Killer confesses

Brit expat sentenced for strangling wife

A BRITISH expat was sentenced to 12 years in prison after confessing to the murder of his wife. Warren Lytlle, aged 52, killed his partner Lisa Jane during an argument in their Calvia apartment last year.

The car salesman strangled his 49-year-old wife with a phone cable during the alcohol-fuelled fight. He initially told police and paramedics that her death was the result of a sex game gone wrong.

Monday's 12-year sentence still needs to be ratified by a jury. Lytlle was facing 20 years but his confession and regret enabled the defence to strike a plea

deal with prosecutors.

It was noted that he immediately called an ambulance to their Costa de la Calma home. Lisa Jane was still alive when paramedics

arrived but had suffered a heart attack and couldn't be revived.

The victim lived in London but regularly travelled to Mallorca to spend time

with her husband. The couple's daughter testified in the Palma court that her father had often beaten Lisa Jane when they lived in the UK, being reported for domestic violence.

Lytlle's sex game claim was immediately dismissed by police investigators.

A report drafted earlier this year stated: "At 3am on January 23, 2016 Warren Lyttle had an argument with his wife during which, with the aim of ending her life, and in a sudden, surprising and unexpected fashion, which left her unable to defend herself, he attacked her with a mobile phone cable."

In Monday's dramatic public confession, Lyttle answered simply "yes" to that charge. He confirmed that the couple had been arguing over money.

Countdown to crisis

Plans for outlawed poll continue

CATALUÑA appears set for a head-on clash with Spain.

It comes as the regional council prepares to defy Madrid next Sunday by holding an independence referendum which the national government insists is illegal and will be stopped.

Spain's attorney general Jose Manuel Maza refused to rule out the possibility Catalan president Carles Puigdemont could be held and charged with unlawful behaviour, while police will be deployed at polling stations to stop people voting.

Maza claimed in a radio interview that the regional president could be charged for disobedience, breaching public duties, and misusing public funds after he financed the vote despite it being banned by the Spanish constitutional court.

The bombshell comes days after Spanish police swooped to arrest 14 Catalan officials and

seize almost 10 million ballot papers in a series of raids which sparked furious protests in Barcelona after tens of thousands poured onto the streets.

Madrid's finance ministry also put the squeeze on the region's finances to prevent government money from being spent on the campaign as the crisis deepened, before chartering ferries to transport thou-

sands of extra police officers sent to the troubled region.

Meanwhile, Spain's Prime Minister Mariano Rajov last Tuesday paid a visit to the White House to meet US President Donald Trump, who said that it would be "foolish" for Cataluña to leave Spain.

"I really think the people of Cataluña would stay with Spain," he added.

While the international community has so far yet to get in-

volved in the dispute, a split would likely impact Spain's relationships with trade partners like the USA, since Cataluña generates around 20 per cent of the country's wealth.

Rajoy has repeatedly declared that the vote is unlawful and a clear breach of the constitution, but Puigdemont has vowed that the region is ready to declare independence within 48 hours of a victory for the yes

Airport drama dodged

TRAVEL chaos in Spain could be avoided at the lastminute after a deal 'in principle' was agreed between workers' unions, airport operator Aena and air navigation manager Enaire.

The parties have signed a deal which must now be ratified by the Ministry for Development.

Specific terms of the deal have not yet been confirmed but the CCOO, UGT and USO unions had been calling for pay increases and more staff.

Airport workers - including firefighters and air traffic controllers - had threatened 25 one-day strikes leading up to Christmas.

Aena operates 46 airports across Spain. The operator saw 230.2 million passengers pass through its airports in 2016, when it made a net profit of €1.164 million.

Electric share

CAR sharing has arrived on Mallorca thanks to an innovate young islander. Ecotxe, a company set up by Alex Duran, combines electric engines with congestion cutting car-sharing. Tourists and residents can pay €10 to share a ride almost anywhere. Ecotxe hopes to reduce pollution on Mallorca, where around 55 per cent of residents drive their own car.

Loose railing

A WOMAN, aged 63 died and a man, 69, was badly injured when they fell nine metres from a balcony during a friend's birthday party. The railing unexpectedly gave way just after midnight when they stepped out for air after dinner. Both were German nationals visiting friends in La Font, near Pollensa.

Black Friday

PALMA'S Christmas Market will open early this year to compete in the annual Black Friday sales frenzy. On November 24 shops, supermarkets and websites around the world will offer massive discounts. By opening early stall owners will avoid missing out on perhaps the biggest single sales day of the year.

Face bite

A POLICEMAN was attacked by an abandoned dog when he checked it for a microchip. The Binissalem officer needed stitches on his neck and nose at Inca hospital. The German Shepherd had been brought into the station by a local woman seeking help. The animal has since been taken to the Natura Parc animal centre.

SPANISH FACTS OF LIFE...31

AS the largest producers and the number one consumers of cured ham in the world - it's safe to say that ham is a pretty big deal in Spain.

The whole hog!

EACH Spaniard eats, on average, a whopping five kilograms of cured ham per year but a long and detailed method is followed to produce the high-quality jamon that Spain is

High quality

Rich history

SPANISH cured ham has been a delicacy since the Roman times and was traditionally made in mountainous regions in the south-west. Families would breed and fatten their own pigs domestically and just one pig was often enough to last the household for a year.

