

Law and order Nightclub boss had 'private army'

#### By Matthew Elliott

Clubland king Tolo Cursach wielded near total control of Palma's Local Police and even had a paramedic unit doing his bidding, a court has heard.

Cursach, the millionaire nightclub boss on trial for murder, extortion, drug trafficking and racketeering, allegedly ordered police minions to raid his competitors' clubs and even falsify crimes.

One witness told how he opened a restaurant near the Megapark, the jewel in Cursach's clubbing empire. Within days they were subject to multiple raids from Local Police.

During a staff dinner, 10 police vans blockaded the premises and a dozen heavily armed officers stormed in. They stripped the owner naked twice, turned the place upside down, and accused him of dealing drugs.

They found nothing illegal ex-

cept the presence of a 17-yearold boy eating with his parents. The place was shut down for 'providing erotic entertainment to children.'

The court also heard that, whenever there was violence or serious injury at one of Cursach's clubs, a special ambulance would be dispatched to the scene. Subsequent medical reports would omit the club to protect its reputation. Former Popular Party president in Palma, Jose Maria Rodriquez, also had a bad week in court. The top politician was accused by yet another prostitute of

SPANISH Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy insists he will impose direct rule on Cataluña in three days unless Carles Puigdemont withdraws his independence declaration.

While addressing the Spanish government on Wednesday, Rajoy asked the Catalan leader to clarify whether he announced a split from Spain during his earlier address to the Catalan Parliament.

It comes after Puigdemont fudged his speech when he put a halt on the announcement to leave room for "dialogue" with Spain.

He vowed to follow through with the wishes of his people to make Cataluña an independent state but then immediately turned back on himself, stating he wanted to resolve the conflict in "a calm and agreed manner."

It was reported that Donald Tusk, the president of the European Council, stepped in at the 13th hour to appeal for Cataluña to begin talks with the Spanish government.

Rajoy accused Puigdemont of having created "deliberate confusion" adding that if an

# Monarch flights to end

THE Association of British Travel Agents (ABTA) has said air fares should rise to fund the full repatriation of passengers in the event of an airline collapse.

It comes as the Monarch flight repatriation programme will end soon.

Monarch went into administration on October 2 when almost 2,000 employees lost their jobs.

The government announced that all 110,000 passengers with Monarch Airlines tickets up to October 15 would be returned to the UK free-of-charge in UK's biggest peacetime repatriation.

But customers abroad who are scheduled to fly back to the UK after Sunday. October 15 will need to make their own arrangements unless they are ATOL protected.



### SPANISH FACTS OF LIFE...32

The harvest has officially started with October a busy time of year for those in Spain's olive industry, Kat Ashton reports.



SPAIN grows almost 300 varieties of olives and each tree produces between 15-20 kilos in its lifetime. The most common national olive is the Manzanilla, favoured by farmers as it's one of the easiest to pluck from the tree, and often sold stuffed with garlic or pimiento paste.

Other popular types include the Gordal, a large, robust olive ideal for stuffing, the Hojiblanca, with a thicker skin producing a sharper bite, and the Cacereña; a fruity, milder variety ideal for anyone trying olives for the first time.

Green and black olives actually grow on the same tree they naturally turn darker as they ripen - although some farmers cure their olives in brine to turn them black faster.

Andalucia is the world's largest olive-growing region and produces more than 900,000 tonnes annually. It is also one of the few places where the fruit is still picked by hand so the olives can be sold to be eaten whole.

This labour is time-consuming and an expensive dilemma but farmers have yet to come up with a faster method that doesn't damage their crop.

Most other regions grow olives only for oil production so don't mind if they come off the tree a bit bruised. Farm workers either rake bruised olives, and those they have shaken from trees with a stick, into baskets.

# Black Friday Xmas boost

LAST year's squabbling over when Palma's Christmas lights are switched on has been nipped in the bud. The date has been set for Thursday November 23, with the council refusing to get dragged down into a debate with local retailers.

They wanted the grand switching on ceremony to coincide with Black Friday, November 24, which is the world's biggest sales event, with prices slashed online and in city centres.

Last winter the council postponed the lights to the week after Black Friday, ostensibly for security reasons. Police reckoned there might be too many people in the city centre if both events ran simultaneously.

In a compromise for this winter, the lights will already be on by the time Black Friday rolls around. Shoppers rushing around for huge deals will do so in a festive atmosphere, which benefits retailers.

# Holiday from hell Brit tourist in villa scam shock

A BRITISH tourist has revealed how she and her family were subjected to a Mallorca holiday scam. Jayne Morris, a hairdresser from Oxford, claims to have lost more than €2,500 to scammers after using the HomeAway website to book a villa on the island.

Almost her entire family, including her husband, son, daughterin-law, two grandchildren, and her 78-year-old father, travelled to Mallorca expecting their dream holiday.

Morris, aged 50, told British newspaper, *The Sun*, that when they arrived at the plush villa in late August, the owners claimed not to have received any payment.

The Brit, however, had already forked out  $\in 2,584$  to a bank account months prior. The scammers had apparently hacked into the villa owner's account and began corresponding with Mrs Morris.

They offered her a 15 per cent discount for early payment. They even kept up the charade by discussing bedding options with her. Upon arrival in Mallorca, the villa owners were still expecting more than  $\in$  3,000.

As Mrs Morris made the payment using international facility Transferwise, she is not entitled to any recourse from her British bank. She and her family spent two nights at the villa before paying more than  $\leq 4,000$  to rent a new one when they were asked to leave.

"It was the worst holiday I've ever been on", she told *The Sun*. A HomeAway spokesperson said "Fraud is a very rare occurrence on our websites," describing it as "a very rare case of phishing where a criminal took over an owner's account and communicated with the holidaymaker."



# Tape sparks media storm

# Almond apocalypse

# Million plus trees infected with deadly disease

AT least one million almond trees have been infected with a deadly tree disease.

