

Talked down

A 43-YEAR-OLD Belgian woman was talked out of throwing herself from her balcony after allegedly suffering years of abuse from her husband.

The resident of Torre del Mar was found by police sitting on the railing of her balcony and threatening to jump before a man apparently persuaded her to come inside.

Police then spoke to the woman who was said to be in "a state of great anxiety." She allegedly told officers she had been physically and mentally abused by her husband for a year. Police apparently confirmed the woman had bruises on various parts of her body. Her 48-year-old Belgian husband has now been held on suspicion of domestic abuse.

Ruff behaviour!

Dog owners warned over DNA

More than 9,000 pet owners are at risk of being fined for failing to register their dogs' DNA by the end of September.

Animal-lovers in Rincon de la Victoria had until September 24 to register their animal on a DNA database, however only 500 of the 9,700 dogs in the area have been so far.

Owners who failed to comply with the regulation now face a €2,000 fine if stopped.

The scheme was designed to encourage dog owners to clean up after their pets as well as to prevent dog abandonment and dognapping. Just 5 per cent of the municipality's owners have now signed up to the initiative, which costs €35 per animal.

The head of Don Animal, Jose Anto-

nio Villodres, told one publication the scheme "is very good on paper, but we are already seeing that it has had very little success." Sergio Diaz, president of the Association of Merchants and Entrepreneurs of Rincon de la Victoria, added, "there are still a lot of questions to clarify, like who will take the samples of dog mess to send them to the company specialised in analysing them, which is in Sevilla."

Smash and grab

TWO people have been arrested in Benamocarra after their alleged involvement in several robberies in Granada and Cordoba, adding up to an estimated value of €40,000.

It has been reported the pair were part of a group that targeted several establishments such as supermarkets, tobacconists and bars to steal money from cash registers, slot machines and tobacco vending machines, as well as also stealing the tobacco.

A third person is still at large after injuring a Guardia Civil officer while he was resisting arrest.

The Guardia Civil reportedly began their investigation last February after an increase in robberies in the area, and set-up a monitoring device in an attempt to intercept the vehicles used in the robberies.

Glider horror

AN unnamed Polish man has died while paragliding in Almuñecar.

The man was said to have been flying over a ravine on Taramay when the accident occurred at around 2.30pm.

His body was found next to a lane of the N-340 around two hours later.

The deceased apparently often practised the hobby around Almuñecar and La Herradura.

A YELLOW warning issued for severe weather in Axarquía remains in place today (Thursday) after storms battered southern Spain.

It comes after the area was hit by more than 2,000 bolts of lightning in the space of three hours yesterday morning, leaving eight towns without electricity, according to Spanish weather agency AEMET.

More than 25 litres of water per square metre fell in just over an hour in places, leading to over 70 calls alerting emergency services to landslides, flooding and other incidents in Velez-Málaga, Torrox and Málaga City.

Flood threat goes on

OVER 1,200,000 people in Malaga Province are estimated to live in areas at high risk of flooding.

A new study by the Madeca Foundation, responsible for managing and implementing strategic actions plans for Malaga Province, declared that 15 towns in Malaga Province are 'high-risk' flood zones.

Some of the most vulnerable towns include Estepona, Malaga capital, Marbella and Fuengirola. The research also revealed the frequency of flooding in the region has risen from once every seven years to once every four years.

The study also suggests that the economic costs of repairing damage caused by floods will rise in the near future due to their increased intensity and frequency.



Custody battle won

A 10-YEAR-OLD girl who was taken by her mother has been returned to her father in Nerja after two months. A court in Torrox ordered the girl to be handed over after her mother refused to give her back to her father after a visit in the summer.

Heavy eating

THE Spanish Red Cross are gearing up to deliver thousands of kilos of food to local councils and 62 associations to be handed out to vulnerable families. Among the foods on offer are rice, milk, chickpeas, pasta, canned tuna, tomatoes, biscuits, canned fruit, canned green beans, cocoa, chicken and children's foods.

Fire support

MALAGA firefighters have rallied around their suspended colleague after he was disciplined for removing protest posters from fire trucks. The sergeant had received a direct order from the head of the corps and was suspended for 37 days for disobeying.

House blaze

A SQUAT in Malaga City caught fire, sending clouds of smoke across the skyline and alarming residents. Emergency services received more than a dozen calls alerting them to the event, before attending the scene to extinguish the blaze. No one was injured after the building's first floor caught light on Calle Marques de Valdeflores.

Faster results

THE Andalucian Health Service (SAS) has been pushed to provide more rheumatologists to speed up diagnosis of illnesses and reduce delays. The Malaga Association for Rheumatoid Arthritis explained treatment time varied too much across the province, with those patients treated in clinics and at the Hospital Clinico Universitario experiencing longer delays.

SPANISH FACTS OF LIFE...33

Spain is the second most mountainous European country after Switzerland, and is also home to one of its most active volcanoes.

Mountain high and totally breathtaking!

SPAIN was once described as "just one big mountain," and although a tongue in cheek comment by a 19th century English travel writer, the nation does possess an extensive and rugged landscape.

With five main mountain ranges - the Sistema Central, the Cordillera Cantabrica, the Pyrenees, the Cordillera Subetica and the Sierra Morena - more than 20 per cent of the country's land is 1,000 metres or more above sea level. The individual daddy of them all, though not on the mainland, is Mount Teide, in Tenerife on the Canary Islands.

More than 3,700 metres high, Teide is the country's most visited natural attraction and the highest - and still active - volcano in the world outside Hawaii when measured from peak to ocean floor.

Teide last erupted in 1909 but it is still rated as being unstable leading many to speculate an eruption is imminent.

A study eight years ago by Granada University found that Teide is likely to violently erupt and the International Association of Volcanology also labelled it a 'decade volcano,' one with a destructive history that is close to populated areas.

The highest mountain peak on mainland Spain is Mulhacen, at more than 3,400 metres, just over two hour's drive from Granada in the Sierra Nevada range.

Not only does the Sierra Nevada offer opportunities to do extreme sports, but it is also a popular ski resort.

Peak interest

ON the French/Spanish border in the north, the Pyrenees have more than 200 peaks over 3,000 metres high, and the largest surviving glacier can be found on Aneto, the region's tallest peak.

Larrun, at nearly 1,000 metres, was used by the French troops when they sought shelter from Wellington's forces during the 19th century Peninsular War.

Many interesting sights can be found sky-high including St Mary's church on Mount Naranco and the Montserrat monastery in Cataluña, which is more than 1,000-years-old.

Leak problems

MALAGA'S Guadalteba reservoir loses enough water every day to leaks and illegal connections to sustain half a million people. Accord-

ing to reports, five litres of water are lost before it reaches a house each time the tap is turned on. The underground water pipes have not been replaced in 40 years in some places

Galician disaster

AFTER the terrible news of the wildfires devastating parts of California and killing at least 41, things have moved closer to home with four killed in Galician fires.

It appears that at least some of those fires were started by arsonists and that they have been made worse by strong winds hitting the coast of Spain due to the fall-out from Storm Ophelia.

