and that discussions concerning mutual healthcare arrangements for pensioners and others in receipt of benefits will continue.

Sue Wilson says: "Despite some examples of progress, Bremain in Spain members remain concerned. Some have been reassured by the progress made but many are still wary and distrustful of anything the UK government is promising."

She concludes: "So, the third round of negotiations is over, 15 months have passed since the referendum, yet we have not travelled so far.'





# New electric cars for Madrid

AN agreement between Spanish Service Company Ferrovial and Renault has been signed to launch a car sharing service in Madrid called Zity.

It will operate from October with a fleet of 500 Zoe electric cars and will initially service the area within the M-30 beltway.

The Zoe has a theoretical maximum coverage of 400 kilometres but is more likely to need recharging after 300 kilometres based on normal traffic conditions within the capital.

This will be the third electric car sharing scheme operating within Madrid as both Citroen and Mercedes with their electric Smart car are using the city to demonstrate their ability to run non-polluting vehicles.

# EU BANS ENERGY GOBBLING VACUUM CLEANERS Making Europe greener

AN important new European law banning the sale of vacuum cleaners using more than 900 watts of power and emitting more than 80 decibels is now in ef-

Manufacturers and stores who still hold stock of these machines will be able to sell them until stocks are exhausted but may not produce or import additional machines into the European Union.

With the number of bazaars in Spain that import electrical goods from China, it may be the banned cleaners have a longer shelf life here than in other parts of the EU.

According to a consortium of environmental organisations, the European Environment Bureau, it is perfectly possible to produce a good quality vacuum cleaner without a large motor or making a loud noise.

Former UKIP MEP Roger Helmer told the BBC "By all means let's make pathetic under-powered vacuum cleaners for export to the EU.

"But we must retain the right to make and use sensible full-powered appliances in the UK. This shows why we

# Car sales soar in August

ONE sign of an economy in recovery is the number of cars sold and August has seen 72,470 new Spanish registrations.

This is a 13 per cent increase over the same month last year and with 849,912 sold in the first eight months of 2017, there is an overall increase of 7 per cent.

Despite all of the negative publicity received by the Volkswagen Group over the diesel scandal, its Spanish subsidiary SEAT actually took 17 per cent of the entire new registrations with Volkswagen also performing well.

With so many tourists visiting the country, car hire companies have increased their purchases by more than 40 per cent when compared to last year.

# MAJOR FINE FOR ONLINE BETTING COMPANY

Problem gamblers worry

A GIBRALTAR-based online gambling firm is being fined a record £7.8 million (€8.5 million) by the UK Gambling Commission.

The regulator insists that firms that take bets have an obligation to protect their more vulnerable clients from spending more than they can afford which 888 have allegedly not done.

The most obvious example of this was 7,000 customers who had voluntarily recorded they had a problem and should not be allowed to bet any longer, but were still allowed to take part in the company's bingo games.

Another problem area highlighted was inability of the company to spot problem gamblers and in one case a customer lost £100,000 (€108,000) a month for 13 months before they recognised his vulnerability.

Although the penalty is high, it won't revert to the Gambling Commission as £3.5 million (€3.8 million) will be refunded to the 7,000 who had barred themselves from gambling but were still allowed to carry on.

charity involved in helping the estimated two million British gamblers who may be addicted or be likely to face financial or social problems.

Gibraltar has benefited considerably from the influx of offshore betting companies who have decided to make their base on the Rock and does have legislation in place to police their activities, but with the bulk of gambling revenue coming from the UK it is left to the British regulator to take action.

There is something of a problem for the various betting companies as they need punters to lose as much as possible in order to boost their profits but have to be careful not to 'kill the goose that lays the golden egg.'

Public opinion means a great deal to these companies and if they are considered to be responsible for the break-up of families and leaving individuals bankrupt they will face a significant backlash as well as further fines from the Gambling Commission.

Although these are multi-million pound companies some have suggested they are still trying to develop policies which will identify and protect vulnerable customers but this is a slow process.

Spain is believed to have a huge interest in sports betting but is regulated by the Spanish Gambling Act which prohibits all forms of online betting and bingo, but due to an anomaly in the law, certain provinces can licence this.

# **Richest** man for hours

ON average, once a year, Amancio Ortega, founder of the Inditex fashion chain is declared the richest man in the world but only for a few hours!