Each year, all the family members participated in the matanza (sacrifice) sometime during the first few weeks of November. After the legs were packed in sea salt and hung to dry in the cool, winter air, the rest of the carcass was used to make chorizo, salchichon and morcilla sausages

JAMON SERRANO (literally ham from the sierra, or mountains) encompasses all the other types of dry-cured ham made from other breeds of pigs. Although less expensive than Jamon Iberico, it can still be quite costly outside of Spain and is usually served in thin slices as a tapa. These hams are dried for up to 18 months in sheds built high in the hills to help the curing process, which is why it became known as 'mountain ham.'



Cut above the rest

THE most expensive ham - Jamon Iberico de Bellota comes from the black Iberico pig, which is fed a diet of acorns, or bellotas, and reared on fresh mountain air until it reaches the optimum weight and is taken to be 'sacrificed.'

Iberico pigs can eat up to 10 kilos of acorns a day, so they are normally much fatter than normal swine. This allows the meat to be cured for longer - usually between two to four years - and results in a more intense flavour that is unparalleled in the ham world. The acorn diet also gives the premi-

Open arms

WHILE mass tourism gets a bad rap in congested Mallorca, 500 protestors bucked the trend to demand more refugees. Angry demonstrators complained on Tuesday that the Balearics have only accepted 52 refugees, despite a Spanish promise to welcome 17,000 to the country. The Balearics are one of the few Spanish regions that has supported absorbing more refugees.

POLICE officers on foot who witnessed a Punta Ballena purse snatching went to extraordinary lengths to catch three

thieves. The men stole a woman's bag then sped off in their getaway car. Three patrolling officers then shouted down a taxi and told the cabbie to pursue the vehicle, while radioing colleagues to set up a road block.

Boat invasion

THREE refugee boats carrying dozens of people were intercepted by Guardia Civil near Cabrera in the space of just 24 hours. Some of the arrivals were taken to Son Espases suffering from hypothermia. In all of 2016 only three boats were discovered in Balearic waters. At least 17 boats have now arrived so far in

Olympic shooter's bloody revenge

AN Olympic shooter who executed his love rival faces 22 years in prison. The skilled gunman shot a man having an affair with his wife twice with an illegally owned revolver in

Arnau MN, aged 53, is standing trial for the murder of Angel Torres, 61, next week at Palma's criminal court. In addition to the lengthy prison sentence, prosecutors are demanding €250,000 compensation be paid to the widow and daughter of the deceased.

On the morning of June 24, 2014, Arnau is accused of go-

ing to Torres' Gorli restaurant in Porto Cristo to confront him over a long-standing relationship he had with Arnau's wife.

After a brief conversation he whipped out a .38 calibre revolver and shot Torres in the chest and neck, causing massive bleeding. Torres died almost immediately. His cleaning lady found his body behind the bar shortly before 9am.

Arnau, a local mechanic, was arrested the next day. During a search of his home police found three guns, including the one used to shoot Torres. He had competed in Olympic shooting competitions and had a weapons licence.



Medieval fight

PINE trees are being axed to make way for a new gas pipeline to Palma's north-west. Residents of Son Rapinya, La Vileta and Son Puig are up in arms over the destruction of the areas' once pristine natural space.

The forest next to the La Vileta cemetery has become the first victim of the planned pipeline. Massive logging of pine trees has begun despite protests from local residents.

High voltage electricity pylons are also being erected, to the detriment of local greenery. Constructed by Red Electrica, they are considered essential to securing Palma's power supply

A letter has also been sent by residents' associations protesting the treatment of the Puigpunyet royal road. The street dates from the 13th century and has dozens of medieval buildings that are incredibly vulnerable to damage.

They have requested that the Mallorca island council declare the road a site of natural heritage to protect it from energy companies.

If this was happening during the Arab Spring then western newspapers would surely be forecasting revolution and anticipating an armed struggle.



The problem is that people rarely learn from the lessons of history and with partisan violence becoming a regular event in Europe, we have to hope that our relatively peaceful way of life is not disrupted by this dis-



New campaign calls for electric alternative

ANIMAL activists have launched a new campaign against the exploitation of horses. AnimaNaturalis are demanding the replacement of Palma's famous horsedrawn carriages with electric ones.

They have presented an official request to Palma Town Hall. In a press statement AnimaNaturalis noted that the council had unanimously approved a bill to improve the horses' wellbeing. But that was three years ago and nothing has been done.

"To this day no action has been taken and Palma's horses suffer continuous exploitation throughout the summer," the statement read.

The activist group also accused coachmen of physically abusing and punishing the animals, and "treating them merely as a means of transport."

Examples include forcing the horses to carry more passengers than is legally allowed, denying them rest breaks and proper hygiene, and making them bake in the sun with temperatures above 40 degrees.



AnimaNaturalis campaign comes amid rising concern for animals.

Last year two horses died due to negligent treatment, the group allege.

AnimaNaturalis accused police and officials of turning a blind eye to the abuse. They warned them, however, that people are becoming more and more sensitive to issues of animal abuse and the tide is changing.

Replacing horse-drawn carriages with eco-friendly electric ones is an idea gaining popularity around the world. It is now part of the election manifesto of several Mallorca parties.

A GLITZY ceremony turned into a bout of political bloodletting

It comes as the King of Spain, president of the Balearic Islands, and Mallorca's biggest hotel boss all shared a stage at the new Palacio de Congresos.