Fire brigades in the region have found it incredibly difficult to cope with more than 100 separate active fires and this problem has been made worse by the fact that many brigades have laid off firefighters now that the dangerous summer period was thought to have passed.

Prime Minister Rajoy travelled to his home province as a show of support for those who had been affected by the fires and to grieve alongside the families of a 78-year-old man who died trying to protect his animals and a 70-year-old man who was fighting the fires near his home in Vigo.

Two bodies were also discovered in a burnt out car but at the time of writing the victims had not been identified.

Our hearts and best wishes must go out to all of those affected by these fires and those in the emergency services fighting them.

We hope however that if any of these fires have been started deliberately that those responsible realise the pain and suffering that they have caused.



Salty stuff


Councillor for Culture, Olga Ruano, explained, "it was a necessity for the thousands of visitors who come to the park to be able to find out at least basic information about the place."

The archaeological complex dates back to the end of the fifth century BC, or the beginning of the fourth cen-

tury BC, and is a reminder Almuñecar founded a large part of its economy on the salt industry. The area later achieved widespread fame as evidenced by quotes from various contemporary books praising the area's salt.

According to Olga Ruano, the improvement will join a series of cultural upgrades

around the municipality, with improved signage at San Miguel castle and the sculpture of Abderraman I. She explained, "little by little we need to improve information and make these sites more pleasant and interesting, allowing visitors to value the importance of these monuments and archaeological sites, as we have already done at the stretches of Roman aqueducts and La Carrera hot springs."



THE TEAM: Planning the works.

VELEZ-MÁLAGA'S Jurado Lorca park is set to receive an upgrade after remodelling works began.

The councillor for the Environment, Marcelino Mendez Trelles, visited the €60,000 works with Antonio Cerezo, head of the construction company responsible, ACR Projects and Works. The first stage of works has begun - waterproofing the pond and remodelling the park's water areas - in an effort to put an end to leaks and

improve cleanliness.

Councillor Mendez Trelles explained, "the duck pond measures around 800 square metres and has presented many problems with filtration, breakage and decomposition which has prevented ducks living here for the time being." He added, "this project will resolve an issue which has been going on for a decade."

Antonio Cerezo said "the works prior to rehabilitating the pond involve sanitising its sur-

face so we can guarantee it will be waterproof. This will be done with a product called 100 per cent pure polyurea, which reacts at about 80 degrees and is projected onto the surface."

He added, "it is one of the few construction materials certified by the Instituto Torroja and whose minimum durability is 25 years. Therefore, we are using one of the best waterproofing products."

The works are expected to be complete within two months.

LEASING A HOME: LANDLORD AND TENANT EXPENSES

Before leasing a home, it is very important to be clear about the obligations of each party of the negotiation to facilitate the agreement and cohabitation between landlord and tenant.

Following, is a specification of the responsibilities corresponding to each of the parties (Landlord-Tenant), which must be clearly stated in the contract to be signed:

The tenant is responsible for:

- The payment of the Property Transfer Tax (ITP, for its initials in Spanish) according to the corresponding autonomous community where the home is at. Verify the amount corresponding to Comarca de la Axarquía, in municipalities such as Benajárf, Frigiliana, Competa or Torre del Mar.
- The monthly rent, which is fundamental and must be paid on a timely basis to avoid being sued for breach of contract.
- Any damage caused by the tenant, or its guests, to the property leased.
- Services such as water, electricity, gas, telephone, internet connection.
- Any complaints due to inappropriate behaviour.
- Refuse rates.
- Usual repairs not exceeding 150 Euros.

The landlord is responsible for:

- The Real Estate Tax (IBI, for its initials in Spanish).
- The quota corresponding to the community of neighbours.
- Maintenance insurance.

- Any repairs/adjustments to make the property habitable.
- The cost of maintenance of pipes and electrical installations, as well as the replacement and/or repair of the thermos, refrigerator or boiler.
- Any repair intended to preserve the structure of the home.
- Repairs that exceed 150 Euros originated over time and due to continuous use.

Additional recommendation: Both parties must take out an insurance that allows them to face significant disbursements in case of unforeseen events.

Seasonal rentals

In terms of seasonal rentals, it is advisable for the owners to clearly state the conditions of use of the home, as well as the payment of expenses while the same is occupied.

Another piece of advice for the landlord would be to be honest regarding the rent amount he/she is receiving, since the Treasury Department is cross-referencing data with the platforms used for seasonal rentals, thus, gathering all the necessary information to determine said amounts.

YOUNG people in Vélez-Málaga are being helped into the workplace using an innovative European method to boost employment.

The SymfoS method, which originates from Austria, was introduced by councillor for Youth, Maria Santana, together with the president of the Roads Association, Angela Pittl.

The initiative will see young people who have difficulties

with social skills working with teachers, counsellors and social workers in a series of free events. The concept sees symbols used instead of words, allowing younger people to express themselves in a different way.

Angela Pittl explained the project evolved after different ideas were exchanged between various European countries. Paul Schoober, coordinator of the project, explained SymfoS arises from the need to find al-

ternative tools to bring young people into the labour market and resolve youth unemployment across Europe. He added, "this activity teaches young people who have some kind of social limitation to take charge of their own lives, find a professional goal and, above all, a clear goal in life in general."

Austria has been using this method for seven years and the initiative is currently being implemented in Spain, Germany, Ireland and Italy.

Lights, camera, action

MTV has recorded an episode of one of its most popular TV shows in La Herradura's Marina del Este.

The American show Challenge was shot at night, with many yachts and boats coming out to welcome the crew while large letters proclaimed the show's title on its sea wall.

The show followed participants taking part in a scuba diving challenge

across two intense days.

Two large and well-known yachts measuring tens of metres, stood out of the almost 10 boats that moved into the area. The calm waters of the bay, good temperature and proximity to the port, were key factors in the production company's choice of location.

The first night session included training for the teams, with a constant stream of boats stopping by to see what was happening. More than 50 people

took part in the recording, in addition to logistical support from the marina and several specialised diving and boat companies.

The municipality's council commented it was "pleased" the area was well-known for its diving and thanked and congratulated all the companies who made the venture possible. Rafael Caballero Jimenez, councillor for Beaches, reminded the public the area was ideal for scuba diving 365 days a year.

Road to recovery

THE Axarquía Comarcal Hospital has doubled its anaesthetic recovery area. The project has seen the number of beds available to those coming round from surgery increase from six to 12. The area has also been rearranged to help with sanitation.

Next year, the hospital plans to increase the number of operating theatres from four to five and reform the building's other facilities. The area used for operations currently occupies more than 800 square metres, and €200,000 has been invested to expand and improve the space.

The works to double the size of the post-operation area were undertaken during the summer months to lessen the disruption to patients, doctors and visiting families.

Last year 3,900 operations were performed at the Axarquía Comarcal Hospital, 1,021 were emergency surgeries and 2,034 of which were scheduled.

Ryanair to fight Germany

THERE is to be a public spat between Ryanair and the German government over the proposed €210 million sale of parts of Air Berlin to Lufthansa.

Air Berlin was the second largest airline in Germany which had a major base in Mallorca and was one of the busiest airlines transporting passengers from different parts of Germany to Palma.

