The girls are believed to

be part of a larger crime network, with several having previous criminal records for stealing.

The police were able to recover some of the stolen cash and jewellery and have not ruled out making further arrests. They also recommended that older residents keep their doors locked and not trust any strangers who try to get into their homes.

Melia vice-president and CEO Gabriel Escarrer said the awards show the Melia Group's expansion in the luxury hotel industry. "Our products compete with the best in the world," he said. Escarrer, aged 82, is one of Mallorca's richest men, worth billions and in control of more than 300 hotels around the world.

# Minister under fire

VICE-PRESIDENT of the Balearic Islands, Biel Barcelo, is fighting for his political life after a series of scandals. Opposition parties in the Balearic parliament are demanding his resignation, but President Francina Armengol continues to offer Barcelo her full support.

The demands comes amid a turbulent week for her administration. Director general for tourism, Pilar Carbonell, was forced to resign after being named in the Cursach investigation. There are allegations that she was 'sympathetic' to the Cursach Group, owned by accused mob boss Tolo Cursach who is on trial for extortion, murder and drug trafficking.

Barcelo, who is minister for tourism, says he is convinced that Carbonell is innocent of any wrongdoing. But the conservative Popular Party (PP) and left-wing Podemos both claim that his position is untenable in the wake of the allegations.

Marga Prohens of the PP says Barcelo has become a liability for the tourism office, which needs a fresh

start under new command. She says that Barcelo seems to leave a body in his wake every three months, referring to the number of senior officials allied to him who have been forced to resign over an array of

No suggestions have been made that Barcelo himself is corrupt, but Prohens says he has been tainted by

> the allegations and that his competency is now in auestion.

# Grisly find

A DECOMPOSED body with no head or limbs was found floating near a Son Serra de Marina beach by a German passerby who mistook the corpse for a person drowning. The Guardia Civil suggested it could belong to a migrant who drowned off the Italian coast.

# Deadly drunk

A MAN died on Monday three days after being injured in a car crash. The 26-year-old was a passenger in the car when his friend lost control and smashed into a Palma wall. The female driver was four times over the limit and faces negligent homicide charges.

# Flight focus

TRAVEL company Thomas Cook has confirmed that it will open Thomas Cook Airlines Balearics to add to its British, German and Scandinavian groups. The new airline will be based on Mallorca from spring 2018, offering flyers more flexibility with competitive pricing according to a press release.

## Lock and load

A REPORT from the Guardia Civil says there are more than 100,000 licensed firearms on the Balearic Islands, including hunting rifles, pistols and police-issued weapons. Guns are present in an estimated 40,000 households across the islands with ownership subject to tough regulations.

# Fantastic beasts

THERE are more than 150 animal species in danger of extinction in Spain, according to the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Environment. Overdevelopment of rural areas and coastal zones are blamed for destroying habitats and putting the lives of many species at risk.


The environmental group Ecologists in Action warned that Spain has the most fragile biodiversity in Europe and has urged the government to tackle the destruction of habitats and protect the country's creatures.

# **Iberian Lynx**

REGARDED as the world's most endangered wild cat, there are fears that the Iberian Lynx may soon disappear for good. Recognised by its heavily spotted coat, long legs and short tail, this species of lynx is under peril because of a number of different threats. The lynx was once regarded as a hunting trophy, and was valued for its fur and meat. Although it became illegal to hunt them in the early 1970s, the cats are still victims of traps and snares set for other animals.

The Iberian Lynx's diet was severely impacted when the rabbit population was struck by a series of epidemics. It has also been affected by the development of roads and motorways, which has

# **Spanish Imperial Eagle**

ONCE in immediate danger of extinction, with only 30 breeding pairs recorded in Spain in the 1960s, the Spanish Imperial Eagle has grown in population size in recent years. The bird was threatened by the decline in rabbits, loss of habitat and a high number of collisions with pylons. However, there are now an estimated 500 breeding pairs on the Iberian Peninsula, with 15 chicks born in Cadiz's Doñana region last year alone, due to several conservation

## Cantabrian Brown bear

THE rare Cantabrian Brown bear was nearly extinct 40 years ago. The government estimates that only six were left in the wild by the 1980s but, thanks to a significant conservation effort, numbers are now back up to around 200. The bears were so despised by farmers for destroying crops in the 18th and 19th centuries that hunters were actually paid to kill them. Hunting was eventually banned in 1968 and the bears became officially protected in 1973.