So much depends on the value of shares that the mega-rich own in their companies and the prevailing stock market prices, so for three hours he was estimated to be worth \$85 billion (€71.5 billion) but then his shares dropped.

Sadly at that time he then plummeted to become just the third richest man, behind the usual leader Bill Gates of Microsoft and Amazon boss Jeff Rezos

# Stay cool on the road

AS part of a new series, we answer some common driving questions, kindly provided by members of the Guardia Civil based in Torrevieja, Costa Blanca, who set up the N332 website and Facebook page to help break down barriers



BEING comfortable when driving is essential to staying safe on the roads, as when we feel uncomfortable the situation can lead to distractions. If we start to feel too warm or overheated, this can lead to lethargy which can also be potentially deadly when driving.

In order to stay cool try and keep the car as cool as possible. If you have a garage or shaded area for your vehicle use it, or try and park under a tree or shadow of the building, remembering the sun moves round throughout the day so make the most of where the shadow will be. However, be aware that parking under trees can result in deposits from birds or even the sap of the tree itself so ensure windscreens are clean before driving off.

Use reflective screens on your windows when the vehicle is parked to help reduce the build up of heat. It is quite common for the interior of a car to reach 10 degrees more than outside quite quickly, so remember this and never leave animals or humans inside vehicles.

Many modern vehicles are equipped with air conditioning which can help keep the vehicle at a more comfortable level, but remember to get it checked and gassed to ensure optimum performance.

It is also advisable to try and avoid driving at the hottest time of the day when possible. Driving at sunrise and sunset can also pose a problem largely because of the position of the sun which can cause extreme glare and dazzle leaving drivers temporarily blinded by the sun.

Remember summer can also bring extra vehicles on the road and when temperatures rise. so can tempers. Always try and remain calm and alert as tempers can become easily frayed with increased incidents of road rage.

# Can one owner enlarge his door?

If an owner wishes to enlarge the French doors, such action would alter the facade of the block. Does he need the agreement of the adjacent owners? Does he need permission from the Community? Does it

need a unanimous vote or 60 per cent of all owners present or represented? If the work was done without the agreement of the owners, what action can be taken against the owner?

PS (By email)

Properly, an owner who wishes to enclose his terrace or enlarge his glass doors must seek the permission of the Community. This permission requires a 60 per cent vote of owners present or represented in favour. Until 2013, this required a



unanimous vote. Properly, the owner should also have a building permit from the town hall. Permission from the neighbours is not necessary. If the owner carries out the work without permission, the Community can obtain a court order to restore the original condition of the door or terrace.

They should also seek court costs against the offending owner.







# Spanish rock groups

Mago de Oz (Wizard of Oz) are a heavy folk metal outfit with nine members. The founding member of the band, Txus, claims they chose the name because 'life is a yellow brick road, on which we walk in the company of others searching for our dreams.' They have released 12 studio albums with a strong Celtic and operatic sound behind them. Their high voltage shows feature fireworks, confetti, colourful backdrops and hilarious stage props.

Alternative rockers, Sober were formed back in 1994 and have released nine studio albums. The Madrilenian outfit went on a hiatus in 2005 whilst members pursued other projects before reforming in 2010. They have played some of the biggest Spanish festivals and venues in their time. Many football enthusiasts will be familiar with Cientos de Preguntas which appeared on the soundtrack to the videogame Fifa 2005.

#### 3. Baron Rojo

Spanish rock royalty, Baron Rojo (Red Baron) achieved international success in the 1980's, capturing the heavy metal sound in its heyday. The band is fronted by brothers Carlos and Armando de Castro. The name of the band is a tribute to Manfred von Richthofen, as is the



song Baron Rojo. The band have 13 studio albums behind them and still tour reguarly.

#### 4. Breed 77

The youngest group of this compilation, Gibraltar rock outfit Breed 77 were formed in 1996 and have released seven studio albums. They infuse their heavy metal with a Spanish flamenco sound and create a unique sound, often adding a Spanish line or two to their English songs. Currently in hiatus, they will be emerging only for a one-off show on Gibraltar's National Day celebrations in September. Their biggest hit The

River brought them worldwide success but possibly their most popular song with fans is a cover of the Cranberries' anti-war anthem, Zombie. 5. Obus

Well-respected veterans, Obus (Bomb or Howitzer) have been active since the early 1980's and released 10 studio albums. They gained fame quickly by putting on electrifying live shows and have remained popular whilst refusing to alter their heavy metal style. The band continue to tour, playing a number of large venues and festivals in 2017.