It had been haemorrhaging money for several years and in the end, main shareholder Etihad, the Abu Dhabi-based airline, indicated that it

would no longer support Air Berlin and its subsidiaries and the company went into liquidation.

The German government injected €150 million into the company by way of a loan in order to allow it to continue to operate for a short period of time whilst the liquidators negotiated possible sales of assets with interested parties.

It has now been revealed that an agreement has been reached whereby it would purchase the Austrian

leisure travel airline Niki (founded by former racing driver Niki Lauda), the LGW German regional airline and 20 aircraft.

Ryanair is furious and has referred to the agreement as a "stitch-up" orchestrated by the German government in order to strengthen flag carrier Lufthansa and therefore intends to refer the matter to the EU competition authority.

A spokesperson for the German government has however made it clear that it expects the European Commission to approve the deal.

Bouncing pound

THE pound has recovered slightly against the euro following a drop when Chief EU Brexit negotiator Michel Barnier said that no agreement over the 'divorce bill' had been reached.

Without this, it seems highly unlikely that the 27 remaining EU states will agree to any immediate discussion of unfettered access to the EU trade market even though Britain has offered to continue to make contributions during a requested two-year transition period.

Quote of the Week

The situation in Cataluña is worrying because it creates a lot of uncertainty, both for the Catalan economy and for the Spanish economy," according to Maurice Obstfeld, chief economist of the International Monetary Fund.

Sale approved

THE European Commission (EC) today authorised the acquisition of the Spanish highway concessionaire Abertis by Italy's Atlantia, after concluding that its merger would not prevent 'effective competition' in the market.

Budget deficit

AS it has not been able to obtain full approval for its 2018 budget in parliament the Spanish government will have to increase its deficit target. Whilst it had hoped to hit a 2.2 per cent deficit, this is now to be uprated.

ECB support

THE European Central Bank (ECB) is currently injecting €60 billion into the bond market monthly but this will come to an end at the end of the year. It is forecast that it will halve the amount spent in 2018.

Spain and Belarus meet

IN a spirit of expansion of contact the first meeting of the Belarusian-Spanish joint intergovernmental commission on economic and industrial cooperation will be held in Minsk.

The parties will discuss the current state and prospects for cooperation in trade and investment and it is expected that the two countries will sign a

document of understanding following the meeting.

This initiative has been organised following the visit of Belarus' Minister of Foreign Affairs Vladimir Makei to Spain in June 2017 when the two governments signed a memorandum of economic and industrial cooperation which allowed for the establishment of a joint commission.

Telefonica invests millions

MOVISTAR PLUS LOOKS TO WIN TV AUDIENCE

WHEN it was first launched, Telefonica's Movistar Plus looked as if it would be very similar to more mature pay TV operations like Netflix and Amazon but it has been something of a revelation.

Rather than just offer a selection of blockbuster movies and American series, the company has invested large amounts of money in order to produce Spanish orientated transmissions which use national stars and directors acting out well-written stories set in Spain.

In the same way that Scandinavian detective programmes have found an international audience, it looks as if Spain will not be the only country in Europe watching some of these new productions.

BBC4 is running *I Know Who You Are*, produced by Telecinco but the new big budget Movistar Plus productions promise to really get audiences excited and earn money for their producers.

The Spanish have come to pay TV quite late and initially without a huge amount of enthusiasm but recently an episode of its first big series *Velvet Collection* attracted the broadcaster's largest audience ever and it even saw more viewers than *Game of Thrones*.

So confident is the company in its Spanish series that it is currently promoting *Velvet Collection* alongside *The Plague*, *Giants* and *La Zona* at Mipcom in Cannes, the world's largest market place for the promotion and sale of TV series.

All of these big budget series have high production values with some of the most successful Spanish directors bringing original scripts to TV screens with attractive locations ranging from the Rastro Market in Madrid, to the Pyrenees and 16th century Sevilla.

As Telefonica is such a wealthy company, it can afford to take the

risk of producing such impressive properties in order to not only consolidate the position of its subsidiary within the Spanish pay TV market, but also to try to generate income from sales across the world.

One advantage it has is that although the programmes will have to be dubbed for English speaking and European markets, there are some 52 million Spanish speakers in the United States and close to 500 million in Latin and South America, many of whom will enjoy these blockbusters from Spain.

FINANCIAL LIFELINE OR ECONOMIC COLONIALISM

China invests in Silk Road

FOR many years, China remained insular except for excursions into Africa but in 2013 it committed €127 billion a year to its 'one belt, one road' initiative.

With 60 nations involved, it is investing in a number of countries who were part of the ancient Silk Road trail which is supplying much needed investment, although also causing some worries as to whether this is invasion by stealth.

A recent forum held in Thessaloniki, Greece highlighted the importance of Chinese investment in that country and indeed in many of the European Union states although the American government fears that this is a form of financial colonialism.

Spain believes that the growth of trade with China is beneficial to both countries especially as the quality of Chinese goods is increasingly high, whilst there is a market for Spanish produce and know-how in China.

The latest trade figures for 2106

show that Spain earned in excess of €5 billion exporting to China and now that there is a direct rail link between Madrid and Yiwu City in Zhejiang Province, trade can only become easier and busier.

There is an added benefit for Spain as it sits opposite Morocco which is a gateway to the North African market as well as an ideal conduit for Chinese products to be sent to Latin

America and vice versa.

Chinese businessmen have been investing in real estate in the country as well as expanding tourist activities with plans for specially built Chinese orientated hotels and holiday centres plus in a smaller way, every town of any size has at least one Chinese Emporium.

The Spanish government has been trying to make it easier for Chinese business people to invest in the country and also for corporations to bring senior staff and their families to Spain by making applications easier.

Spain has relied to a great extent on investment from Britain with a huge influx of tourists and at one time, the settlement of relatively well-off retirees. With the strengthening of the euro and uncertainty for a post Brexit future, it has to look further afield for investment and partnership.

If the past is anything to go by then Spanish trade links with China can only continue to grow.

MALLORCAN BUYERS BOYCOT CATALAN GOODS

No cava for Christmas

ALTHOUGH there are close historical links between Cataluña and the Balearics, there appears to be a backlash against Catalan products in Mallorca.

According to the Federation of Small and Medium-sized Companies of Mallorca (PIMEM), there seems to be a significant number of companies deciding to effectively boycott certain products and the most obvious target is producers of cava.

Traditionally, a bottle of cava is included in Christmas hampers but as two of the major producers Codorniu and Freixenet are Catalan-based it appears that they will feel the pinch as their sparkling wine is dropped from the hampers.

A number of Catalan-based companies have already moved their head offices to different provinces but with cava having a Denominacion de Origen contained within Cataluña, a move is unlikely to help.

Amazingly it appears that even brands such as Cola Cao who have their

head office in Valencia are suffering as their production centre is in Barcelona and this decision to cut back on the purchase of goods from the province could have far reaching effects, if this antipathy spreads across Spain.

Many clouds do have silver linings however and there are other Spanish regions which produce sparkling wines which are very similar in style and taste to cava, with perhaps the most popular being Rueda Espumoso from Castilla y Leon whilst Italian Prosecco is becoming much more popular in Spain, especially with expatriates.