A devastating report from scientist Eduardo Moralejo estimates that 150,000 Mallorcan almond trees have died in the past decade alone from the Xylella fastidiosa bacterium.

His 'conservative projection' is that between 800,000 and 950,000 trees are currently infected with the pathogen. Moralejo was a voice in the wilderness when he first sounded the alarm over Xylella fastidiosa back in 2010.

Today the threat posed by the disease to Mallorca's agricultural sector is common knowledge.

But while olive farmers rejoiced at the EU's decision not to cull countless olive trees to stop the spread of the disease, the situation for almond growers is far more precarious.

In his latest report, Moralejo once again turns the tables on conventional wisdom. He claims the disease has been present on Mallorca for two decades and was not brought over from

Italy in 2010, as is often thought.

He presented evidence to the Mediterranean Institute for Advanced Studies (IMEDIA), based on Mallorca, that this strain actually came directly from California.

At present the disease has only been officially identified in 126 almond trees, 50 per cent of the samples taken. Moralejo believes that at least 70 per cent of trees are infected, which translates to a figure above one million.

Perhaps most alarmingly, he warns that the virus could experience a genetic mutation which enables it to transmit easily between almond and olive, vine and fig trees. This would be a "qualitative leap in the spread of the epidemic across the Balearic Islands", he said.

# Slag scandal has legs

FIVE months after Mallorca Blue urged an investigation into the melted plastics and slag found at Palma port, the green group has found success. The Balearic ministry of the environment has given the Port Authority and construction company Tirme 15 days to prove their innocence.

Both entities are accused of using illegal materials during the ongoing expansion of Palma Port. Plastic particles and slag from the Son Reus incinerator have been found in nearby bathing waters.

Tirme and the Port Authority both claim to have followed regulations to the letter. Expansion of the port has been postponed while Mallorca Blue's allegations are investigated.

If found guilty the two bodies face a monstrous fine. Mallorca Blue have described the use of slag near bathing water as perhaps the island's greatest ever environmental scandal.

# Protest is marred by bloodshed

VIOLENCE marred a pro-Spanish unity demonstration that drew an estimated 6,000 people to the streets of Palma. A woman was struck in the face with a rock as tensions in Cataluña drifted across the Mediterranean to Mallorca.

On Saturday thousands of protestors gathered in Placa d'Espanya with Spanish flags. They voiced support for the Guardia Civil and the inclusion of independence-leaning Cataluña in Spain.

The march coincided with other pro-unity rallies in Spain's largest cities, including Barcelona.

Though largely peaceful, Palma's rally was marred by several violent incidents.

One woman who shouted 'fascists' at the demonstrators had a rock flung at her face. The self-described anarchist talking to television cameras while covered in blood quickly became the defining image of the march on social media.

In another case a stand promoting Catalan independence was destroyed by protestors shouting "This is the Balearics, not Cataluña", on major shopping street Sant Miquel. The owner was abused and spat at. Other clashes were reported during the day.

Protestors also carried images of the King of Spain and called for Carles Puigdemont, president of the Catalan Generalitat, to be jailed for treason.

The march came roughly one week after thousands poured into the streets of Palma in support of the Catalan referendum, with some calling for Mallorcan independence.

# OUR VIEW Compromise is needed

THERE was a major irony that yesterday (Thursday) was El Dia de la Hispanidad (National Day) here in Spain whilst the country seems to be more divided than ever.

October 12 is dedicated to Christopher Columbus, but radicals in Barcelona have been calling for the iconic statue built in 1888 that stands at the bottom of La Rambla to be treated the same way as statues of former Iraqi President Saddam Hussein by pulling it down.

Another important celebration which falls on the same date is the Feast of Our Lady of Pilar who happens to be the Patroness of both Spain and the Guardia Civil which may also be a cause for discomfort in Cataluña following recent events.

Modern Spain is at a crossroads and the next weeks and months will determine whether the bitter split between those who want Cataluña to become an independent state and King Felipe VI and the government supported by PSOE can possibly be repaired.

A logical compromise could be for the Spanish government to offer Cataluña the opportunity to hold a nonbinding referendum under different terms which would be overseen by Spain which would allow for all parties to fairly judge the wishes of the people.

It's unlikely to happen this way but without compromise on both sides, the schism will only widen.

# How not to be a jihadi Alleged terrorist's spy claim mocked

AN alleged jihadi accused of plotting a terrorist attack in Spain has claimed in court that he works for the Spanish intelligence services. Mohamed Harrak al Loutah, of Son Gotleu, Palma, denied being a member of Daesh and said he worked with police and spies to get information on real terrorists.

Harrak, a 28-year-old Moroccan national, is on trial in Palma. He is facing 10 years if convicted of helping to recruit jihadis on behalf of the Daesh terror group and plotting an attack in Spain.

WhatsApp messages showing him communicating with people in Iraq and Syria were presented to the court. In them Harrak talks of Al-Andalus, and discusses replicating a suicide bomb attack in Turkey and Spain.

Yet Harrak claims to have been working on behalf of the Guardia Civil and an intelligence officer codenamed 'Angel'. His role was to develop friendships with radicalised suspects. He has emails he sent to the CNI, Spain's intelligence services, in which they thank him for his 'information'. Far from training to join Daesh, Harrak told the court he wanted to join the Spanish Foreign Legion

Police investigators have dismissed all of his claims as nonsense. They believe his emails to the CNI were simply an attempt to cover his tracks and deny any collaboration with the Guardia Civil.



# **Politics causing trouble**

#### EUR weekly currency update

Sterling and the euro were both troubled by politics. The euro's problem was an independence referendum in Spain's Cataluña region. Prime minister Marian Rajoy labelled it 'illegal' and sent in the police to prevent voters casting their ballot. There were hundreds of injuries. Sterling's headache was a flare-up in the struggle for control of the ruling Conservative party, particularly the announcement of an overt campaign to remove the prime minister. Investors were readier to ignore a regional spat in Spain than they were to overlook another outbreak of instability in Britain.