#### WHAT is tuberculosis?

Tuberculosis is an infectious and contagious disease which tends to affect the lungs but can also spread to other ar-

# What are its symp-

The symptoms can vary but when it affects the lungs a person can cough blood, have a high fever, pains in a person's side and diarrhoea.

# How can you treat

Tuberculosis can be cured in most cases by going on a course of antibiotics. It is a long treatment process that can take months involving three or four different drugs.

#### What causes tuberculosis?

Tuberculosis caused by a bacterium called Mycobacterium tuberculosis that tends to affect those with

weaker immune systems and sometimes the el-

#### Are there ways of preventing catching the disease?

The disease is spread through the air, so being in an area with someone who has tuberculosis will significantly increase the risk of catching it as the air an infected person expulses spreads the disease. In order to avoid it a person should not expose themselves to that environment.

#### Is it a common disease in Spain?

For many years tuberculosis was almost eradicated in Spain, only affecting those with immunodeficiency such as HIV sufferers or people undergoing chemotherapy.

However the increase in immigration has caused cases of tuberculosis to appear more frequently.

# Ask the optician -Children's Eye Health

AS everyone is back to school this month, I wanted to focus on the important issue of children's eye health. If visual problems aren't identified early it can affect the child's development, how well they do at school and how they experience the world around them, so it's an important issue.

#### WHEN should I start taking my child to the opticians?

We believe that children should have their first eye examination at around three years old but if you are concerned, don't wait until then.

The earlier any vision problems are discovered, the better the chance of correcting them.

#### How can the optometrist examine my toddler's eyes when she can't read?

Opticians can assess which kind of lenses, if any, are needed without your child having to read by:

- Measuring the focusing ability by looking into each eve using an instrument called a retinoscope
- Using shapes, picture books and other materials to help children indicate what they can see and how clearly
- Checking whether the eyes work properly together
- Using special charts for young children who don't know their alphabet
- Checking health of the eyes using an instrument called an ophthalmoscope.

Are there any signs I can look for to suggest there is a problem with my child's eve-

There are a few signs which could indicate a vision problem in children including: sitting too close to the TV, rubbing their eyes repeatedly, complaining of headaches, being clumsy or squinting.

#### What is the relation between eye sight and performing well at school?

Experts believe that many learning disabilities could be vision related as they may not be able to read the blackboard or text books, so it's vital to identify problems early.

It doesn't begin until


1.30am and is certain to be a long night for residents and partygoers alike.

HOSE that appear at virtually every fish counter in our supermarkets. Now, I am sure that I do what most people try and do.

If I have a lot of shopping to do I make a bee line to the fish counter and get my ticket. I work out a rough idea how long it will take.

# You'll not see nothing like the mighty Quinn

(Manfred Mann/Bob Dylan)

IT was announced last month that former Ritz Hotel head chef and Ark Foundation founder Michael Quinn had died aged 71 after a long battle with ill health.

'The Mighty' Quinn came to promi-

nence in 1980 when. having already achieved a Michelin star as head chef at Gravetye Manor in Sussex, he was named the first British head chef to hold the top job at the Ritz hotel.

He was credited with turning the London landmark into one of the city's top dining destinations through innovative cuisine that was much copied.

It was an achievement that helped to win him an MBE, along with celebrity status, countless television and radio ap-

pearances, and invitations to cook for royalty and stars all over the world.

But his remarkable success made Ouinn's fall even more dramatic. No one. not least Quinn, would have dreamt that by 1990 he would be a homeless drunk, sleeping in doorways, parks and Salvation Army hostels.

He had lost contact with most of his family and friends, and at the age of 48 the chef who once had everything was being given the last rites by a priest as he lay dying in hospital with liver failure. Alcoholism had stripped him of fame, fortune, family and almost his life.


In 1990 he was told that he would lose

everything if he didn't stop drinking - and most of it came true. Alcohol took him from the pinnacle of the catering world into treatment centres, hospitals and then back into the pub. If he had gotten well

> when he had the chance, his sons would have known him as a top chef at the Ritz. But now they can't.

However in that year Michael took the first steps to sobriety and realised that there was little help for those suffering from alcohol related problems in hospitality, so he set up the Ark Foundation.