# Flight frenzy

BLACK FRIDAY is tomorrow and there are incredibly cheap flight deals available to snatch up online. Mallorca residents who fly from Palma have a terrific range of online options to choose from but will have to act quickly as the websites will be jammed with traffic from around the world.

Black Friday is the world's biggest sales day. Low-cost airlines are expected to flog hundreds of thousands of even cheaper seats in tomorrow's selling frenzy.

Among them are tickets from Palma to Madrid, Barcelona, Malaga and Valencia from just €5 being offered by Ryanair.

Spanish outfit Vueling is offering cheap roundtrips to Paris and Rome starting at €44 and €66 respectively.

Perhaps the biggest savings to be made are with Norwegian, which has made a name for itself offering long distance budget flights to the Americas and Asia. A return to Bangkok will cost just €342, returns to Boston in January start at €118, while sunny Miami can be visited for just €147.

# Military solution

A FORMER military barracks is set to be converted into public housing. The Son Busquets site in the north side of Palma will be cleared and replaced with 831 apartments.

The move comes as part of an agreement between Palma Council and the Ministry of De-

The sprawling site covers 111,000 square metres and has been abandoned for 14 years. Initial plans were to build 1,663 apartments but the number was halved over planning concerns.

Of the 800-odd homes, half will be for social housing to help combat Palma's housing crisis. The other half will be sold by private developers.

# Hotel prices skyrocket

# **Emissions** scandal

A MALLORCA resident won compensation after being sold a rigged Volkswagen in Palma. The Volkswagen Tiguan had a serious flaw with the electronic device used to record pollution emissions.

The case is one of thousands haunting the German car manufacturer, which has come under fire for altering its emissions recorders to ensure its cars pass tough environmental regulations.

In this car the buyer

wanted the sale of contract annulled.

This was rejected by a Palma court, which nevertheless found that he deserved compensation. A new emissions recorder was fitted and he won €500 compensation.

It wasn't the first case dealt with by Palma's courts in relation to the Volkswagen emissions scandal.

It is unlikely to be the last, with thousands of Volkswagens sold on the island each year.

# An easier time for the Euro

# Commentary by Moneycorp

THE pound appears to have had several narrow misses over the last few weeks. Other than an initial dip, there was little lasting response to the Bank of England's change in interest rates from 0.25% to 0.5% and although Theresa May has initiated two cabinet reshuffles in as many weeks, investors have largely ignored the drama and focused on the Brexit talks. Barnstorming speeches in the House of Commons and several Conservative MPs looking set to defy the party line suggest that whatever the outcome, the path to Brexit will not run smooth.

Against this backdrop of debate and discord, there has been nothing in the way of a helping hand for the pound from economic statistics; the BRC measure of UK retail sales showed that shopkeepers had their worst October in either five years or nine years, according to which of the data are used for comparison and an SMMT report demonstrated the seventh consecutive monthly decline in car sales, falling by 12% in October. The only bright spot was the UK services sector purchasing managers' index - in

stead of falling to 53.3, as forecast, it went up to 55.6. It seems, however, that investors are increasingly inured to statistics which fall outside of forecast - even the CPI inflation rate for October coming in at 3% against a forecast 3.1% caused only a brief flutter before the market settled down again.

The euro has been having an easier time. The 1.6% monthly fall in German industrial output was twice as negative as analysts had forecast, dragging annual production growth down from 4.6% to 3.6%. Investors' initial reaction was to mark down the euro initially but it soon mounted a recovery. More recently, the euro has been emerging as the winner from the day's trading.