It seems likely therefore that those

companies importing various foodstuffs and drinks into Mallorca may have to consider obtaining other sources of supply of similar items but without the Catalanian association.

In some cases this could be easier said than done, especially in the agricultural sector where a number of long standing agreements exist in such areas as supply of almonds and other nuts from producers based in Tarragon and Reus.

Trade bodies representing exporters from Cataluña are anxious to play down the problems and want to be able to continue to supply goods to the Balearics and mainland Spain, but in the short term appear to accept that there will be some resistance to purchase of their products.

Businesses on Mallorca also have to consider whether dock workers and even hauliers would be likely to boycott products being imported from Barcelona and therefore look for other sources of supply with ferries coming from Denia and Valencia.

There is gold in Spain's hills

THE Canadian based Orvana Minerals Corp has announced that it expects considerable growth in gold production at its El Valle and Carles mines in northern Spain for the last quarter of 2017.

With gold currently trading at €1,105 per troy ounce, it forecasts production of 15,201 ounces worth €16.75 million, an increase of 11 per cent over the third quarter figures.

These Spanish mines also produce copper and silver but it is gold which is the major generator of profit and production will increase thanks to an expected upturn in the quantity and quality of ore being extracted.

Annual production of gold from these two mines is estimated as being in excess of 60,000 ounces

Losing mental capacity whilst living abroad

MANY UK expatriates living in Spain own properties in the UK and have pensions and investments in the UK. They rely on their UK assets to maintain their lifestyles (and those of their families) in Spain. If they can no longer manage their affairs in the UK due to a loss of mental capacity, it can cause many difficulties.

An LPA must be made while you have full mental capacity. It is therefore important to make one while you are in good health.

Why should you get an LPA?

You can choose a person or people, who you trust, to act for you when you are no longer able.

If you lose your mental capacity and do not have an LPA, then your family (or the authorities) will have no choice but to make an application to the Court of Protection to appoint a ‘deputy’ to look after your affairs, which can be time consuming and costly.

Will my LPA be recognised in Spain?

Unfortunately there is no international type of LPA which is guaranteed to work in both the UK and Spain.

The advice we give to our clients at Stone King, is that if you have assets in both Spain and the UK, your only safe option is to appoint attorneys in both jurisdictions.

But now there are password managers, with a few of the most popular

listed in the panel alongside. These promise to store all your passwords and apply them where needed, as long as you remember, inevitably, One Password To Rule Them All.

Of course you could also write down every password in a notebook as you collect them - and just hope your home isn't burgled by a computer-literate Beagle Boy.

Or you could use your own down-home solution like mine: a text file of usernames and passwords, which is then compressed ('zipped') with any of the many widely-available zip programs (WinZip or 7-Zip are just two) - which let you encrypt (lock) the file with a password each time you save it. WHILE the sight of a matador toying with a bull is the iconic image of Spain's obsession with the animal, there are several other controversial festivities which focus on the horned beast.

The most famous is Pamplona, which sees thousands of locals and tourists take to the streets of the city.

The catch: bulls are set free behind the willing runners before being slaughtered in the bullring that very same evening.

This year's event saw almost as many protestors as runners as those for and against the festival clashed.

One of the most controversial bull 'traditions,' is the Toro Embolado... also known as 'the Burning of the Bulls.'

Although rarer these days, the Toro Embolado sees a bull's horns set alight while it runs around attempting to extinguish the flames.

The custom hit international headlines in July this year after a video showed a bull 'commit suicide' by driving itself into a wooden post after its horns had been set alight during a show in Valencia.

And it doesn't stop there. Of the countless other tradi-

tions which protesters are trying to ban, the encierros - which take place in rural communities - are near the top of the list.

Setting a bull free in an open field, dozens of men mount horses or run after the bull on foot, armed with rocks and spears.

The aim is to drive a spear through the bull bringing it to an abrupt stop. In reality the

bull often limps on for much longer than intended, enduring multiple blows before it finally gives in.

With bullfighting on the ropes, campaigners will hope that these traditions - and many more like them - are also given the boot.

Cock and bull story

SAY what you will about bullfighting. But to go into a ring against a 1,000 kg bull armed with no more than a sword and a cloak takes a lot of courage.

This year alone, two matadors have lost their lives in the ring and several more have been injured. The latest to lose his life was legendary matador Iván Fandiño who was gored after tripping on his cape.

Others are more fortunate and live to tell the tale, but suffer life changing injuries.

One of the most famous incidents took place in Madrid earlier this year

where onlookers were left wincing after matador Juan Miguel took a horn to the nether region as he was tossed into the air.

His colleague Frenchman Andy Younes then suffered a catastrophic injury of his own after being thrown into the air before landing on his head as he attempted to tame the bull.

Of Spain's most famous matadors to return to the ring Juan Jose Padilla must top the list. Losing an eye to a bull in 2011, Padilla came back to fight again. However, last year, almost five years since the horrific goring, Padilla was again struck in the face and gored in the same eye socket.

Whether or not Padilla dons the traje de luces again remains to be seen. But no one would blame him if he calls it a day.

To ban or not to ban has long been a question of Trick or

It is not just the matadors doing the fighting, as those for and against Spain's most controversial tradition engage in verbal sparring outside of the ring. David Noon takes a look at the history of bullfighting and weighs up whether or not Spain should consign the corrida to history.

IT was once considered as ingrained in Spanish culture as tapas or flamenco, but a decade of decline suggests that the corrida's days are numbered.

As the gates are locked on many iconic bullrings across the country, it begs the question of whether or not Spain's controversial tradition can limp on for much longer.

In 2017, where animal rights and political correctness sit on lofty pedestals, the decadence of bullfighting jolts somewhat out of kilter.

And many would argue - and do so, en masse - that bullfighting is fit only for the history books.

Where previously thousands upon thousands of Spaniards took to the plazas de toros in celebration, in their place equal numbers take to the streets to protest in anger.

Each year, fewer and fewer Spaniards openly support the pastime.

A poll carried out earlier this year by the World Animal Protection organisation found that as few as 19 per cent of adults in Spain support bullfighting while 58 per cent are totally opposed to it.

In September 2016, record numbers of protestors lined the streets of Madrid in the largest-ever demonstration against the corrida.

And this year, large, boisterous protests again in Madrid and during Pamplona's bull run have further proven that momentum is swinging in favour of those against bullfighting.

The beginning of the end (if that is where we are headed) took place in Barcelona in 2011, in front of a packed house of nearly 20,000 people at El Monumental.

Top matadors Jose Tomas, Juan Mora, and Serafin Morin lead the corrida, as Cataluña brought the curtain down on bullfighting in the region ahead of a ban coming into force in 2012.

It was an important moment in Spanish history felt far beyond the borders of the ever-headline grabbing Cataluña.

Municipalities across the country have followed in Cataluña's footsteps, with a trickle-down effect leading to bans far and wide.

Nowadays there are dozens of municipal bans on bullfighting across the country. And no doubt more will follow.

It is a reality that was unimaginable in Spain until the last decade.



the number of fights has fallen by more than 50 per cent in the past 10 years.

The latest municipality to clamp down on the pastime was the Balearic Islands who voted in a new law that bans the tradition of bulls being slaughtered in the ring.