The economic data also tended to favour the euro. The purchasing managers' index readings from Euroland, which track private sector activity, were stronger than those from the UK and it was confirmed that Britain's economy expanded by just 0.3% in the second quarter. On the week the euro lost three quarters of a US cent and added two cents against the weakest performer, sterling.

#### USD weekly currency update

A successful week for the dollar left it ahead of the other major currencies, strengthening by an average of 0.7%. It took three quarters of a cent off the euro and lost two cents to the pound, which was at the back of the field. The US economic data played a part in the dollar's progress. Most came in ahead of forecast and the purchasing man-

# agers' index readings were stronger than those from Britain and Euroland.

The dollar was also helped by political travails in the €Z and the UK which lessened the appeal of the euro and the pound. In Spain an unsanctioned referendum on independence for Cataluña provoked prime minister Mariano Rajoy into flooding the region with riot police. There were hundreds of casualties. In Britain prime minister Theresa May's position is being challenged by her own party following an unfortunate appearance at the Conservative conference.

#### CAD weekly currency update

At best it was an average week for the Canadian dollar, which lost one US cent. It was handicapped by the domestic economic data, most of which looked unimpressive in comparison with those from the States. The Canadian economy stalled in July, with zero growth, and the trade deficit widened in August as exports fell and imports rose.

Average week or not, the Loonie picked up more than two cents from the week's biggest loser, Sterling. The pound's problems were twofold; mediocre ecostats and messy politics. The UK purchasing managers' index readings, a barometer of private sector business activity, showed only modest growth in manufacturing and services and a slowdown in construction. The political prob-

lem was a power struggle for control of the ruling Conservative party. A faction of the party is trying to unseat the prime minister. Investors do not welcome another source of uncertainty.

#### AUD weekly currency update

It was a less than successful week for the Aussie, which weakened by an average of -0.3% against the other dozen most actively-traded currencies and lost four-fifths of a US cent. The Australian economic data did not help its case and nor did the Reserve Bank of Australia. There was a markedly negative reaction to the retail sales figures for August, which showed a -0.6% fall instead of the forecast 0.3% increase. And the RBA statement appeared to banish any idea of an interest rate increase.

It was an even less successful week for sterling. The pound was way out at the back of the field, losing two and a third Australian cents. The mediocre UK economic data played a part but the main damage was another outbreak of political instability. Following an unfortunate appearance at the Conservative party conference prime minister Theresa May is now under fire from her own side.

#### NZD weekly currency update

The NZ dollar performed almost as badly as sterling. The pound's convincingly dismal showing ensured it was at the back of the field but the Kiwi was only a cent and a half ahead of it in penultimate position, down by more than one US cent. There were only two worthwhile NZ ecostats and they were unhelpful. Business confidence faded in the third quarter from 18% to 5% and the fortnightly GDT milk price index was down by -2.4%. Political uncertainty continues to be a handicap for the Kiwi: there is still no word on the shape of the coalition government following the general election.

It is an even bigger handicap for sterling. Following an unfortunate performance by prime minister Theresa May at the Conservative conference a faction of her party is campaigning to replace her as leader. Investors do not welcome yet another bout of political instability.

Joan Verger, mayor of Montiuri, said that the "cowardly and miserable vandals will not stop the town hall from dignifying the historical memory." He accused the anonymous aggressors of wanting "to sully the memory of those who fought and died for freedom and democracy."

The graffiti was sprayed overnight, meaning archaeologists working on excavating a mass grave with at least four men inside arrived for work only to be greeted by the fascist slogans.

They began work on the site several weeks ago. The bodies are believed to belong to four local labourers who were murdered when Franco's

Hundreds of other unidentified victims of the fascist regime lie across the island. Archaeologists fear that it will be near impossible to identify most of them. Bodies buried on top of one another make DNA analysis difficult.

Most are believed to be anti-fascist infantrymen from the mainland.

# Sheep against the machine

A SHEPHERD suing Palma Town Hall has vowed to take his case to the Spanish Supreme Court and the European Court of Human Rights. Juan Jose Arias is fighting an uphill battle against the council, and just lost a decision by Palma's provincial court.

The sheep and goat herder claims to have been cheated when his farm was appropriated by the town hall to make way for the Mercapalma market. He received some compensation and was moved to a new property but is adamant that his rights were violated.


He accuses the town hall of pestering and pressuring him to sign the papers. He had no legal advice, no time, and was battling depression. Arias found himself signing off on an agreement that valued his 10,000 square metre farm as though it were just 500 square metres.

Arias also says that his neighbours, who had proper legal guidance, received three times the amount he did per square metre.

Last week his case faltered when Palma's provincial court found no reason to repeal the appropriation order. Judges found there was not enough supporting evidence to back the claim that he was 'harassed and deceived.'

Arias has now promised to fight for 'proper compensation,' or at least a new farm, suitable for his 100 sheep and goats.

He has been rehoused near the Son Banya slum. Ironically it is also on the verge of being demolished to make way for shops and apartments.

# **Endangered Spanish lynx shot dead**

POLICE have asked for help to find out who shot an endangered Iberian lynx at close-range in Jaen Province, Andalucia.

Agents from Seprona, the Guardia Civil's animal protection unit, have turned to social media to seek information after confirming that the animal's death was no accident.

In a post on Twitter, the Guardia Civil asked: "Do you know who shot a lynx in Sierra Morena?

"Help us to hunt them down. "Hunters are usually respectful."

An autopsy confirmed that the female lynx, which weighed 9.5 kilograms and was just over oneyear-old, was shot at close range of around five to 10 metres.

An x-ray revealed more than 100 fragments of lead were inside its body.

The corpse of the critically endangered species was found in a small hunting ground in Villanueva de la Reina, a municipality in Jaen, and police are taking statements from those associated with the area.

The Andalucian Hunting Federation has condemned the act, they said in a statement: "Those who carry out these types of acts are furtive delinquents.