It was the grand opening of the expensive new convention centre, built by the Sol Meila hotel group which has ambitious plans to transform Palma into a global hotspot for business conventions.

Sol Melia president Gabriel Escarrer

used his speech to launch a scathing attack on Balearic president Francina Armengol and the tourist tax. He warned that increasing anti-tourist sentiment could be disastrous for Mallorca and that doubling the tax was a mistake.

Armengol's speech then became an impromtu defence of her administration. She later launched a storm of Tweets castigating Escarrer for bringing politics into the mix.

The atmosphere was already heated. Outside a large group of pro-monarchy demonstrators chanted 'Viva España!'

They denounced Catalan independence and called for the resignations of Armengol, tourism minister Barcelo, and Palma mayor Noguera.

The tense scenes played out before a who's who of Mallorcan society. High court judges, wealthy businessmen and the president of the golf federation were all in

King Felipe refused to get drawn into the debate, though he did argue that tourism is the engine of Mallorca. He used his brief speech to say the new centre made Palma a global city.

Two out of three not good


TWO out of every three islanders want to substantially limit tourist numbers according to a major poll. The Gadeso Foundation survey revealed that 67 per cent of Balearic residents want an upper limit to prevent 'unsustainable' tourism.

The other third believed that this summer was unusually busy and that mass tourism would eventually iron itself out. They called for smarter planning and better infrastructure to cope with the numbers.

Seven in 10 believe that the volume of tourists is growing each year, with just 17 per cent not noticing any change. Half blamed mass tourism for water shortages, while a third feared for public transport and health services.

Support of doubling the tourist tax next year came from 69 per cent of those polled. Supporters saw the tax as compensating for environmental destruction and putting off 'undesirable' guests.

Saturday saw a peaceful demonstration against mass tourism. But the Balearic Tourist Transport Federation denounced an apparent egg attack on half a dozen tourist buses last week



GYPSIES have been offered housing subsidies worth €1,000 per month to abandon the Son Banya slum. Palma's council has drawn up plans to bulldoze the notorious neighbourhood, which is home to numerous criminal outifts.

The city has been trying to knock down Son Banya, a largely gypsy village near the airport, for almost a decade. Plans were first approved in 2008 but residents have resolutely refused to move.

Now politicians hope the prospect of a large monthly rent subsidy will tempt poorer families to consider leaving. They could receive up to €1,000 per month depending on the number of children for a maximum of five years.

To be eligible families must have no other source of income or properties. Children must be in school and social services be allowed to regularly inspect living conditions.

For the rest of the residents, demolition day is edging closer. From October 5 bulldozers will begin dismantling the community. Police will be on hand as around 45 families will be forcibly evicted.

There are an estimated 500-600 people living in Son Banva, around 200 of them aged under 18. Families not entitled to state

> subsidies will be forced to enter the private rental market after years of living in unregulated slums. Many have expressed fear that they will be rejected by residents' associations and find it almost impossible to secure a home given skyrocketing rents.

Sterling is overall winner

PURELY by coincidence the Canadian dollar and Japanese yen were the week's least effective performers. The yen's problem was that investors began to tune out the war of words between Kin Jong Un and Donald Trump and no longer sought the yen's supposed safety.

The Loonie's handicap was a perception that the Bank of Canada would not blindly follow the lead of the US Federal Reserve in raising interest rates. Deputy Governor Timothy Lane reinforced that impression in a speech he delivered on Monday. The Canadian dollar lost one US cent on the week.

It lost four cents to the week's leading major currency, sterling. The pound continued to benefit from comments made by Bank of England officials at the end of last week, looking for an interest rate increase 'in coming months.' Investors inferred that a rate hike would be forthcoming in November or December and they hurried to close short-sterling positions.

The Australian dollar put in a below-average performance, losing two thirds of a US cent and falling by three and a quarter cents against the top performer, sterling. Australian economic data were thin on the ground and the few that did appear were not particularly helpful: house price growth slowed, vehicle sales were flat and Westpac's leading index came in slightly lower.

The Aussie's main problem was a speech by Reserve Bank of Australia governor Philip Lowe. Although he suggested that low interest rates would not be around forever, he also gave the impression that he was in no hurry to take them higher.

The Bank of England was far more helpful to sterling. The pound continued to benefit from comments made by BoE at the end of last week which led investors to believe that UK interest rates would go up before the end of the year. They have been misled by the bank in the past but this time they have taken the hints seriously.

The US dollar's biggest and most eagerly-awaited event was the Federal Reserve's monetary policy announcement on Wednesday. Although investors expected no change to the Fed's 1%-1.25% interest rate target, they did anticipate confirmation that the central bank would start running down the \$3.5 trillion stockpile of bonds that it acquired during the various rounds of quantitative easing. It was a promising beginning to the week for the NZ dollar. Until Wednesday it was making headway across the board after four weeks of steady losses.

Perplexingly, it went into reverse just as Statistics NZ revealed the economy expanded by 0.8% in the second quarter, exactly as analysts had forecast. The turnaround looked a lot like a

delayed reaction to the US Federal Reserve's policy announcement a couple of hours earlier: It will begin next month to run down the \$3.5bn bond stockpile that it accumulated during the quantitative easing programmes, thereby reducing the supply of US dollars and making them, at least theoretically, more expensive. Even then, the Kiwi managed to add half a US cent.