Fights can still take place as part of the new law, but bulls cannot be killed (how exactly that will play out remains to be seen).

But the 'sport' still boasts a number of high-profile aficionados who rally to keep the tradition alive.

While the number of bullfights is falling in Spain,

Fighting to keep



the custom alive

WHILE thousands take to the streets to put an end to Spain's most hotly talked about tradition, there are others looking for an alternative way of keeping the custom alive.

For the last two years Santilliana del Mar in Cantabria has enjoyed a successful bull run without bull nor human injury.

Replacing the bulls with men dressed in bull suits, the organisers claim that the event 'keeps tradition alive while ensuring the safety of animals and people.'

More spectacularly, and still with a serious element of danger, one trend gaining steam in Spain is the flight of the bull jumpers.

Armed with nothing more than their reflexes, the Recortadores are put into a ring with a bull and then aim to jump over the oncoming beasts in the style of a high jumper arching his back over the pole.

However, unlike pole jumpers, bull jumpers risk their lives by mistiming the leaps of faith.

And while the tradition dates back more than 500 years, supporters argue that the nail biting spectacle could replace traditional bull fights and maintain Spain's love affair with bulls for years to come.

some 2,000 events are still held every year in front of packed out stadia.

Spanish Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy is perhaps the most powerful supporter of bullfighting.

In 2012, the leader of the country risked a backlash when he overturned a broadcasting ban to bring live coverage of the corrida back to public TV for the first time in six years.

Throughout the years artists, authors, politicians and singers have all voiced their admira-

tion of the tradition.

Pablo Picasso, Orson Welles, Goya, Dalí, Hemingway and the poet Garcia Lorca to name just six were all vociferous in their admiration of bullfighting.

American author Gabriel Garcia Marquez and Spain's top folk singer Joaquin Sabina have both spoken out against 'antitaurinos,' blasting their protests as 'ignorant.'

Holding no punches, Sabina recently claimed that 'art of the antitaurino problem' was that those against bullfighting simply 'can't accept the profound truth

that, without death, there can be no life.' And while there are many more who would support Sabine in her argument, the scales appear to be tipping in favour of those opposed to her views.

The opinions of poets and artists of the past bare little significance when challenged by PACMA's YouTube channel which boasts countless images of animal cruelty.

How far the scales tip and for how much longer the fight goes on remains to be seen. But for as long as there are matadors in Spain, bullfighting will be a topic of much debate, protest and bloodshed.

LEGALLY SPEAKING

Guidance on speeding

AS part of a new series, we answer some common driving questions, kindly provided by members of the Guardia Civil based in Torrevieja, Costa Blanca, who set up the N332 website and Facebook page to help break down barriers.

ACCORDING to Article 51 of the Reglamento General de Circulación: "The maximum fixed speeds for conventional roads which do not pass through urban areas may only be exceeded by up to 20kph by saloon cars and motorcycles whilst overtaking other vehicles travelling at lesser speeds."

This clause first came about to allow cars to pass a slower moving vehicle in the shortest time possible, allowing an increase in speed in order to execute the move quickly.

The word 'execute' being a potential reminder though that overtaking is one of the most dangerous manoeuvres we can carry out. In the event of a head-on collision, our speed is added to that of the oncoming vehicle, and so a crash where two vehicles are travelling at 90 kilometres per hour is the equivalent of crashing at 180 kilometres per hour, when the two speeds are combined.

But the rule does exist and does allow drivers to go over the speed limit, but only in certain circumstances. In order to simplify the explanation, let us break it down to see when this clause can actually apply.

Firstly, we can see that it can only ever apply to cars and motorcycles, so we know the sort of vehicle the allowance applies to.

Secondly, we need to look at the types of roads the clause can apply to. We can see that it is not permitted on motorways. We can also see that it does not apply on dual carriageways. So, we can exclude faster moving roads straight away.

Next, we see that the clause does not apply in towns, or cities for that matter, so we can exclude those routes too.



OVERTAKING: The rules explained.

Now, all that we are left with is so-called conventional roads, single carriageway, with no central reservation and outside of towns. But, then we have to take away those for which a speed limit already applies, because, that speed limit overrules this clause too.

In other words, you are NOT permitted to exceed the speed limit for any reason, including overtaking.

On a conventional road, the maximum permitted speed on a road where no other signs indicate a restriction, and there is a hard shoulder of more than 1.5 metres, is 100 kilometres per hour. On other conventional roads, the maximum permitted speed is 90 kilometres per hour.

This is what we might refer to as the National Speed Limit in UK terms. Incidentally, these roads do sometimes have an R-301 sign.

Finally, we must add sections of roads where overtaking is either prohibited or unadvisable, then that too is an overruling element.

So, the only road where this clause can apply is a conventional road, where no overruling speed limit applies and where overtaking is allowed.

bungalows, Telefonica always asks for permission to run cables along the front of the bungalows but these people do not. I have also e-mailed the Internet company office and asked if they are insured in case of an accident while they work on our roof but have received no reply. What can I do?

ON what should have been Independence Day, pro-secessionist crowds gathered as near to the regional parliament as the police would allow, ready to welcome the Catalan republic.

Silence reigned as Carles Puigdemont's expected UDI declaration inside the parliament chamber was diluted into plans for dialogue over several weeks before severing links with Spain.

Some booed and others went home and meanwhile all the pro-secession MPs signed a piece of paper assuring themselves, the world and their voters that there will be a republic. Eventually.

In the words of the song, 'He didn't say yes and he didn't say no' but it could be enough to get Article 155 slapped on Cataluña.

Blinking shame

DID Carles Puigdemont blink?

Was his failure to declare outright independence influenced by the big businesses already leaving

Cataluña?

The Sabadell and La Caixa banks, which operate nationally, have moved their registered head offices to Alicante and Valencia respectively.

Gas Natural Fenosa has gone, so has the MRW courier service, motorway concessionary Abertis, insurers Catalana Occidente and Axa-España as well as iconic Catalan publishers Planet.

Some names packing their bags mean little to outsiders but Cola Cao, Nocilla and Bimbo are part of every Spanish childhood while San Miguel - that's another familiar one - has left for Malaga where there has been a plant since 1966.

Cava giants Codorniu and Freixenet will move their headquarters if UDI is declared and even the pro-independence multinational pharmaceutical group Grifols would leave after a UDI.

This was always the weapon that would hurt most. More effective and far more painful than baton charges.

In fine voice

DEMONSTRATIONS protesting at Catalan secessionists' disdain for the Constitution and their Statute of Autonomy finally arrived. Did

the pro-independence politicians believe - or hope - that only the national government had noticed what was going on?

The silent and hitherto silenced minority inside Cataluña found its voice and demonstrated in favour of Spanish unity, sending a clear message that Carles Puigdemont, Oriol Junqueras and Anna Gabriel ignore at their peril.

Double vision

PODEMOS SUPREMO Pablo Iglesias insisted weeks ago that there are political prisoners in Spain.

Perplexingly Iglesias won't acknowledge the existence of politi-

cal prisoners in Venezuela, whose government once paid him and other Podemos politicians handsome sums for their advice.