"The hunter can only be called a hunter when he respects the law and loves the countryside and nature."

The co-operation of hunters has been sought since the beginning of the Iberlince programme which has aimed to save the world's most endangered big cat from the brink of extinction.

Between 2002 and 2016, 95 lynx deaths were recorded as a result of collisions with vehicles, but 25 deaths have been attributed to hunters.

# Man gored in neck dies at bull run

ONE person has died and two others were injured during the annual Fiesta del Toro Revolao bull run in the small village of Valfermoso de Tajuna, in the Castilla La Mancha region of Spain.

The 33-year-old man from Madrid had been taunting the bull, waving a jumper at it, before it charged at him pinning him to the ground.

In videos posted on social media other participants can be seen trying to pull the bull from the man by the tail.

It is reported the man was gored in the jugular, but died later despite the best efforts of the emergency services.

The man's wife and children were in the crowd and witnessed the incident according to reports on television.

No-one has previously died at the event.

# Recovery driver killed

THE driver of a breakdown truck has been killed while attending a broken down car in Spain. Flight prices soaring

THE average price for flights from the UK to Europe has risen by nearly 25 per cent since mid-September, according to travel search engine Skyscanner.

The website confirmed that air fares for last minute trips have been 23 per cent more expensive in the past few weeks since Ryanair began to announce cancellations.

Passengers flying to certain destinations in Spain saw even higher increases, as last minute flights to Malaga were up 30 per cent, from around  $\in$  120 to  $\in$  150, and flights to Alicante increased by 27 per cent.

The demand for flights has also shot up after thousands of Ryanair and Monarch customers had their flights cancelled and had to find alternatives. Skyscanner reported that traffic on its website has risen by 86 per cent in the past few weeks.

Ryanair started to cancel thousands of flights across Europe after it botched up their pilot's annual leave, which has so far affected roughly 700,000 passengers, while around 860,000 Monarch customers had their travel plans thrown into disarray when the firm suddenly went bankrupt on Monday.

# Lottery jackpot

A RECORD-BREAKING € 190m (£169m) Euromillions jackpot has gone to a single ticket-holder in Spain.

The huge main jackpot had rolled over since the start of September as noone had matched five numbers and two lucky stars in the twice-weekly - Tuesday and Friday - lottery draws.

A lucky punter who bought their ticket in Spain had the winning numbers of 01, 09, 15, 19 and 25 and lucky star numbers 01 and 07.

The prize fund had reached its maximum limit, and, without any winners, would have remained at £169m for another four draws, before being distributed to those with fewer number matches on a fifth draw.

Share prices fell with the announcement of the result of the referendum, but those who have either announced or indicated the likelihood of moving out of the region have seen some very significant gains.

# Back on track in Saudi Arabia

# **Coal is out of favour** LIQUID NATURAL GAS WILL TAKE OVER

AS governments around the world demand a move away from environmentally damaging coal and oil, the larger oil companies in particular are expanding their natural gas resources.

Currently, Royal Dutch Shell is managing a huge deposit in Australia and will convert the gas into Liquefied fuel (LNG) which can be transported around the world in tankers.

A similar operation in the Southern Hemisphere is being managed by Chevron which is reported to have invested a massive  $\in$  75 billion into the building of a new platform and other major oil companies are also investing heavily in this growing area of business.

Currently a great deal of electricity, particularly in China and India is being produced by burning coal which is recognised as a major pollutant and a generating planting using LNG can reduce the amount of carbon dioxide produced by 50 per cent and 75 per cent less nitrogen oxide.

The large oil companies can see that their reliance on oil to fuel vehicles is coming to an end, with the decision to phase out diesel powered vehicles within a few years and the growth of electric cars with batteries which will stay charged for much longer distances.

Countries which had little if any oil may still have natural gas deposits as the deeper the compressed matter is found, the more likely it is to have turned into gas rather than oil.

The five countries with largest gas deposits currently known are believed to be in Russia, Iran, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and Turkmenistan although the figures presented by US Energy Information Administration are quite old and do not even include the USA.



QATARI ship transporting LNG. More and more LNG projects are being presented to governments around the world whilst the search for crude oil is declining and with LNG suitable for urban taxis and other vehicles, distribution is almost as important as new finds.

The cost of freezing and moving the liquid gas in bulk is steadily decreasing as companies invest more in this area and even the movement of the gas can be greener as marine diesel is slowly being replaced by engines driven by LNG.

# DESPITE FALLS IN THE SPANISH STOCK MARKET German Bank tips Santander

IN a published statement, Deutsche Bank which appears to have recovered from its own financial difficulties has identified Banco Santander as a good investment option.

Untainted by the Catalonian problem and only recently considered by the Spanish government and European Central Bank an ideal partner to take over Banco Popular, it seems ready to fend off law suits from disgruntled Banco Popular shareholders who have lost everything.

The majority of Spanish bank shares fell following the results of the arguably illegal Catalan Independence Referendum and the German banking group believes that Santander under the firm leadership of Ana Botin is undervalued.

It forecasts that 2018 will be a very profitable year for the Cantabrian based bank with profits rising by more than 10 per cent and an increase in the value of dividends paid to shareholders.

With a target price of  $\in 6.60$ , it would have to see a strong surge of around 14 per cent as shares have been trading between  $\in 5.80$  and  $\in 5.85$  for several

weeks, although it had a short lived drop to  $\in$  5.60.

Ana Botin the fourth generation of her family to head Santander Bank, studied economics at Bryn Mawr College and attended Harvard Business School where she earned an MBA.

She then worked for eight years at JP Morgan in the USA and in 1988 she came back to Spain and began working for the Santander Group. In 2002 she was appointed the executive chairman of the Spanish bank, Banesto, a subsidiary of Santander where she served until 2010 when she became CEO of Santander UK.

When her father died in 2014, she was immediately appointed chair of the parent company which continues to be highly successful.