It lost one and a quarter cents to sterling though. The pound continued to be supported by comments made at the end of last week by Bank of England officials. They had made it look likely that the BoE would raise interest rates in November or December. The Fed did indeed say it will begin in October to allow \$10bn of those

bonds to mature every month, increasing the pace to \$50bn a month next year. It was good news for the dollar, though not good enough to prevent it losing half a cent to the euro.

Sterling was the week's overall winner, adding nearly two US cents. The story there was the same as the one at the end of the previous week: Investors have taken at face value comments by Bank of England officials that pointed to an interest rate increase in November or December.

After hawkish remarks from the Bank of England's Monetary Policy Committee last Thursday and Friday, this week was sterling's to lose. And for once, it didn't: The pound moved ahead on every front, pocketing an average gain of 1.6% against the other dozen most actively-traded currencies. Not only was sterling helped by the prospect of higher interest rates this year, it also received some support from stronger UK retail sales and a narrowing of the budget deficit.

A relatively low-profile week for the euro was spoiled by a story that the European Central Bank might consider extending the period of its asset-purchase programme because of the unwelcome strength of the currency. It contrasted unfavourably with the BoE's language and with the Federal Reserve's announcement of tighter monetary policy. The euro still managed to add half a US cent but it lost one cent to the pound.







Gold is still popular

BULLION COINS ARE AN EASY WAY TO INVEST

IN times of international trouble and dispute, investors like to head towards gold as an alternative option to traditional stocks and shares.

The precious metal has enjoyed a buoyant few months especially with the 'disagreement' between North Korea and the USA having gained 12.9 per cent so far in 2017.

The current price of €1,090 for a troy ounce of fine (24 carat) gold is only slightly down on its highest price this year but for the small investor, spot price and actual cost to purchase can be quite different.

In many ways the most sensible way of purchasing old is to buy bullion coins from reputable dealers and the larger the coin, the smaller the percentage over spot price they cost.

Countries such as Australia and South Africa which produce a great deal of gold are happy to use some of it in bullion coins in order to obtain foreign currency and the Kangaroo and Krugerrand amongst other gold coins are easily traded as well as being VAT free.

Investors are advised to keep well away from gold proof coins as although they are sold with pre-announced issue limits, they are sold at large percentages over spot and with so many being issued by literally hundreds of countries worldwide, the chance of a profit is very

There are other precious metal coins available, particularly platinum and silver but neither has the allure and general investment fol-

In addition to coins, it is possible to invest in bullion bars which have no legal tender status and may, in some countries be subject to

Spain does not produce any gold bullion coins and the only regularly produced coins from European Union countries are from France

and the United Kingdom.

Whilst it is attractive to regard jewellery as an investment, it is worth noting that modern jewellery tends to be sold at up to 300 per cent more than spot, is generally made from a mix of gold and a second metal in order to add strength and also attracts VAT.

Jewellery is certainly an attractive way of owning precious metal but as an investment is not as certain as bullion coins which are portable and easily obtained, but like all investments, gold prices can go down as well as up.

Ryanair tries to sort out mess

SPEAKING at the Annual General Meeting of Ryanair in Dublin, Michael O'Leary CEO admitted that the cancellation of flights would cost the airline at least €25 mil-

He accepted that the problem was one caused within the airline as pilots tried to take 12 months of holidays in nine months due to an enforced change in the leave year and sympathised with passengers who had been af-

The company is trying to persuade pilots to give up one week of their holiday in exchange for a cash payment which could be as much as €12,000 but both they and first officers are trying to hold out for new contracts and better condi-

BRITISH BANKS TO CHECK IMMIGRATION STATUS New law effective January

ALTHOUGH legislation has existed since 2016, it will not be until January 2018 that banks will be required to check on the immigration status of cus-

The decision has been made in order to try to identify whether bank customers are resident in the UK legally or if they have either overstayed their visas or absconded from immigration

Information on the identities of known persons due for deportation from the UK will be supplied by not for profit organisation Cifas to the banks who will then be required to close or freeze accounts for anyone appearing on the lists.

As Cifas is primarily an anti-fraud and money-laundering operation and as banks are likely to have to check up to 70 million accounts each quarter, it is suggested by observers that this may not be the best way to police the system.

With such a large number of accounts to check, the fear is that the banks and Home Office which will also supply information could make mis-

takes, leading to perfectly honest customers having their accounts frozen, especially as the banks are likely to err on the side of caution in order to ensure that they are not penalised.

Chief Executive of the Joint Council for the Welfare of Immigrants Satbir Singh told The Guardian: "The government's own record shows that it cannot be trusted even to implement this system properly.

"Immigration status is very complex, and the Home Office consistently gives out incorrect information and guidance.

This crackdown which seems more likely to affect those with common ethnic names or multiple accounts, may go some way to stopping some fake accounts, but with advance notice, anyone who is illegally in Britain will have time to close their bank accounts and remove their cash.

Indeed much of the 'black economy' operates with cash and sees those without papers working for third parties cash in hand.

The government however also plans to crack down on landlords and employers who do not obtain proper documentation from those who have no right to be living or working in the UK.

It is to be hoped that those expatriates living in Spain but with bank accounts in the UK will not fall foul of this new investigative procedure, although possession of a UK passport should go a long way to proving right of abode in the UK and Spain.