The organisation was established to educate the hospitality industry through awareness seminars on abuse

He spent the rest of his life not as the amazingly talented Chef that he was, but as an ambassador and lecturer for the Ark Foundation. Regretfully, especially among chefs, alcohol and drugs in our industry is a major problem - a lot to do with the stress and long inhospitable hours - and there was never any help or

The foundation did a great deal to help many hundreds of young people. Michael was lucky I suppose to have made it to 71 given the beating that his body endured in the early years.

# As a general rule

'All generalisations are wrong, including this one.

This quotation attributed to Mark Twain, is an intriguing logic puzzle. Perhaps it hints, generalisations are sometimes correct? Of course they can be. If I said, 'I am alive,' that is true. So what's wrong with generalisations? Can they trap our thinking into making statements that sound reasonable but are not?

Take the word, 'immigrant' as a current example. Are immigrants to a country going to bring problems or solutions? The more detailed the questions you ask the more complexity of thinking is needed. Are economic migrants desirable in a country not needing extra workers? Is an economy held back by losing skilled workers originally from other countries? Who enforces migration? Where are immigrants from? The questions are practically unlimited and yet a bigot will simplify the answer to 'immigrants go home.'

Think of the infamous Brexit question. Was anyone invited to discuss why this question was being asked? Did anyone debate how referendums should be run and what proportion of the vote constitutes clear public opinion? Did anyone present facts in the debate prior to the vote, which are now known?

Governance is by definition simplifying complexity to enable broad decisions to be made. However without a debate and consequent understanding of important details, the question is flawed because the answer will not be factual. Socrates believed voters should be educated and informed otherwise the democratic process will reach uninformed conclusions.

Let us not be fooled by thinking we understand things. We don't and that, unfortunately, is a generalisation which is true.

# It's a proven sales technique



VIRTUAL TOUR: 3D guides help homes sell much faster.

PROPERTIES on the market are more than a third likely to sell if the advert makes use of virtual reality software.

They will also sell much faster according to findings from a top property

Club Noteges manages a portfolio of more than 50,000 Spanish homes. Among them are 43,000 that are only advertised using photos. From January to July less than 3,000

of those homes sold, roughly 6.6 per cent.

By contrast they sold more than 10 per cent of the 10,600 homes that offer virtual reality tours to prospective buyers online. The more than 1,000 homes sold using virtual reality were gone within an average of 52 days faster than the homes using only photos.

The findings are categorical proof that sellers have more chance of sell-

ing if they employ virtual reality in their adverts.

The technology isn't overwhelmingly complicated or expensive. Using record video footage it allows buyers to 'step inside' the home from the comfort of their living rooms or estate agents.

Virtual reality just looks better to many buyers too. It shows that the seller is serious and confident in their property. Whereas few people would consider

a home on a mere description without photos, soon buyers will expect a threedimensional tour as a giv-

It is also especially welcomed by foreign buyers who have to be extremely selective in choosing which homes to visit in person. In some cases the quality of the virtual reality tours is such that a decision to buy is made without even physically seeing the property.

# SALES of second-hand homes have now reached the level seen just before the Spanish housing boom really took off in

Figures from the second quarter of 2017 show a total of 119,408 residential property transactions. Of them 99,343 were second-hand properties, comparable to the roughly 100,000 being sold from April to June 2007.

The sale of newly constructed homes is still well behind the heights of a decade ago. With just over 20,000 sales in three months, new homes remain slow sellers. In 2007 more than 110,000 sold in the second quarter.

Including both second-hand and new homes, sales shot up by 5 per cent in the second quarter.

They are at their highest level since the first quarter of 2011 according to the Spanish Registrar's Col-

The group's quarterly report said the results "show a strong market on the demand side" but notes that it is "linked to a single leg of the market, that of used homes."

Co-founder of the Idealista property portal, Fernan-

do Encinar, said used homes are selling because that's essentially all there is on the market. He is critical of delays across Spain in giving permits to new developments, which is holding up the new home market.

Unless the green light is given to new developments, he warns, prices will rise dramatically as supply can't keep up with demand.



KING FELIPE and the president of the Spanish government Mariano Rajoy got the bird at the pro-peace, antiterrorist march in Barcelona.

The placards and banners suggested that this was because Felipe cosied up to the Saudis - who doesn't? - and sweet-talked them into arms deals while Rajoy's government is responsible for Spain's arms sales.