So impressed was David Cameron with this Spanish businesswoman that he appointed her in 2014 as one of his advisors in the Business Advisory Group and following this appointment she was then made an honorary Dame Commander of the British Empire (DBE) in December 2015, for services to the British financial services sector.

Now with more than 186,000 employees and 14,392 branches spread across most of Europe and much of South America, the bank has also been increasing its business in Asia and the USA and its charismatic and hardworking chair continues to be a driving force behind the bank's burgeoning strength.

# Christmas could be costly in the UK

CHRISTMAS is already upon us although Spain is not as quick to jump on the band wagon as UK retailers who are already promoting cards, decorations and gifts.

Stores such as Morrisons in Gibraltar are following suit offering plenty of Christmas items alongside an extensive Halloween collection but stores in the UK are worried that this won't be a bumper celebration as far as they are concerned.

British consumers are fearful that the prices of goods will continue to increase due to a weak pound and Brexit fears meaning that they may have to cut back on their spending according to a survey undertaken by Mintel, the world's largest market intelligence agency with global offices in Europe, the Far East and Asia,

# Foundation to quit Cataluña

MASKED by the interest caused by the move of industrialists and banks out of Cataluña, a charitable foundation worth almost  $\in 22$  billion has also left.

La Caixa Banking Foundation Group which exists to manage a huge pension fund and administers charitable activities throughout Spain has decided to set up its new headquarters in Palma, Mallorca.

Madrid has been the main beneficiary of the move of head offices out of Barcelona although it is unlikely that the banks in particular will move the majority of their staff who will continue to operate from their existing offices, so fears of massive unemployment in Barcelona are unlikely to come true.

WHILST the European Union has sided with Spain on the Cataluña situation, the IMF has now warned that the entire Spanish economy could suffer a loss of confidence.

Despite the fact that Cataluña is considered the industrial power house of Spain and accounts for 19 per cent of GDP, the American financial ratings agencies have steadily downgraded its rating and it is now considered to be junk (negative) investment status.

# Buying a new car - your rights

AS part of a new series, we answer some common driving questions, kindly provided by members of the Guardia Civil based in Torrevieja, Costa Blanca, who set up the N332 website and Facebook page to help break down barriers.



NEW CARS: Conditions will vary according to the manufacturer.

WHEN you purchase a new car from a dealer, you have a certain level of peace of mind accompanying your purchase.

New cars are covered by a legal guarantee of two years without a mileage limit, whereas the manufacturer has to take care of the faults and breakdowns that have arisen with the car, so long as they are not caused by misuse, lack of maintenance or wear.

Factory defects are also covered by the legal guarantee, but in this case the claim must be made during the first six months from the date of delivery of the vehicle. After that time it is necessary to prove that the defect is actually caused at the manufacture stage and, for that, an expert report must be presented to prove it.

The Madrid-based Asociación Madrileña de Distribuidores de Automóviles (AMDA), also wants to advise owners that you also have consumer rights if you have to visit the workshop for these repairs.

In the event that the vehicle suffers a fault covered by the warranty, the time spent in the

workshop for repair will not count as part of the warranty period and that time will be added to the original date of termination of the warranty. It is necessary to request a receipt with the date of delivery and return of the vehicle, together with the repair report.

The buyer not only has rights when buying a car, but work carried out in authorised mechanic's workshops are guaranteed, whether it is a maintenance check or a repair.

It is however necessary to differentiate between two situations: when it is a repair covered by the legal guarantee, in this case the period of cover is six months; If it is a repair outside the warranty period, the workshop will be responsible for its work for three months or 2,000 kilometres.

Many manufacturers offer the option to optionally expand the warranty period.

The conditions vary according to the manufacturer, the length of time, mileage, and what is covered. Therefore, the conditions must be read carefully.

## VHS vs Betamax - again

SINCE ebooks began a decade ago there's been a 'VHS vs Betamax' slugfest of formats. We're down to two main contenders: Amazon's proprietary Kindle type, and what was intended to be the universal EPUB format found on most others.

Like music and movies, paidfor ebooks have copyright protection, and this 'DRM' means they can't easily be switched between systems or devices.

But for the millions of free ebooks online there are simple ways of converting between formats, most notably with the free Calibre program, which can also deliver thousands of the world's magazines and newspapers free to your e-reader.

Still dubious about deserting your beloved print-books? Then consider the internet's most popular verdict by tech guru Stephen Fry: "Books are no more threatened by Kindles than stairs by elevators."

A FRIEND now has 2,000 books in his home and will soon have to camp in his garden. I carry 2,000 books in my back pocket. By next year a quarter of all

by next year a quarter of an worldwide book sales will be electronic, in a market worth € 17 billion. You know it makes sense: are several gazillion copies of the latest E.L. James bonkbuster really worth felling the world's forests and then flooding Oxfam shops with books they no longer actually want or can sell?

Yes I know there's nothing to beat the feel of a 'real' book, or my own guilty secret, that evocative smell when you get your hooter right down there between the pages.

But forget the nostalgia, consider the convenience. A flash of your credit card, a touch on your screen and voila, there's this week's bestseller on your Kindle, Kobo or Nook. Or for cheapskates like me there are literally millions more for gratis out there, from the astonishing 54,000 freebies in Project Gutenberg, to Amazon's free ebooks lists.

Proper e-readers are simple onetrick ponies: they display text, the whole text and nothing but the text.

E-reading on a smartphone or tablet is certainly an option, but

monochrome e-ink is kinder on the eyes than traditional backlit LCD screens, and dedicated e-readers like Kindles, Kobos or Nooks can run for weeks on a battery charge.

You can buy a no-nonsense ereader for the price of just two or three 'dead tree' books, and unlike so many of today's gadgets they'll last for years; I have an ancient Kindle still going strong without a battery change after six years of reading 496 ebooks (yes, I'm one of those pedantic book-counters and list-keepers. Hey, we all have our crosses to bear).