Doubtless if Carles Puigdemont ends up in the slammer he, too, will be regarded a political prisoner, which will make the pair of them happy. Puigdemont can become a martyr and Iglesias will have a big stick that he can use to beat everyone with except himself.

Not to be believed

THERE was the usual ration of fake news, some of it tweeted by Julian Assange.

It was also reported in the *Daily Mail* which, although it is no bastion of liberalism, loves to put the boot in whenever possible where Spain is concerned.

Nevertheless it was a relief to learn that two seedy-looking individuals giving the fascist salute in Madrid weren't at the multitudinous gathering in Colon. Instead they belonged to a 30-strong minidemo in out-of-the-way Plaza Salvador Dali where they attracted more sniggers than cheers.

WHAT a turn-around, with Jessica Raine, a prim and proper midwife in *Call The Midwife* now portraying a sex-crazed alcoholic in *The Last Post* (BBC 1), a new Sunday night of-fering.

Centred around a bunch of Military Policemen (MPs) keeping the peace in Aden - the port city in south Yemen once under British rule - why is it that they wear bright red hats that are surely an open invitation to pot shots without tele-scopical sights.

With steamy scenes, a bit of gore and twists, keep an open mind, for *The Last Post* could develop, and of particular interest as it brought back memories of my own merchant vessel life in the Middle East and Africa at around the same time as the series is focused on.

Zoe Ball is back with *Strictly It Takes Two* (BBC2 Monday to Friday). She is always bubbly and good for a laugh, but why must the crew/audience scream and whoop in *X Factor* style every time someone comes on.

Saturday and Sundays) is surely a weekend must for a big percentage of Brits, it does not focus on the epitome of singing talent, but is just a huge ego trip for the judges, and surely raises the question of how long the tired old format can continue?

From prim and proper to sex-crazed drunk

House prices in the not-so-quiet village of *Emmerdale* (ITV 1 Monday to Friday) must be rock bottom nowadays given the ragged bunch of thieves, murderers, liars, schemers, fraudsters and dogsbodies crammed into one place in this popular soap opera.

While script writers want action, surely not at the total cost of reality!

With people dropping like flies, it is all a long way from its conception of tales of country folk, where the outside scenes were shot in the Yorkshire village of Esholt. The landlord and his wife of the village pub The Woolpack (The Commercial in real life) now live on the Costa Blanca, though the real village inhabitants were nothing like their TV counterparts.

Driven by an unassuming presenter whose travels are always interesting, *Russia with Simon Reeve* (BBC 2 Sunday) gets to the parts others won't or can't access.

His down to earth style and easy going manner provides a different slant on issues in this vast country, from the apparent abject poverty in Tula where alcoholism is 10 times more

prevalent than in the UK.

Featuring the proud descendants of the Mongolian Empire with their horses on the Steppe to the state funded Christian Cossack school in Stavropol, a fascinating non-censored peep at Russia.

Meanwhile I can't see the likes of Germany losing sleep over the England World Cup qualifying rounds televised on ITV. I think the best term is average!

Mrs Browns Boys (BBC 1 repeats on Saturdays), are the marmite of the media, measured with love or hate! The number of people who do not find the series funny still amazes, for I can't get enough of Brendan O'Carroll, a true master of the one liner with the bang on timing of a speaking clock.

Grave New World

Basically paraphrasing Jerry Maguire, Brussels simply said "Show me the money" and there is unlikely to be a trade deal before an agreement is reached about the amount that Britain has to pay in the 'divorce' settlement. It does rather look as if we are heading towards a 'Grave New World.'

Hip pain

THIS week we've asked the doctor about hip pain, a common problem for many especially as the colder months descend.

What are the most common causes of hip pain?

There are many things which can cause hip pain. The most common is osteoarthritis of the hip, when the components of the joints like bones and tendons degenerate over time. Other common causes are infections or injuries.

Eat your way fit

Tivoli World celebrations

CONSIDERED one of the best wines for seafood, Albariño can also be an excellent aperitif.

High quality and light bodied, most of the Spanish Albariño wines are labelled from Rias Baixas in the cooler and wetter area of Galicia that has sandy granite soils ideal for this grape.

In Galician, the name comes from albar, al-
bo, meaning 'white', whitish.'

However, Albariño is also grown in Portugal and

has additionally started to spread to the West Coast of USA, South America and New Zealand, with the grapes similar in taste to Pinot Gris, Chenin Blanc, and dry Riesling.

Believed to have been brought to Iberia from France by Cluny monks in the 12th century, Albariño is light with alcohol levels of 11.5-12.5 per cent.

With a strong aromatic in-

tensity it is loved for its high acidity, refreshing citrus flavours (lemons, limes, pear, grapefruit, honeysuckle, nectarine, apricot

and mango), dry taste, and slight saltiness.

To maintain its acidity and fruity aromas it is best consumed

one to two years after the vintage, although Albariño wines are known to age for five to seven years.

As well as complementing seafood, its acidity and slight bitterness works well alongside white meats and with citrus and/or aromatic herb dishes, and it is also fun to experiment Albariño with Vietnamese and Thai cuisine.

Moderately priced labels (€3 - 7) are produced by

A dream for investors

SPAIN'S real estate sector soaked up more than €8.7 billion during the third quarter of the year. Record levels of foreign investment were behind the 40 per cent year-on-year increase.

“By Christmas an estimated 75,000 homes will have been built.

Business real estate, including shopping centres, has grown the most, while residential, office and hotel properties also reap the benefits of global confidence.

Spain is now in the European top five for real estate investment and is

closing in on the UK and Germany.

More than one billion euros have been pumped into the construction of new homes this year. By Christmas an estimated 75,000 homes will have been built, a 15 per cent increase on 2016.

Foreign investment groups have proven central to the construction boom. An example is Neinor Homes, a Spanish housebuilder created by an American private equity firm in 2014.

Last week Neinor announced its ambition to close 2019 with a turnover exceeding €1 billion. It is aiming for €300 million this year and is currently managing 64 housing development projects across Spain.



LUXURY SECTOR: Subject to buyer flight?

Luxe landlord opportunities

BECOMING a landlord is far more profitable in today's Spain than placing money in a bank account. The average annual profitability on buy-to-let properties is now a very healthy 5.7 per cent.

The sizeable return is up considerably on just a few years ago. In 2013 it was 4.8 per cent. Since then the rental market has flourished thanks to young professional and students.

Returns vary fairly dramati-

cally by region. In Cataluña it is 6.6 per cent, making it the most profitable region to lease property in the country.

Yet the Catalan capital Barcelona offers a cautionary tale for landlords. Rent prices have soared so quickly that they have now plateaued. In 2017 landlords can expect an annual return of 5 per cent less than the Catalan regional average.

Those looking to invest in buy-to-let property should strike while the iron is hot, before rents hit a natural peak.

Meanwhile, buyers interested in owning luxury property might be among the few investors excited by the possibility of Catalan independence.

Luxury real estate agent Uxban has warned of 'buyer flight' from Barcelona, should independence become a reality.

In 2016 more than 80 per cent of the €1 million plus homes sold were purchased by foreigners. Many chose Barcelona property to get a Spanish Golden Visa and a foothold in the European

Union. Both perks which could disappear in the event of separation.