Spain's two top brands

IN an international review of the value of brands, the leader once again is Apple with a declared worth of €154.65 billion.

There are just two Spanish brands in the top 100, Inditex, owner of Zara comes in at number 24 with a value of €15.6 billion although it still sits one place behind Scandinavian competitor H&M.

The other Spanish success is the Santander banking group which sits in 68th place with a value of just €5.6 billion although it is the 10th most valuable group in finance and is beaten by global brands such as American Express and Visa.

Sky TV now online

WHILST many English speaking residents in Spain have been eager to learn details of the new Sky online package, it now appears to be cheap but not very inclusive.

The Spanish service is now available without contract at a cost of €10 per month with the first month free and a box costing €25.

The drawback is that there will only be 12 local pay-TV channels included in the package all broadcast in Spanish plus a limited number of 'box

Channels supplied with this new service include Comedy Central, Nickelodeon, Disney's XD and Disney Junior, Syfy, TNT, TCM and Fox which will allow subscribers access to The Walking Dead and Big Bang

Due to licensing arrangements, there is no offer of Sky Sports or Sky Movies and although inexpensive, the whole package will have to compete with Amazon, HBO and Netflix as well as the English-speaking channels supplied unofficially via VPN or IPTV.

Spanish government has not spent EU youth grants

CRITICS of the Spanish government claim that they are running the risking of further alienating unemployed under 25s even though the EU had granted €1.9 billion.

Despite the fact that the Spanish economy is recovering more quickly than most of the eurozone, the huge number of young people still unemployed is close to 40 per cent and many who do have jobs have short term contracts which pay badly.

The European Union youth jobs and employment programme was launched in 2014 but because Spain was required to spend the money first and then reclaim, it was initially reluctant to spend more money as it was being threatened with fines if it didn't reduce the public

Now with the economy in a much happier state, it has to spend €1 billion by the end of 2017 and the balance in 2018 and opponents suggest that the government doesn't have a proper plan in place and therefore is sponsoring useless training which youngsters only apply for because they are bored.

If this suggestion is based on fact, then there is a distinct possibility that the European Union will refuse to refund the money spent as it will be reviewing the effectiveness of the training programmes put into place.

There was some thought of using the funds to 'top up' low youth salaries, but this may not be acceptable under EU budgetary guidelines.

Driving classic cars

I CLASSIC CARS: Governed by the same rules as normal vehicles.

A NUMBER of classic car owners and associations have asked about the laws that refer specifically to this type of vehicle and what provisions the drivers must make when driving on Spanish

Royal Decree 1247/1995, deals with the reglamento de vehículos históricos, rules for historic vehicles, or classic cars, under article 10 of the Normas de circulación.

First and foremost, unless rules are specifically in place for this type of vehicle, classic cars are governed by the same laws and rules as normal vehicles, including the requirement of liability insurance.

The rules relating to the technical inspection and registration are also applicable, as per normal vehicles. The period of the technical inspection also remains the same, unless otherwise indicated in the official report.

Those vehicles which, on account of their age or constructive characteristics, do not have lights or indicators as are normally required by law, are not allowed to travel between sunset and sunrise, or in circumstances which would normally require the use of these lights and indicators.

Historic vehicles that are not able to exceed the speed of 40 kilometres per hour should drive on the shoulder, if practicable, or, alternatively, as close as possible to the right outside edge of the roadway, except when overtaking or turning left, manoeuvres which may force other drivers to abruptly change the direction or speed of their vehicles. Historic vehicles are not allowed on the motorway if they are unable to reach a speed of at least 60 kilometres per hour.

The Dirección General de Tráfico also reserves the right to prohibit classic cars on certain dates and routes, if they are not able to exceed the speed of 80 kilometres per hour.

As for situations when classic cars can travel on the roads as a group, Annex II of the Reglamento General de Circulación, article 32 of section 3 details Participación de vehículos históricos and refers to group activities.

Where are his title deeds?

How can I find the title deeds for my apartment in Alcudia, Mallorca? We left them with Halifax Bank España, with whom we had a mortgage. This was paid off several years ago but we let the

bank hold the deeds for us. As far as I can ascertain the branches in Mallorca have now closed, leaving us with no one to con-

PC (Baleares)

When you purchased your flat, you signed the deed at a Spanish Notary, at the same time you signed the mortgage deed.

This Notary has your original title deed in his computer. The bank has an authorised copy. The



piece of paper is not important. Go to the Notary and get an authorised copy of your deed. Be alert. Even if your mort-

gage is paid, it is quite possible that the bank has not officially cancelled it in the Property Registry.

The Notary or your lawyer can check on this. You might need to contact Halifax Lloyds Bank to find out. Try calling 902 024 365.



Allegedly Puigdemont can be linked to dodgy deals and contracts in Girona whose mayor he was before being called to greater things in Barcelona.

Puigdemont, incidentally, was never elected president but took over when CUP demanded Artur Mas's head in exchange for their votes in the 2015 regional elections.

Much of CUP's disapproval of Mas resided in his links to the demonstrably corrupt Pujol governments. Now it turns out that Puigdemont isn't exactly lilywhite himself and allowed questionable contract procedures to continue. Hardly heinous but not the best image for someone who enjoys throwing the first stone where corruption is concerned

Grammar lesson

JUNCKER said it loud and clear and not for the first time: if Cataluña leaves

Spectre from the past

Spain it leaves the European Union. Asked if the EU would recognise an independent Cataluña as a country he replied that it would if that were the outcome of a legal referendum.