Sure there are drawbacks. Although some providers like Amazon let you share a book among family members, you can't easily pass it on - though digital lending libraries are gaining ground. And proper ebook devices (the best type for serious readers) still only display in black and white despite years of coloured e-ink predictions.

The convenience is unsurpassed. No more dragging bulky holiday reading around the world to bust your back and the easyJet baggage limit. Instant gratification when you want a book: find it online, click it, own it. No more struggling with fine print for those approaching their sell-by dates: just pump up the font size.

And an added bonus: no more disapproving glances from those in public places as we try ineffectually to hide our Fifty shades of whatever.


It's not about being genderless, it's about not being labelled.



# **Migraine pain**

#### WHAT causes migraines?

A migraine is caused by abnormal brain activity, which can be triggered by many factors.

However, the exact chain of events remains unclear. The changes affect bloodflow in the brain and surrounding tissues.

Migraines can also be triggered by any of the following: caffeine withdrawal, changes in hormone levels during the menstrual cvcle, the use of birth control pills, changes in sleep patterns, alcohol, exercise or other physical stress, loud noises or bright lights, fasting, certain scents and perfumes, smoking or exposure to smoke, stress and anxiety.

Certain foods can also trigger migraines. The most common are: chocolate. dairy products, certain cheeses, foods containing tyramine such as red wine, mature cheese, smoked fish. chicken liver, figs, certain beans, fruits (avocado, bananas, citrus fruits ), meats containing nitrates (bacon, hotdogs, salami, cured meats), onions, peanuts and other nuts and seeds and processed, fermented, pickled or marinated foods.

Can they be prevented? You can take measures

such as avoiding all circumstances and foods that cause migraines, which substantially reduces the likelihood of an episode.

Early identification of the signs that suggest an episode is starting, and taking appropriate measures are the best ways to prevent progression.

What can be done to lessen the pain?

There is no specific cure for migraine headaches. The goal is to treat the symptoms of migraines immediately and prevent migraines by avoiding or altering things that can trigger them.

If an episode persists, despite making efforts to combat it, then you should rest and take painkillers and muscle relaxants.

Sometimes you can use certain drugs that can block the episodes in their tracks, which must be prescribed by a doctor.

#### Can they be a sign of a more serious disease or condition?

Overall, migraines are usually benign and produce no lasting side effects.

However, it is important to consult a medical specialist when the symptoms appear, and to get regular check-ups.

### Ask the Optician: How can we help the Deaf-Blind?

#### What is Deaf-Blindness?

This disability results from the combination of two sensory impairments - visual and hearing, which can manifest in different levels of severity. This causes unique communication problems and special needs caused by the difficulty with interacting with people and the outside world.

■ How can deaf-blind people communicate?

This depends on the severity of the sight and hearing loss, many people use sign language if their vision is good enough. They can



also use tactile sign language, where the deaf-blind person puts their hands over the signer's hands to feel the shape, movement and location of the signs, FOAPS provide interpreters who can help the deaf-blind communicate and interact with the world.

#### ■ What are you fundraising for?

The FOAPS interpreters are the eves, ears and often voice of the deaf-blind and have a crucial role to play. We hope that through our campaign we can raise enough

money to fund an extra 400 hours of an interpreter. This costs  $\in$  6,000 so we need 6,000 people to come in and have their eyes tested and make a donation before the end of the year.

SCIENTISTS have devised a new full English breakfast to more accurately reflect the DNA of the average Brit.

Researchers from Londonbased firm AncestryDNA found that the average Englishman is actually only 37 per cent British when it comes to genetics.

To give an accurate portrayal of what this looks like, scientists made a few changes to the ingredients of a typical English breakfast and have ditched bacon and baked beans for Iberico pork and French cassoulet.

They also suggest that traditional fried eggs should be replaced with Scandanavian baked eggs, hash browns should be switched with Irish potato farls and fried tomatoes should be swapped for Italian mozzarellastuffed tomatoes.

According to AncestryDNA, the average Brit's DNA actually contains genes from 26 regions around the world, including:

- 20.5 per cent Western European (hence the French cassoulet beans)

have the most Anglo-Saxon ancestry, with 41 per cent, while London was proven to be the most ethnically diverse region in

The East Midlands were revealed to have the most Scandinavian blood (10.37 per cent) as well as the most Eastern European (2.4 per cent) while those from the east of England have the most Italian/Greek (2.5 per cent).

Many of the new additions to the full English are also healthier. as well as being more reflective of your true heritage, as baked eggs are lower in saturated fat than fried and cassoulet beans have much fewer added flavours and preservatives when made

### Palma Christmas lights


AFTER differences of opinion between the Palma Council and local retailers, it has been decided that the Christmas lights will be illuminated on Thursday November 23.

THE average Madrid resident has to work eight years to buy a home in their city.

The average home now costs 8.1 times the typical salary in the Spanish capital.

Unsurprisingly they have to work harder than the average Spanish resi-

dent. Nationwide, people today would have to dedicate 7.6 years of their salary towards the purchase of a home.

The price versus salary analysis comes from ST Valuations, which assumes people repaying a mortgage over 30 years with a 1.95 per cent interest rate. Experts advise that a

home's value be a maxi-

mum of five year's salary in order to keep household finances well balanced.

But in Spain the discrepancy between the optimal situation and real life is set to grow wider.

House prices are rising far faster than salaries.

First time buyers, facing less flexible financial packages, are turning to the rental world in droves.

In some of the capital's most desirable addresses, prices now stand at €20,000 per square metre, more than 10 times the national average.

On Calle General Castaños, Amancio Ortega, Spain's richest man, and Rafael Nadal have pooled resources to build a block of the most expensive penthouse suites in Madrid.

# Top 10 Spanish property trends

TEN top trends in the Spanish real estate sector have been identified by the Alfa Inmobiliara group. The firm's property experts claim these trends could define the crucial next three years in the thriving sector.

The first key trend is that prices will continue to increase. Barring nuclear war property specialists unanimously expect Spanish home prices to grow on average.