Uxban expect any such crisis to result in a mass flogging of luxury real estate in the city at heavily discounted prices. "This collapse in the price of luxury property would be far more pronounced than that experienced in London after the Brexit vote", said the CEO.

Prices in London's richest areas, such as Chelsea, have plummeted by more than 10 per cent since June 2016.

Summer sales hit budding heights

SALES soared in Spain over the summer, with records showing the best three months for sales since 2011, in May, June and August.

In August, sales crossed the 40,000 threshold again, seen as an indicator of the market's robust health.

Another good sign is that the increase in new home sales surpasses that of second-hand homes. Used homes are still in the ascendancy when it comes to total volume, but new home sales are increasing faster.

New home sales shot up by 21.3 per cent in August, the impressive pace of increase is only

set to continue until Spain's thirst for new homes is quenched.

Per capita, the Valencian community, which includes most of the Costa Blanca, clocked the highest number of sales in August. It averaged 163 sales per 100,000 residents, compared to 152 in the Balearic Islands, and 125 in Andalusia, which registered the highest volume with 8,225 sales in just one month.

Nationwide, there is near unanimity in the property sector that total sales will surpass the half million mark in 2017. Next year's projections are even more optimistic, at around 650,000 sales.

Future dream homes will become reality

HUNDREDS of property experts discussed the future of the Spanish market at the Fotocasa Real Estate Conference 2017.

Fotocasa, one of Spain's biggest property portals, gathered academic, sales and business experts to detail the trends expected over the next few years.

Among the consensus conclusions was the prediction that home prices in large cities will continue to increase until at least 2021.

Keynote speaker Gonzalo Bernardos, an economics professor at Madrid University, said unemployment will soon drop to around 10 per cent, ushering in an era of greater consumer confidence and purchasing power.

This will weaken the rental market and spark sales, he said, while confidently stating that there is no looming risk of another

property bubble.

Head of Studies at Fotocasa, Beatriz Toribio, agreed that the market was stable. She said stricter financing deals and fixed rate mortgages help protect both lenders and consumers.

In recent years the Spaniards have changed their opinion about renting, with

younger generations in particular more open to the market, yet they still dream of buying a home.

Much of the conference was dedicated to sales advice for real estate agents. They were encouraged to view a client relationship as a life-long partnership, rather than simply slamming the door after a sale.

Strawberries on a tree, seems unlikely but...

ONE of the fascinating things about gardening is the variety of plants that are available from various regions around the world. Here in the mediterranean there are a number of lesser known plants that make great ornaments, produce sweet smelling flowers and provide fruit. One of my favourites is the Strawberry tree (*Arbutus unedo*).

You can see the tree growing wild in its native habitats in oak forests in zones below 800 metres in Spain. It has also become domesticated and can be seen in gardens as a feature tree due to its cinnamon coloured bark and deep green foliage being most attractive and highlighted in autumn with bunches of scented white waxy vase shaped flowers in clusters and dangling fruits that ripen individually from green to yellow and finally red when mature over a long period of time.

The fruit resembles a strawberry hanging from the tree but the similarities end there. It does not taste at all like a strawberry. It requires an acquired taste to appreciate and is not a fruit that you usually would eat many of. It is a delight to sample a few on occa-

sions as an alternative to the more common fruits available, if only to try something different.

If you have a tree or can source the fruit it makes wonderful jams with a unique tinge to the taste. It needs the fruit to be fresh to use as the fruit deteriorates quickly once off the tree. Only the soft red fruit is fully ripe and the fruit ripens gradually at different times on the tree making it difficult to collect significant numbers at one time.

This makes it tempting to

pick some nearly ripe to make up volume for making jams but it does reduce the quality of the jam. Some people prefer to collect the fruit regularly

from the ground as they fall once fully ripe. Over ripe fruit can be intoxicating as they ferment.

This is why it is

very difficult to find the preserves and nearly impossible to buy the fresh fruit in good condition. If you are able to

grow the tree you will have a rare flavour to add to the larder. The fruit can be made into a compote, syrup, puree, glaze, jams, jellies, ice cream flavouring and converted into wine and spirits.

It is commercially used to make liqueur and wine in Sardinia and Portugal. The tree, the Madroño tree in Spanish, is featured on the coat of arms for Madrid being hugged by a bear so it is also bearly loved in Spain.

It is a interesting addition to the garden and can grow in a large container. It does not like to be transplanted or moved so it should be located permanently in a partly shaded zone. It is a pioneering and under storey tree that only grows to around five to 10 metres over many decades. It is drought tolerant to survive mediterranean summers but needs watering to get established.

IF your garden isn't exactly a vast, roaming plain abundant with space for you to explore all your gardening fantasies, there are several things you can do to maximise space in a smaller plot.

Thinking outside the box is actually the best way to make the most of your garden's boundaries and can help to create an oasis in the smallest of spaces.

An easy way to trick the eye into thinking your garden is bigger than it is to plant all your shrubs and flowers in close proximity. This will blur the

colours and dimensions to a stunning effect, giving your garden a more natural vibe.

Aim to have your tallest plants at the back or around the edges of your garden and then work down to your smallest shrubs.

A potted herb garden is a great feature of smaller gardens as not only will it look pretty and smell great, it is also a great way to maximise space.

Larger than life


Nothing quite beats using your own herbs when you're cooking and they're also beneficial to the natural eco-system.

I THOUGHT that this week I would write about my weekly show on Talk Radio Europe from 10-11am.

My team consist of Nazli, our vet from the Pointer Clinic Estepona, and Celia Haddon, an expert on small animals especially cats. Celia was the pet agony aunt for the UK *Telegraph*. This week Rona Brown sat in for Celia who is taking a climbing holiday.

Rona Brown is known for her work on movies *Fish Tank* (2009), *Creation* (2009) and *Gorillas in the Mist* (1988).

This week The Boris Bulletin

from Barrie Nathan about his cat Boris who is a she!

“Our morning schedule is as follows. Boris waits for me to a ablute in my bathroom, she then comes in and jumps onto her cushion which lives on the corner of the bath (I prefer bathing to showering), she then waits patiently for me to get in the bath, which may be as long as a 30 minute delay. Only when I get into the bath does she raise herself from her cushion, leans into the tub and starts drinking the hot water. She knows the water level is substantially higher after my entry! After about two minutes she gets off the bath and goes back to bed.”

Nazli mentioned that there are reports of dog poisoning and to be extra careful in dog parks and recommends a muzzle. I know most of you will say ‘my dog does not like a muzzle’, believe me they get used to a muzzle and it will protect your dog from putting his nose into trouble. Give the muzzle a try not once but a few times and of course reward when taking off.

Nazli says: “My vet has asked me to bring a urine sample of my dog, how do I do this?” You will need a clean container. For the female dog you can use a ladle, so that you do not have to crouch down when she squats, and pour the urine into the container, (do wash the ladle thoroughly afterwards). The male dog will sniff an

area, position himself and lift up his leg to urinate. Place the container in the flow of the urine, fill the container and then wash your hands. If you have problems then why not go to a professional for help at Pointer Clinic dog school.