On Tuesday last week, the euro broke through the support/resistance level at around \$1.1670 that had held since July. It then went on to crack the downtrend that had constrained it in September and October. This was further bolstered by another positive round of stats, third quarter growth was steady at 0.6% and ZEW's survey of investor sentiment jumped four points to 30.9.

The euro's gains against sterling were less cut and dried but it still took a cent off the pound, bringing its tally for the week to two cents.

The US dollar continues to be a currency that doesn't quite fulfil its potential. Recent statistics have been a mixed bag, jobs data were better than expected, in as much as nonfarm payrolls were 36k above forecast when revisions to earlier months were taken into account. But the monthly figure for October fell 50k short of target and wage growth slowed from 2.8% to 2.4%. The recent elections provided a string of successes for the Democrats, but the markets seemed largely unmoved, perhaps having anticipated a shift in mood as the Mueller investiga-

tion rumbles on. The primary focus for the dollar is on the upcoming release of inflation figures, which are due to be released at the same time as October's retail sales. This is because these will be the last figures to appear before the Fed's rate decision, due on December 13, and as such may provide a clue as to what action the Federal Reserve is likely to take.

It has generally been all quiet on the Canadian front, which continues to perform well and maintains a position in the middle of the pack despite less than stellar statistics. Unemployment ticked up from 6.2% to 6.3% but the net gain of 35k jobs in October was twice as big as expected. A speech from the Bank of Canada's Stephen Poloz had little to no impact and with such dramatic goings-on elsewhere in the world, Canada appears to keep going quietly about its business with much less drama.

Down under, the big news may have been the poll for marriage equality in Australia, but in terms of the dollar, it's been very much more of the same. The Reserve Bank of Australia kept its Cash Rate benchmark steady at 1.5%, which has been in effect since August last year. There was, in the announcement, a nod to the strength of the currency, but later on the Aussie dollar last out due to a shake -up in commodity, equity and energy prices.







# Dubbed the 'gateway to Europe' by drug cartels, is Spain doing

# Cocaine nights and days

With more than 20 tons of cocaine seized in Spain last year, it is time to talk about the white stuff. David Noon takes a deeper look into the nation's coke habit to find out where it is coming from, where it is going and most importantly, what is being done to stop it.

F in Spain and after cocaine, you shouldn't find it too hard to come by. While the sea ports in the north and south see more than 20 tons seized each year, a whole lot more slips through the net and seeps into the country and on to the wider continent.

Known as the drug trafficker's gateway to Europe, Spain sees more coke shipped onto its shores than any other country in Europe.

And while not all of it stays in Spain, locals have undoubtedly developed a taste for the drug.

In fact, Spaniards are the second-highest consumers of the white stuff in Europe.

With 9.1 per cent of Spaniards (aged 15 - 65) openly admitting to taking cocaine at one time or another they sit just behind the Brits (9.7 per cent) in terms of consumption, according to the European Monitoring Centre for Drugs and Drug Addiction (EMCDDA) official 2017 European Drug Report.

In terms of world consumption, Spaniards are fifth, while the Brits are one place higher, with Albania topping the charts just ahead of the Scots, according to the latest information on the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime website.

Surprisingly Colombians are down in 34th, as while they are the number one manufacturer of cocaine they ship most of what they make.

While Spain ranks high, the country is (slowly)

Nowadays, only 1 per cent of the nation's population are regular users, however a delegate for the government's drug prevention unit (the GDNPD), Francisco Babín, believes more can still be done. "For a long time, we topped the tables for cocaine use and although we are now in second place [in Europe], we

can't be complacent," he says. "For instance, the EMCDDA's Statistical Bulletin shows Spain still has the highest score for the 'prevalence [of use] in the last month category. It's pretty worrying, although

consumption has dropped in the last decade," adds Babín. "Cocaine was in the spotlight for a long time because there was an epidemic," he says.