This will be sharper in some areas and non-existent in others but steady across the board.

Secondly it will become harder to make a profit from those same increases as the secret of Spain's success is now out.

On the other key front, rents will continue to rise, both in the residential and commercial sectors.



As a whole the real estate sector is projected to grow by around 4 per cent per year until 2020 due to investor confidence.

Much of that growth will be concentrated in Spain's biggest cities, Madrid and Barcelona.

The sixth major trend is that bargain buying opportunities will become harder to come by due to a reduction in stock and prices peaking in certain desirable spots.

Of slight concern to first time buyers is that the low financing deals of recent years will dry up and mortgages made more expensive.

Alternative sectors, including student accommodation and office space, are projected to enjoy substantial growth. Meanwhile Spain will continue to be among the western nations most flirted with by major international investors.

Finally, Brexit's impact on Spanish real estate is expected to be far less damaging than originally feared as a new wave of German, French and Belgian buyers easily make up the difference.





If you have olive trees, they need a strim to tidy them up and make it easier to get around the trees to harvest a few olives for bottling at the end of the month.

The main harvest for oil is in a few weeks' time.

I suspect you have a similar list of October tasks but if you are not really sure of the full range of seasonal gardening tasks, comprehensive lists are included in each of our quartet of books 'Your garden in Spain', 'Apartment gardening Mediterranean style', 'Growing healthy fruit in Spain' and 'Growing healthy vegetables in Spain'.

Fortunately, if you are new to Spain you found copies in your purchased property or you might find some remaining copies on the websites of Amazon books or the London Book Depository, the publishers and Spanish distributors having closed down during the economic crisis.

Naturally, the later Amazon-published book 'How to use less water in your garden' is readily available.

# Strawberries on a tree may seem unlikely

the strawberry tree (Arbutus unedo).

You can see the tree growing wild in its native habitats in oak forests in zones below 800 metres in Spain.

It has also become domesticated and can be seen in gardens as a feature tree due to its cinnamon coloured bark and deep green foliage being most attractive and highlighted in autumn with bunches of scented, white, waxy, vase-shaped flowers in clusters and dangling fruits that ripen a individually from green to yellow and finally red when mature over a long period of time.

The fruit resembles a strawberry hanging from the tree but the similarities end there. It does not taste at all like a strawberry. It requires an acquired taste to appreciate and is not a fruit that you usually would eat many of.

If you have a tree or can source the fruit, it makes wonderful jams with a unique tinge to the taste. It needs the fruit to be fresh to use as the fruit deteriorates quickly once off the tree.

The fruit can be made into a compote, syrup, puree, glaze, iams, jellies, ice cream flavouring and converted into wine and spirits.

It is an interesting addition to the garden and can grow in a large container. It does not like to be transplanted or moved so it should be located permanently in a partly shaded zone.

It is a pioneering and understorey tree that only grows to around five to 10 metres over many decades. It is drought-tolerant but needs watering to get established.

TEACHING your dog tricks is every dog owner's dream, but you must start with basic obedience. Your dog should know the basic commands (sit. down, heel, stand, and come) before you attempt any type of trick training. Once you have these mastered, you can build on them with one of these three simple tricks.

#### Begging

This trick is best taught by first having your dog sit in a corner of the room with you standing in front of him.

This allows the corner to support your dog and keep him from

Using food, hold it above your dog and entice him to reach up and take it. Progress slowly, each time encouraging the dog to rise higher.

Make sure your dog keeps his haunches on the ground. Use the treat to encourage the dog to shift his weight back over his haunches - it will help him keep his balance.

Once your dog is balancing well in the corner, slowly move your dog outward and attempt the trick.

Expect some regression when the dog loses the support of the walls and move slowly until the dog perfects it.

#### Shaking hands

Start with your dog in a sitting position.

Giving the verbal command 'shake,' outstretch your right hand until it is a few inches in front of your dog's right leg.

Your outstretched hand is the non-verbal cue for this trick.

Using your left hand, gently push or prod her right leg forward

until it rests in your right hand. Praise.

After practising several sessions, slowly try to reduce the amount of prompting until only the verbal or non-verbal command is needed.

Shaking the head Shaking the Head 'No.' Start with your dog in a sitting position.

You will need to find something that will cause the dog to shake his head naturally. Blowing lightly

on the ear, tickling the ear with a feather, or lightly attaching a paper clip to one ear are some things that can work. You do not want to cause the dog pain.

PETS PAGE

Once you have discovered a method that will cause your dog to shake his head, decide on a nonverbal and verbal cue you want to use. 'Head' along with shrugging the shoulders is a good idea. You do not want to use the word 'no' as you are likely to use this word when scolding the dog and this will lead to confusion.

Using both cues, stimulate the dog to shake his head. Reward. even if it is only a small movement.

Take a momentary break and then try again. Don't repeat the trick more than five times in one session

Eventually, try signalling the dog with only the verbal or nonverbal cues as well as signalling the dog from a standing and a lying position.

Motoring shorts Bloodhound blur

TWENTY years after setting the world landspeed record, Britain's Bloodhound SSC is back in business. New footage has been released showing the supersonic, rocket-shaped car firing up its engine.

Driver and former RAF pilot, Andy Green, is preparing to steer the Bloodhound to a record-breaking speed of 1,000mph. In 1997 Green captained the car to the current landspeed record of 763mph.

The Bloodhound wields a EJ200 Eurofighter jet engine. It will be further boosted by a Nammo rocket cluster which will generate the face-bending speeds guided by an estimated 135,000 hp.

Testing is still underway. Last week's video, filmed in Cornwall, England, shows that the team are still working on their record-breaking goal. The team hope to hit 1,000mph on a track in South Africa next year.

ROAD TEST by Nick Fletcher Toyota RAV4

TOYOTA'S rugged RAV4 is well established in the SUV sales battle where it takes on very tough opposition. The RAV4 is more spacious than most, has the bonus of a full hybrid version, and its other ace card is the brand's formidable reputation for durability and dependability.