Jubilant secessionists threw their Catalan-Phrygian caps in the air before Juncker got to the end of the sentence and were crestfallen when they learnt that the EU president had used the conditional tense and the adjective 'legal.'

The separatists have only even listened to what they wanted to hear and

never did manage to get the message sent by the poor turnout for the November 9 mini-referendum in 2014 and the discouraging 2015 regional elections.

The snowball and the avalanche

EIGHT of the 12 ministers in Rajoy's first government were lawyers and two - including the vice-president Soraya Saenz de Santamaria - were State

lawyers. Dolores de Cospedal, Saenz de Santamaria's eternal rival who is also the Partido Popular's Secretary General and Defence minister in the present government, is another.

They are the legal representatives of state and public bodies, possessing a prestigious qualification requiring years of study. Rajoy was Spain's youngest ever Property Registrar - another plum post - at the age of 23.

Rajoy's government knows the law inside out and sheltering behind the legal system and the courts is its habitual response to corruption scandals and Catalan independence.

Snowballs become avalanches and Catalan independence is enveloping Spanish politics in a whiteout that will not clear whether or not the referendum is eventually held and whatever its outcome.

The snowball that Mariano Rajoy's government has ducked time and time again is hitting home and it's full of stones. But instead of reacting with an 'Ouch!' and offering to talk about it, Rajoy remained calm and warned the

snowball-throwers that they must face the legal consequences.

It didn't work when the Catalan separatists began baying during Rajoy's first term. It has produced disastrous results in the second and no-one, let alone Rajoy and his legal eagles, knows where it is leading to now.

Back to basics

PODEMOS and the small parties under its umbrella are planning a national assembly that will back separatism throughout Spain.

Presumably that will make kingdoms of Valencia, Navarra, Aragon and Castillas with Andalucia reverting to a caliphate. Not so good, though, for Cataluña in the event of a Catflap (Cat-exit, gettit?) as it would be reduced to the vastly inferior status of a measly county.

Venezuelan dictator Nicolas Maduro has expressed his support for the Catalan Proces towards independence. With friends like that who needs an enema, as the poet once said.

Wasp stings

What are the symptoms of a wasp sting?

When you are stung by a wasp on your skin, the area infected will become inflamed and red with a noticeable centre where the sting occurred. In general the reaction is contained to where you are stung, however some people can have reactions all over their body.

Can they be dangerous?

Wasp stings tend to hurt, but are not often dangerous. In some cases, especially with people who are allergic to them, the reaction can be much more severe and can cause death.

How can you tell if you are having an allergic reaction to a sting?

Normally when a person is stung by a wasp

the reaction is contained to the area they were stung. However if a person feels generally unwell, begins to sweat, has other skin lesions appear on their body, swollen lips or face, difficulties breathing or loss of consciousness and chest pains, among other things, then it is certainly an allergic reaction.

What should I do if I get stung?

Normally if it only causes a reaction on the skin you don't need to see a doctor. However if the area stung becomes infected or you notice an allergic reaction then immediately go to accident and emergencies where you will be prescribed with treatments which can include anti-inflammatories, corticoids or maybe even antibiotics.

ALTHOUGH Mallorca has cause to call itself a pretty island, there is only one village, Fornalutx which has been named as one of the prettiest villages in Spain.



A TOAST TO GOOD FOOD. **GOOD WINE** AND GOOD **FRIENDS**



HAVE always been a great lover of 'free pouring' - the absence of using fixed measures of alcohol.

Even though it was technically against the law, it was well practised in my restaurants in the UK. It must have been the Spanish influence even all those years ago. But even with this method it was possible to pour exactly the same measure into each glass. Apart from alcohol, pubs and restaurants started to use legally (or voluntarily) measure marks on the wine

But most bars and restaurants here free pour without such guidelines, which leads to differences that are quite noticeable.

Last week I had occasion to be in three different establishments of varying standard. One was a place I pop into quite often. A family run eatery of few tables and fewer

customers, but a warm welcome and a decent glass of Rosé, well chilled but the measure is half as much again as I would pour. They must be getting four glasses out of the bottle at the most: and at €3.95 a glass they are selling the bottle of wine for €15. Makes sense even if it looks generous.

The second place was a restaurant that is very busy and whose prices are quite high. A glass of red wine from Ribera del Duero (the price I do not know as I was being invited - but I imagine around the €5 mark) came in a modern glass with a wider base and a curved side, the sort of glass used by most upmarket establish-



Too little.

I tell my staff to fill the glass to just above the curve, which gives five good glasses from the bottle. But on this occasion the measure was below the curve which would give the house six glasses to the bottle. Making a bottle of house wine worth around €30 a bottle. which I am sure we would all say is too much.

However I did ask them to fill it to above the curve which they did without question.

The third place was a very modern tapas/raciones/and restaurant operation in Marbella. Very professionally run. We had a bottle of wine which was their house



Perfect.

wine at €21 from Castillo de Mancha, which wasn't particularly good. The red wine by the glass was pleasant enough and at €3.50 a glass was good value. The measures poured were also correct.