Barcelona mayor Ada Colau and regional vice-president Oriol Junqueras said afterwards the recriminators were only exercising their right to freedom of speech. Maybe, but many spent so much time protesting about the Spanish they forgot why they there were there to begin with.

between northern and southern Ireland is a huge problem that the Brexiteers forgot to solve beforehand.

If the Catalan secessionists' wildest dreams come true and turn into their worst nightmare, they will face a similar situation.

Despite hard-done-by insistence to the contrary from the separatists, the region has never endured anything approaching Ireland's troubles. A hypothetical border issue would not stir up murderous centuries-old conflicts but the border problem would exist for an independent Cataluña.

As Brussels has repeatedly told the Catalan government, leaving Spain automatically means leaving the EU.

One more question for Carles Puigdemont and his vice-president Oriol Junqueras to ponder on and answer before October 1. Or. more importantly, on October 2.

# Standing a head taller

THE Spanish population were never close to their monarchs and the

House of Borbon was largely unloved. This was especially true of Spain's Levante and Cataluña which suffered three centuries ago for backing the losers, the Hapsburgs, in the War of Succession.

Many, possibly most, Spaniards are basically republican at heart but softened when Juan Carlos opened the door to democracy after Franco died in 1975. Sentiments hardened after the King Emeritus broke his hip while elephant shooting with his mistress in 2012 in Zimbabwe. The economic crisis was then at its most brutal and it did not improve matters that Juan Carlos was there at the invitation of a Saudi businessman.

His son Felipe VI is regarded with respect and amiable neutrality, plus a general perception that he does his best. But it's easy to see why Catalan republicans dislike him and why the regional president, mop-headed Carles Puigdemont, avoids being photographed with him. Felipe is almost two.metres tall and standing beside him at the Barcelona peace marches, Puigdemont barely reached his ear.

# **Double** objective


BY slaughtering tourists in Turkey and Egypt and compromising the industries that serve them, Daesh and its acolytes and successors achieved two goals.

Much of their tourism has been diverted to formerly secure Spain which, after the Barcelona and Cambrils attacks, now begins to look less safe.

But Spain is not Turkey or Egypt, both of which have politicians whose unspoken sympathies lie with jijad. Spain does not and, unhampered by ambivalence, it can do a more sincere job of protecting the population and tourists than Egypt or Turkey.

Hoteliers' most worrying problem right now is the puny, Brexitweakened pound sterling which is more likely to deter British tourists than jihadists.

# Making your garden more useable

DURING August the population of our now expanded and internationalised rural hamlet and urbanisation has more than doubled and a dry September might well follow the hot drought driven June to August summer to date. As the temperatures and multinational populations rose one could hear the multilingual mutterings about the inadequacies of summer gardens.

'We live in what was a green rural active agricultural valley, but now it's like a suburban

'Oh isn't it hot after the air conditioning. I've been indoors for three days without going out.'

'We don't sit out much in the summer it's boring. There is not much to see except the pool and its large terrace and the wooden decking is so hot to walk on. But some autumn colour should open up as temperatures fall.'

'Oh I wish we hadn't cut down those trees and replaced them with Australian sails - the shade is not as natural or as deep as it used to be swinging in the hammock strung between two thick branches of the carob tree.

Perhaps we should have used the TerraCottem soil improvement product, produced in Belgium and now used by gardeners and agriculturalists in some 40 countries, when preparing a productive water retaining soil where flower, shrub beds and vegetable raised beds were intended and when making new plantings in later years.' Interestingly a new five kg box has just arrived from TerraVida the Spanish distributor.

I had to stop typing for a few minutes to take delivery and will shortly use a tablespoon in potting up some lemon flavoured basil plants for neighbours to give a new touch to their tomato salads or cooked dishes.

'Oh! I can't stand another barbecued dinner.' But there is no need for summer boredom. During September I plan to make good use of the solar cooker, the Mexican terracotta cooker, an assortment of Moroccan terracotta tagines, the paella kitchen and cold salad dishes.

'Raking or sucking up fallen leaves and pine needles is an endless task. Must cut some more trees down this winter.' But there is a practical answer, design a natural low maintenance wood-land garden. Luckily they survive and are interesting and relaxing to visit in the oldest part of our mountain valley hamlet.

# Why you should branch out with an almond tree, or two

IF you want to add a little more variety to your garden, then you might want to consider planting an almond tree.