"However, its prevalence and the consequences of use of the drug have led the GDNPD to suggest we are on the brink of a second epidemic."

When you think of drugs and Spain, you automatically think of happy-go-lucky holidaymakers revelling in haunts renowned as party towns.

The likes of Ibiza, Puerto Banus and Magaluf have a reputation - like it, or not - for being party zones where the good times flow and drugs are available on tap. And while a fair amount of the white stuff may be consumed in Spain's touristfilled party resorts, that is just the tip of the iceberg. In reality, cocaine is consumed up and down the length and breadth of the country.

And while it may be prevalent on the dancefloors it is at the country's ports where the drug begins its journey across the Iberian peninsular.

Every week, jaw-dropping seizures of amounts of coke are made at ports from Algeciras in the south to Vigo in the Galician heartland.

Earlier this month, more than a ton of cocaine bound for Algeciras was intercepted in Germany on its way from Colombia.

With a street value of €75 million, the interception was just the latest example of the Drug

# Ramsay's cocaine nightmares


IT is hardly the natural follow-on from his successful 'Kitchen Nightmares' show.

Swapping the kitchen for the jungle, foul-mouthed celebrity chef Gordon Ramsay launched into getting to the bottom of Europe's drug problem.

He was driven to take on a topic close to his heart after a 'dear friend' lost his life to cocaine addiction, paying particular attention to the cocaine culture which apparently is rife within the catering trade.

Claiming that he has been offered coke by customers, seen chefs taking it on the job, Ramsav even claimed to have been asked to sprinkle cocaine on top of a soufflé by celebrity clients.





SAY what you will about drug smugglers, their creativity cannot be denied. The days of lining suitcases with cocaine are long gone as gangs come up with ingenious ways to transport their product. Here are some of the most surreal drug busts disguised on Spain's shores.



# Surreal smuggles

In March the Guardia Civil intercepted 17 kilos of cocaine inside banana skins. Hidden inside cardboard boxes on their way to Malaga and Valencia, 57 simulated resin bananas containing cocaine were hidden among real bananas. It resulted in the arrest of two men; a Spaniard and an Italian.

ORANGE ALERT Just last month, two containers of Brazilian oranges were seized at the port of Algeciras. Hidden among the fruit were 250 camouflaged packages of cocaine, died orange to avoid detection. Police recovered 290 kilograms of cocaine and were able to link it to a South American supplier.

They may be dubbed a 'super food' but one batch of almonds had a secret ingredient stashed inside its container. Delivered to a plant in Alicante in September. police seized around 200 kilos of cocaine hidden beneath the nuts. Shipped from California the Guardia Civil are hoping to

use the seizure as part of a wider investigation.

### MORE NUTS!

It is not just Spain's ports that receive hidden drug packages, the airports confiscate their fair share of suspect items too. In June, 48 kilos of liquid cocaine was found inside a coconut at Madrid airport, hidden among 65 boxes of coconuts from Colombia. The coconut had been drained and refilled, with the seizure leading to two Colombian men and a Venezuelan woman being

Enforcement Agency (DEA), in the US, working with respective bodies around Europe to prevent the South American product from entering Europe.

And yet, while seizing a ton of cocaine is not to be sniffed at (excuse the pun), far more is getting into the country than is being intercepted.

In 2015 more than 60 per cent of all drug seizures in the European Union were reported by just three countries: Spain, France and the United Kingdom.

Spain alone accounted for 70 per cent of all cannabis resin coming into Europe, the majority of seizures taking place in the ports along the south coast with the product shipping in from Morocco. And when it comes to cocaine, Spain again tops the charts when it comes to seizures.

In total, around 87,000 seizures of cocaine were reported in the European Union in 2015. Together, Belgium, Spain, France, Italy and Portugal account for 78 per cent of the estimated 69.4 tons seized.

The situation has remained relatively stable for the last 10 years, although both the number of seizures and the quantity held increased between 2014 and 2015 by around 3 per cent.