Price start at  $\in 28,246$ (£24,765) and there is a good choice of petrol and diesel engines as well as the hybrid, and the option of 2WD or 4WD and manual or auto gearboxes.

The latest model looks cool and sharp in a sector where visual kudos is a key factor, so the RAV4 is off to a good start. Inside, it's roomy and can take four tall adults with ease and a fifth at a squeeze, and the rear seats recline for extra comfort.

At 501 litres the boot area is excellent and folding the rear seats can more than triple the space to 1,633 litres. Seating is comfortable and supportive and there are plenty of stowage places around the cabin. The designers seem to have put all the emphasis on functionality, for while the dials and controls are all user-friendly, the overall visual impact of the dashboard is rather muted and out of sorts with the charismatic exterior.

My test model was an upperspec RAV4 Hybrid Excel, with all-wheel drive and powered by a 2.5 litre petrol engine and electric motor giving 195 hp. With a 0-100 kph time of 8.4 seconds it is nippy by class standards, top speed is 180 kph (112 mph). Fuel figure is 19.6 kpl (55.4 mpg).


This version costs € 38,751 (£33,975) and comes with alloy wheels, adaptive cruise control, lane keep assist, road sign assist, pre-collision system, auto lights and wipers, smart entry and push button start, powered tailgate, rear view camera, leather upholstery, front and rear parking sensors, sat-nav, Bluetooth and on-line connectivity among its long list of features.

On the move the RAV4 proves smooth and assured, with a balanced suspension setup and precise steering making



the car well planted on the corners. Ride quality is very good even when the surface gets rough. The only adverse comment in my notebook was more tyre hum at motorway speeds than I expected.

# De Gea in safe hands at United - for now?

DAVID DE GEA returns to club football on Saturday October 14 as Manchester United travel to Liverpool in the Premier League - with Spain's national keeper in safe hands at Old Trafford - for now?

"David is really happy at the moment," said club and country teammate Ander Herrera.

Real Madrid have pursued long-term target United stopper de Gea for two years - and speculation rose its head when he sold his £3.85 million house in September.

Reds' goalie de Gea is currently renting a property, leading some pundits to link him to a move to Real Madrid next year.

De Gea's 'on-off' moves to Real from Old Trafford have collapsed twice - when the La Liga Champions failed to complete a deal.

And Herrera, who moved to United from Athletic Bilbao in 2014, said de Gea, 26, will not move to the Bernabeu any time



soon. "We are going to try to keep him at the club - for as long as possible. I can see him staying here for more years," said midfielder Herrera.

United boss Jose Mourinho has ambitions to lead United to the Premier League title this season and Herrera said: "We need to win titles to keep David with us - that's what we did last season."

# Another lesson in football for ex-teacher Roy

ROY HODGSON taking the reins at Crystal Palace doesn't get any easier with The Eagles hosting Premier League Champions Chelsea on Saturday October 14 awaiting a beating: We are the boxer - fighting.

Hodgson is up for a fight against all odds of keeping The Eagles in the top flight: "We are the boxer - fighting - and we are going to have to take the blows.

"It's going to be a longish and hard process - but I know there's light at the end of the tunnel," said ex-England chief Hodgson.

Veteran manager Hodgson, 70, has had more clubs than Tiger Woods - with Palace being his 23rd club in all managerial positions.

Hodgson, whose mother was a baker in his home town Croydon, saw his career rise, from that of being manager at Swedish club Halmstad BK in 1976, to that of becoming England national chief in 2012.

Hodgson has returned to Palace - where he was a youth player - before playing non-League football with Tonbridge Angels and Gravesend & Northfleet.

Age 23, Hodgson gained his fully qualified coaching badge and joined Maidstone United, as a player and assistant-manager.

In 1976 Hodgson was appointed manager at Halmstads BK and was successful in winning the League Championship in 1976 and 1979.

Bristol City, Oddevold Orebro and Malmo FF were among clubs that saw Hodgson in charge, before taking the reins of the national team in Switzerland in 1992, prior to returning to club football at Inter Milan in 1995.

In 1997 Hodgson took charge of Blackburn Rovers, returning to Inter Milan, as caretaker coach in 1999.

Grasshoppers, Copenhagen, Udinese, UAE, Viking and Finland saw Hodgson away from British football during 1999-2007, returning on English soil at Fulham. Liverpool swooped for Hodgson in 2010 paying a £2 million compensation fee for his tenure - that lasted only until 2011 when he departed Anfield by mutual consent, when replaced by Kenny Dalglish.

Hodgson's next stop was at West Brom but he left The Baggies when approached by England to become the national manager, a job he began in 2012.

After Euro 2012, the 2014 World Cup and the 2016 Euro Championship Hodgson departed the England national stage under a barrage of criticism.

In September Hodgson came full-circle when heading back to the club where he spent time in the youths at Crystal Palace - in the wake of The Eagles sacking Frank de Boer after a poor run of results after just 77 days in charge.

Hodgson, who signed a two-year contract, has had a baptism of fire since taking the baton at struggling Palace, with Premier League games against Southampton, Manchester City, Manchester United - and Chelsea this weekend.

One-time teacher Hodgson, who can speak five languages, said: "All you can do is try to get the best performances out of the players. If they are not good enough, you struggle."

After a baptism of fire with heavy defeats, Hodgson said: "We know the task in hand is difficult. There will come a stage in the season - hopefully - if you get better, the points will come."

Despite injury-hit Palace's woes Hodgson remains undeterred: "Hopefully you will catch up the ground you have lost at the beginning - there's no point crying over spilt milk," said Hodgson.

Palace lost 4-0 against United before the international break, leaving The Eagles rock bottom of the table - with seven defeats from seven games - and no goals scored.

"The fixture list has been tough - we knew that. We've had enormously tough fixtures and Chelsea coming up," said Hodgson.