Although thought to have originated in China and the Middle East, these trees also flourish in a Mediterranean climate and have become a common feature in gardens across southern Europe.

These elegant trees can reach heights of between four and 10 metres tall, and produce a pretty pink and white blossom in

Almond trees thrive in hot, arid summers and wet, temperate winters and tend not to set fruit when planted in regions outside these parameters.

They are also averse to overly moist soil and frost in spring. The trees are deep rooted and require planting in well-draining sandy loam. They also have high nitrogen and phosphorus requirements so running organic fertilizer and nitrogen through the soil will encourage growth.

Most varieties of almond tree can't selfpollinate so you will need to plant two if you want your trees to produce fruit. If space is an issue, it is possible to plant two trees in the same hole and allow them to intertwine as they grow, enabling the flowers to crosspollinate.

A little patience is required when tending to your almond tree as it typically takes

around five years for them to start producing fruit, although this can be longer depending on the species. These trees can live for up to 40 years, however, so are definitely worth the investment.

paying more than expected.

# Diamonds are forever

BENTLEY is going for the James Bond look with its swanky new Continental GT. The third generation of the classic two-door, fourseater, beloved by Bentley buffs manages to combine the latest technology with the brand's classic look and

It is still manifestly, proudly a Bentley, only with about 80 kilos in excess weight shaved off by enhanced streamlining bolstered with aerospace technology. It's the kind of expensive touch that "makes a Bentley a Bentley" according to top engineer Rolf Frech.

Perks include diamondshaped LED headlights, adjustable leather seats with an in-built massage function, and more than 100 square feet of high quality wood panelling the interior. There are Bang and Olufsen speakers and an ambient interior lighting system.

This Continental GT can reach 100kph from a standstill in 3.6 seconds and will cost around €200,000 when it hits the market next year.

# Aston turning Japanese

ASTON MARTIN will invest heavily in Japan, the world's second largest luxury car market. Chief executive Andy Palmer is just back from a Tokyo trade mission accompanying British Prime Minister Theresa May.

The Warwickshire-based car firm snagged a £500 (€540) million trade deal that includes a luxury tech engineering office and brand centre in Tokyo.

Almost €100 million worth of Japan-

ese car components will be shipped to the UK from Mitsubishi, Yazaki and other local firms. Upwards of €400 million of Aston Martin's British built cars and engines will be exported to the far-east from 2019 onwards.

The Prime Minister celebrated the deal as a post-Brexit coup for Britain and called Aston Martin "a prime example of the innovative and world leading firms the UK is proud of."

Meanwhile Mr Palmer posted a picture of himself outside the British Em-

bassy in Tokyo alongside an Aston Martin DB6 once owned by Sir Paul Mc-Cartney and a DB11 set to be delivered to a client

Aston's Tokyo dealership will be its biggest in the world by sales and one of the top five international outlets in Japan.

The brand, which has become immensely profitable after years of running losses, will also open a Meta Technology and Luxury Accelerator office.

Its primary aim is to understand the



# No tourist tax for boaters

WITH the announced doubling of the tourist tax in Mallorca including the daily €2 tax for cruise passengers, local unions wonder why leisure sailors are exempt.

Considering that Mallorca is a magnet for both yachts and super large craft, many of which are owned by the immensely rich, it is suggested that the Mallorca parliament is missing a major opportunity to increase income.

Most vessels, especially the largest have to moor at marinas and as berthing fees are paid, it would be quite simple to collect the tourist tax at the same time, with marina owners then submitting regular reports and paying over the monies due as would any hotelier.

Equally charter companies renting out vessels to holidaymakers would also be able to collect any tourist tax due.

In addition, although not as prevalent, certain boat owners may also offer accommodation to visitors without registering their vessels as being available for holiday lets and thus not paying any of the associated taxes.

# New safer boat material

A BOAT maker in Santa Pola, Alicante believes that he can create a whole new range of safe, sleek and fast boats made from graphene.

This is an allotrope of carbon, one of many forms of that element which is similar in structure to graphite and carbon. What lead engineer Julio César Galiana Cubi - who has been heavily involved with the manufacture of luxury yachts - believes is that this material, discovered by two Russian scientists in 2004, is stronger than steel and up to 25 per cent lighter. Spain is a major importer

of this raw material and manufacturer Graphenano expects to have its first nine- metre production model available for sale by October of this year, although it will not be cheap with an expected price for a basic model in excess of €250,000.