While Spain continues to be the country seizing the most cocaine (22 tons), Belgium (17 tons) and France (11 tons) also held large amounts in 2015.

So why is Spain such a popular destination for

smugglers looking for a way into Europe?

Up north in Galicia, the ports are renowned as the gateway to Europe in terms of drugs entering from South America

The Galician Mafia - a collective term for the numerous clans (mainly Galician, some British) that reside in the area - set up strong connections to the narco-traffickers in Colombia during the 1980s and '90s, as well as establishing strong ties to cannabis smugglers in Morocco. And like anywhere in Spain, where there is crime there is corruption.

Allegations of political corruption arose when pictures were found of Galician leader Alberto Núñez Feijóo on holiday with convicted smuggler Marcial

The People's Party of Galicia has also been accused of being financed with narco money.

And some local politicians, including Alfredo Bea Gondar (mayor of O Grove 1983 - 1991) and José Ramón Barral Martínez 'Nené' (mayor of Ribadumia 1983 - 2001) have been sentenced for crimes relating to drug gangs in the past.

Meanwhile, in the south, along the Costa del Sol, the Costa Blanca and Costa de la Luz as well as on Spain's islands the expat gangs - be it Russians, Brits or Irish - have long set up camp.

Barely a week goes by without a report of an expat

drug gang being split up.

In December 2015 it was the turn of British drug lord Robert Dawes, whose multi-million euro cocaine-fuelled empire came crashing down when the Guardia Civil stormed his home in Benalmadena in dramatic fashion. Dubbed 'Europe's biggest drug lord' Dawes, originally from Nottingham, was extradited to France where he faced charges of transporting a ton of cocaine.

He is also wanted by the police in the Netherlands in connection to a number of murders.

Earlier this year, a British drugs gang was again rumbled on Spanish soil. Accused of flooding the Balearic Islands with cocaine and supplying holidaymakers with their fix, 12 Brits from Manchester and Liverpool were arrested in a raid in Mallorca.

The gang reportedly shipped their product around Spain's islands using speedboats to capitalise on the summer surge in demand from young holidaymakers. No doubt there will be more tales of expat - and local gangs busted for dealing enormous amounts of co-



# **Damages** awarded

**FINANCE** 

A JUDGE has awarded €1.6 billion in damages to the Spanish state after a probe into the 2002 Prestige oil spill.

The regional court in A Coruña, Galicia also handed €1.8 million to Galician authorities and €61 million to France, with the captain of the ship and a British insurance firm among those fined.

The disaster saw 63,000 tonnes of oil leak into the sea, causing huge environmental damage across almost 3,000 kilometres of coastline in Spain, Portugal and France affected.

# Hotel mega deal

A MERGER could see Spain's biggest hotel group created.

It comes as Madrid-based NH Hotel Group confirmed a possible multi-billion Euro takeover bid by rival company Grupo Barcelo.

NH, which operates nearly 400 hotels in 31 nations, has an estimated value of €1.75 billion.

Privately owned Barcelo - headquartered in Mallorca and with over 230 hotels in 21 countries on its portfolio would own a 60 per cent stake and assume a board majority in the merged group, NH said in a statement to the

And with predicted annual revenues of around €3.7 billion, the new alliance is forecast to become Spain's largest hotel group ahead of Melia Hotels, which at the end of 2016 controlled 375 hotels with 96,369 rooms.

But NH has reportedly received the offer with a degree of scepticism after confirming receipt of 'an unsolicited, preliminary and non-binding interest' from Barcelo.

The firm also said that its board of

directors has recently approved a threeyear strategic plan "with an independent, fast-growth project that remains valid today.'

The statement added that should this position change, an announcement to the stock market would follow.

NH last year voted to remove a cochairman and three board members appointed by its largest shareholder, Chinese conglomerate HNA.

The sackings came amid allegations of a conflict of interest after HNA took over the Carlston-Rezidor Hotel Group.