Now dear reader, you may have got down to the bottom of this article and ask if there is a point to it? Well, my point is that whatever price you charge, or quantity you give, the chances are it is normally more expensive to drink wine by the glass than the bottle.

This last place was charging less for drinking by the glass than the bottle. White by the glass at €3 means €15 a bottle, red at €3.50 means €17 for the bottle. With the former being €21 a bottle and the latter €25 it's obvious which makes more sense to the



LTHOUGH it is easier to purchase citizenship in the smaller European Union states such as Cyprus and Malta, Spain also offers succour to wealthy foreign-

Just four years ago, the Spanish government introduced legislation to grant residency permits (known as Golden Visas) to foreign nationals who were either prepared to invest large amounts of money or were highly qualified in professions that Spain needed.

Since that time, after what was a relatively slow start, the number of Chinese and Russians in particular taking advantage of this option has actually increased with investment exceeding €1.5 billion

This investment has been achieved with some significant 'tweaking' of the initial legislation in order to make inward investment more attractive although there are still a large number of quite different and bureaucratic rules that need to be followed, in some cases depending on your country of birth.

As Spain continues to be one of the stronger economies in the eurozone more and more wealthy migrants are likely to settle in the country, especially as the government has made investment so





Autumn gardening - Mediterranean style

GRAEME TYRRELL

UNLIKE northern European regions, autumn is a busy time to clean up the garden and start planting the winter and spring annuals, flowering perennials, herbs and vegetables.

It is the best time to set out new garden designs to allow new trees and shrubs to get established with the winter rains and cooler weather benefiting them to grow stronger before the onset of the next hot, dry summer season. Pruning back spent flowers and scraggly growth can also be done now.

Flowering annuals and perennials to plant now include sweet alyssum, calendula, Canterbury bells, English daisy, African daisy, Iceland poppy, larkspur, lobelia, pansy, annual phlox,

ranunculus, stock, sweet pea. sweet william, viola, primroses. cyclamen, and bulbs such as daffodils and jonquils. Having flowers always brightens up the home garden, balcony or terrace and take up only a small area whether in pots, planter boxes or the garden.

Vegetables to plant now include beet, bok choy, broccoli, brussels sprouts, carrot, cabbage, cauliflower, celery, endive, garlic, kale, kohlrabi, leek, head and leaf lettuce, onion, pea, radish, spinach, snow peas, Swiss chard and turnip. There is nothing like your own fresh vegetables if you have the time and space.

Most herbs are planted at this time but lavender. marjoram, oregano, sage, rosemary, tarragon, thyme, parsley, basil, chives, mints, dill, coriander, are all favourites that have a variety of differ-

ent forms to add even greater interest to the garden and the kitchen meals. Herbs can be

grown near or even in the kitchen where there is sufficient light so that they can be easy to gather when needed.

The most successful time to plant most trees and shrubs is just after the first good rains have moistened the soil. Add compost in proportion to the needs of the plants' requirements to do their best. Integrate the compost into the natural soil through cultivation.

It is well worth the effort to prepare the soil to allow the plants to have a good start in their new location and the compost will give better water retention to help the soil continue to provide nutrients and moisture more evenly for many years. Mulching the plants is not essential until before the hot weather returns in spring.

I prefer to leave the soil free of mulch over winter in case of water logging and introduction of fungal problems to the soil over the

Plants that have flowered over summer but are now finishing their flowering should be clipped back where necessary and tidied

It is not a good time for severe pruning as large cuts can allow entry of diseases in large wounds on trees and shrubs while the weather is still warm and humid. It is better to just use clippers and leave the saw in the shed except for dead limbs and fall-

Autumn is a busy time in the garden while the days are still long and warm. The works will pay off with the establishment of a wonderful garden over winter and allow the blossoming in spring and the garden will have gained hardiness for the next summer's heat and dryness. En-

Pepper your garden with style

BELL PEPPERS are one of the staple ingredients of Spanish cooking and can be found in all manner of traditional dishes such as gazpacho, pisto and pimientos rellenos.

While easy enough to locate in the supermarket or local fruteria, nothing quite beats the taste of homegrown peppers and plucking them from your garden also ensures that they are grown free from any unnecessary sprays and pesticides.

Peppers thrive most during warm weather, but heat waves can cause the plants to wilt so it is best to grow them in temperate months during early autumn or late spring.

They also like well-

drained soil as their roots will rot if they sit in water for too long. With that being said, peppers still require a lot of watering during dry spells as the plants could produce bitter-tasting fruit

If you buy pepper seedlings from a nursery instead of planting the seeds from scratch, check that

otherwise.

they have strong stems and healthy green leaves. Also avoid the plants that already have flowers or fruit as they will not produce as well once replanted in the gar-

Finally, always cut peppers from the plant instead of pulling them off as this can damage the stem and halt fruit production.

used to travel safely as soon as possible when they are young. I would not encourage holding puppies on the lap, this way you are training the puppy that this is the place to travel. As a dog gets bigger he is put in the back of the car and will

not like the idea which results in barking and jumping. This then results in owners shouting and turning around, thus being inattentive to their driving

Many owners think that it is a good idea to let dogs have their

heads hanging out of the window of the car whilst travelling. This is dangerous for the dog and can cause many health problems to the eyes and to the nose. Never let your dog hang his head out of the window. Many a dog has jumped out of a travelling car through the window, resulting in death.