Mic Martin, the famous trainer from Dog Borstal at the BBC joined us for the second half of the show. I

would mention that those attending Dog Borstal, if they get it wrong they can expect a punishment as Mic says “It’s the owners fault, not the dog.”

They can get ‘press-ups’ or running round the field, etc.

Mic worked in the Police Special Services as an instructor and certainly knows all about dogs from scent and rescue work. Mic spoke about the relationship one must have with the dog which is of prime importance. Like me he dislikes harnesses and flexi leads and explained a few simple rules “Stop the dog licking you” as germs can be passed.

Protecting pooches

IT might have taken the government 30 years, but European laws ensuring the protection of animals will finally be put into practice in Spain next year.

As from February 2018, it will be illegal to modify animals for aesthetic purposes, such as getting rid of the tail or claws, unless a vet decides it is necessary for medical purposes or believes that it would be beneficial for the animal. It will also become illegal to give

them away as rewards or prizes.

These laws protecting animals were actually passed by the EU nearly 30 years ago but are only just coming into practice in Spain now. They also emphasise that animals should only be given or sold to children under the age of 16 with their parents’ permission, to help decrease the number of animals that become cast out on the street.

The laws will also regulate how animals are allowed to be

bred, and the conditions in which they should be kept. It also clarifies who is allowed to kill a pet animal and under which circumstances, namely that a person is only allowed to kill a suffering animal if it is impossible to seek the assistance of a vet.

Spanish media sources report that some of the regional communities will have to check the new rules against their own regulations as there could be conflicts with local law that permit certain animal practices.

Porsche on-demand

German giant reinvents the wheel

ON-DEMAND Porsches are now available in an American pilot project. In exchange for a monthly charge, the German giant will deliver a Porsche model of the customer's choosing to their home, or any other location.

The pilot is being rolled out in the southern American city of Atlanta. Drivers can choose between two different membership plans. For \$2,000 (€1,700) a month they have access to eight Porsche models, including the Cayenne and 718 Boxster.

For \$3,000 (€2,500) a month almost the entire Porsche collection is at their

disposal, with on-demand access to 22 models, including the top of the range Carrera S, Panamera 4S, and classic 911.

Ordering a Porsche is as simple as ordering a pizza. Customers will have their Porsche app on their smart phone. They can pick a model, delivery spot and time frame.

A businessman looking to make a splash at a meeting might order a flashy sports model. But if he's taking a road trip with the family might prefer a roomier Cayenne.

"Our Strategy 2025 vision is to be

the most aspirational brand in a new era of mobility and consumer expectations,” said CEO of Porsche Cars North America Klaus Zellner. “With Porsche Passport, we now offer our customers a simple and flexible driving

solution at their fingertips.”

Mileage is unlimited, and full insurance included in the monthly fee. Extensive driving and credit checks are carried out on clients.

Porsche Passport is similar to Jaguar's concept of selling steering wheels instead of cars. Drivers would be able to order Jags to the doorstep, then use their personalised wheel with all their preferences, routes, and driving history to enjoy a smoother ride.

Both ideas represent a sea change in the concept of car ownership.

A FERRARI SUV is now a 'dead serious' proposition, according to CEO Sergio Marchionne. Just last year the same man told press "you'd have to shoot me first," spitting out the sleek Italian brand's distaste for the SUV phenomenon.

But last week he presented plans to inject a Ferrari version into the extremely competitive marketplace. Standing outside the New York Stock Exchange he said his firm would redefine the field with the new FUV, or Ferrari Utility Vehicle.

Ferrari will follow high-class competitors Bentley and Porsche into the crowded SUV market. The Lamborghini Urus SUV is set for a 2019 debut. But Marchionne pledged to maintain the brand's exclusive aura by keeping production low.

O'Brien eyes £4.3m prize money at Ascot

QIPCO British Champions Day in record

ASCOT hosts the QIPCO British Champions Day - the richest race day in the British calendar on Saturday October 21 - with Irish trainer Aidan O'Brien eyeing £4.3 million prize money.

The world's top sprinters, over six furlongs, long distance horses, over two miles, and the fillies and mares, over 1m 4f, will be racing.

Champion trainer O'Brien is looking for one more winner in the QIPCO British Champions 2017 Series to achieve a record haul.

Flat racing's showcase event sees the world's leading trainers, horses and top jockeys at Ascot in the finale of the 2017 European Flat racing season.

The QIPCO British Champions Series features the QIPCO British Championship (Group 2) with a prize fund

September, gave O'Brien his 10th winner in this year's Series. And O'Brien will be raiding Ascot this year - eyeing a repeat of bagging £5,648,937 in the 2016 Series.

O'Brien, who has won £5,153,693 in the 2017 Series, has a plethora of entries, including 2015 Gold Cup winner Order of St George.

Caravaggio, who won the Commonwealth Cup at Royal Ascot in June, is entered in the QIPCO British Champions Sprint Stakes.

O'Brien has duplicate entries in the QIPCO British Champions Fillies & Mares Stakes, including Winter, Rhododendron, Seventh Heaven and Hy-

drangea, prior to the final stage declarations.

In the Queen Elizabeth II Stakes O'Brien's pre-race entries includes duo Churchill and Winter, who have won four Classics between them, along with Alice Springs and Roly Poly.

Ballydoyle based O'Brien could run Churchill in the QIPCO Champion Stakes, being a pre-race entry, alongside Highland Reel and Winter.

The QIPCO Champion Stakes, Europe's richest mile-and-a-quarter contest, sees the entry of Enable, ranked third best in the world in the wake of winning the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Stakes ahead of Ulysses, Idaho and Highland Reel, all of who are entered.

"It's a great day - a meeting we've had success at in the past. We hope to be supporting the whole day with runners," said Gosden.

Richard Hannon trained Barney Roy, winner of the St James's Palace Stakes, is entered in the QIPCO British Champions Day.

"I'm not sure which race he goes for. He's very effective over a mile - a mile and a quarter isn't a problem either," said Hannon.

Richard Fahey trained Ribchester is also eyeing the Queen Elizabeth II Stakes on QIPCO British Champions Day, the richest Group 1 mile race run in Europe.

Churchill is just one horse who could oppose Ribchester - among a record pre-race entry of 48 horses for the £1.1 million race.

Classic winners Churchill and Winter could face opposition in UAE 2000 Guineas and Derby winner Thunder Snow, who won the Group 1 Prix Jean Prat at Chantilly.

"Thunder Snow has been a star horse for me this year. I would like to run him at Ascot on QIPCO British Champions Day," said trainer Saeed bin Suroor.

"We will look at both the Queen Elizabeth II Stakes and the QIPCO Champion Stakes," added bin Suroor.

"I prepare well for a tournament. If I don't believe in myself who else will?" said Rahm.

In 2012 Rahm won the Campeonato de España Junior Y Boys, Campeonato Absoluto País Vasco, followed by the 2014 ASU Thunderbird Invitational, Campeonato de España Absoluto, Eisenhower Trophy (individual title).

After the 2016 US Open, Rahm turned professional and in August 2017, Rahm reached a career-high ranking of No 5 in the world after a maiden professional victory on the US PGA Tour at the end of January.