In many parts of Europe, it is an offence to allow dogs to be loose or unsecured in cars and can be very costly in fines.

A dog should never be left in a car during hot weather for longer than a few minutes. Owners should park in shaded areas, keeping in mind that the sun moves. Even if the windows are left open the temperature can reach 35 degrees in a few minutes. Dogs can suffer from heatstroke within 10 minutes or

SPAIN'S crew for the Volvo Ocean Race has been announced. The epic round the world sail departs from Alicante port for the fourth time in its history next month.

Sponsored by Mapfre, the Spanish team is skippered by Xabi Fernandez. The Olympic Gold medallist has four Volvo Ocean Races to his name and is one of the most decorated sailors in Spanish history.

In charge of navigation will be veteran sailor Joan Vila who, at 55, is returning from a 15-year hiatus from the sport.

Other crew members include Tamara Echegoyen, Louis Sinclair, Rob Greenhalgh, and Sophie Ciszek.

Expectations are high for Mapfre after the team set a new world record in the qualifying stages. But the real grind begins on October 22 when they set sail for Lisbon before racing down the west

African coast and then onto Australia.

They will spend around nine months at sea before finishing in Holland next June. Team manager Pedro Campos has said that solidarity and spirit will be crucial to their success.

The winning crew has been competing successfully with a few changes for six years now and during that time has seen it either winning the title outright or sharing it with Quantum Racing, so the fact that Platoon was able to split the two perennial winners this year may be very significant for the future.

67 metres of innovation

ITALIAN company Benetti's full custom M/Y Seasense is a decidedly original yacht according to its makers when it was unveiled at the Monaco Yacht Show this week.

Its unusual features include the Benetti Beach Concept and the indoor-outdoor veranda, both on the Main Deck. The interiors, on the other hand, are characterised by the use of colour as a décor element and by over 100 different materials.

The 67-metre full custom superyacht, built at Benetti's Livorno shipyard, has a steel hull and an aluminium superstructure. The exterior design is by Dutch designer Cor D Rover, working with Benetti for the first time, who has successfully interpreted the owner's ideas

The designer's personal touch can be seen in many of the boat's features, not least the high, narrow vertical windows along the side walls, as well as in what he has termed the Benetti Beach Concept, the area in the stern section of the main deck with a swimming pool (10x4metres) that can be covered with carbon fibre and teak planks and converted into a basketball

The interior is the epitome of luxury and was designed by Los Angeles-based design

The two Caterpillar engines deliver a top speed of 15.5 knots, while the yacht's range stands at around 5,000 nautical miles at a cruising speed of 12 knots.

British Mini versus

hard Brexit

A HARD Brexit could see BMW renege on a pledge to build its new electric Mini in the UK. Harald Kruger, chairman of the German giant. warned that if there was no Brexit deal then production of the hotly-anticipated new car could easily be shifted to the Netherlands.

Over summer BMW said plans to mass produce the electric Mini at its Oxford factory would go ahead despite the Brexit complication.

A BRITISH billionaire is plotting to resurrect the iconic Land Rover Defender. Jim Ratcliffe, CEO of chemical company Ineos, will invest a whopping €700 million in the ambitious

The last Defender was produced in 2016. But Ratcliffe wants to bring back the 68-yearold original. It will be a direct replica of the original design, with modern performance and safety tweaks.

Oddly, the design isn't trademarked in the UK, though it is in other countries. Ratcliffe wants to produce 25,000 Defenders a year from 2020. He is currently seeking permission to build in the UK, though German factories are also being consid-

But as a 'hard Brexit,' whereby Britain would revert to default World Trade Organisation (WTO) import/export tar-

iffs, looks increasingly likely, BMW has backtracked.

"BMW can't invest in a future if you don't have any free trade agreements,"he told The Times.

At present it is tariff-free between the UK and EU countries. A reversion to WTO standards would estab-

> lish a 4.5 per cent duty on parts and 10 per cent duty on cars shifting across the new border.

> BMW isn't the only company worried about a lack of progress in negotiations. At the outset, the British government was warned by motoring leaders that the industry

needed to know where it stood quickly.

Jaguar CEO Ralf Speth reportedly had a heated exchange with British Prime Minister Theresa May during a Downing Street summit.

The firm has since revealed that it has invested in a backup factory in Slovakia as a

Hybrid hypocrisy

HYBRIDS may actually pump out higher emissions into the atmosphere than diesel engines. New analysis from The Miles Consultancy (TMC) found that plug-in hybrid electric vehicles gave out CO2 emissions of 168g/km, compared to 159g/km for diesels.

The report also questioned the efficiency of hybrids. It

found that many drivers, especially in the transport industry, relied far more on petrol or diesel, preferring fuel to charging up the battery.

TMC concluded that companies are actually increasing their fuel bills, despite labouring under the impression that hybrids were greener and more efficient.

Hybrids were only cost-effective when the battery was charged daily, the report said. Standard hybrids were found to be much better than plug-in va-

cost around €40,000 new. They may face competition from Jaguar Land Rover itself. The manufacturer is reportedly toying with the idea of a sleek, modern Defender due sometime before 2020.

Meanwhile the Defender's cousin, the Discovery, has been making a name for itself Down Under. In a filmed feat of strength, a Discovery fitted with a giant 3.0 litre turbo diesel engine with 254bhp managed to tow a train weighing 121 tons and measuring 328 feet.