# Bank to pay former chief

SPANISH banking group Santander has agreed to pay a former chief executive more than €590 million.

It comes as Santander Consumer USA (Scusa), the company's sub-prime auto-lending subsidiary, moves to forget its underperforming history.

Thomas Dundon, 46, was a cofounder of Drive Financial, a motoring finance company that Santander acquired in 2006 and later rebranded.

He stepped down as CEO in 2015, with the exit package for severance and his near 10 per cent stake in the firm, stating that he will not compete with or hire anyone from Scusa until 2019.

# Online giants to stream football?

AMAZON and Facebook are likely to enter the bidding for Spanish football streaming rights.

The tech giants have both expressed an interest in attending the next round of talks for deals. set to be awarded for the 2019-2022 seasons and expected to be worth an eye-watering €2.3 billion per season.

Spanish league president, Javier Tebas confirmed the pair have been in contact at a press conference in which he said: "We will listen to everybody."

The rights are expected to be sold in early 2018 and Tebas added that the league is looking to ramp up the price compared to the last three year deal which covers 2016-2019 and generates €1.6 billion per season.

# THIS LITTLE PIG DIDN'T GO TO MARKET

A CONTROVERSIAL campaign to promote the consumption of pork was suspended in Madrid ahead of schedule according to animal rights ac-

With Jamon being such a staple of the Spanish diet and pork meat still being regularly eaten in different forms, organisers, Interporc thought that the Pork Lovers Tour would be an immediate success encouraging even greater consumption of the meat.

What they had not expected was the fact that cities such as Barcelona and Bilbao refused permission for them to park their tour bus in the centres and Madrid only allowed them at one shopping centre.

Where they did manage to stop, even for a few hours, animal rights activists turned up and picketed the bus, carrying placards decrying the intensive farms which often supply large amounts of meat to the market.

The activists under the banner of AnimaNaturalis clearly caused a great deal of embarrassment to the organisers and whilst the concept of the tour was to promote the pork industry, protestors carrying images of allegedly ill-treated animals didn't help.

In addition, the protestors explained to potential visitors that according to their research, pork meat was potentially one of the most hazardous meats to eat due to the fact that not only were factory farmed pigs fed large amounts of antibiotics but contained parasites which are not always killed during the cooking process.

"We do not know for sure if they have suspended the campaign but the truth is that not even their social networks announce their routes," explained Lucio Kacic, coordinator of AnimaNaturalis in Madrid.

"They give the impression of not being very proud of what they are do-

ing and it is very controversial to promote the consumption of pork meat when all studies and organisations like the WHO recommend reducing or eliminating their consumption," he added.

The organisation intends to picket any further promotions within Spain although according to Interporc, the tour has ended with stops at 28 different spots in Spain and the United Kingdom, attracting a total

# Decision day over **EMA** base

# BANKIA PROBLEMS CONTINUE TO HAUNT THE ECONOMY

# Rodrigo Rato fraud charge

THE former head of Bankia, Rodrigo Rato who was previously found guilty for misuse of company credit cards is now to be tried for fraud.

A massive case has been approved by the courts in Madrid which will see Rato together with 30 former Bankia executives alongside Bankia itself and its parent company as well as international accountants, Deloitte and one of its employees, all being charged.

The case will hinge on alleged investor fraud as well as falsification of Bankia's 2010 and 2011 accounts which was undertaken in order to ensure that the newly formed bank could obtain a stock market listing.

Bankia was formed by the merger of seven regional savings banks and was headed by former government minister and head of the IMF, Rodrigo Rato but within one year of being launched on the stock exchange, the bank had to be rescued.

So devastating was the impending failure of Bankia that the entire Spanish banking sector was in danger of crashing leading to the government

having to raise €41 billion from foreign loans in order to support all of those banks caught up in what had become a major financial crisis.

Bankia is today the fourth largest bank in Spain but is effectively owned by the Spanish government. It is in the process of repaying tens of thousands of small, private investors who were persuaded to buy shares when they were launched due to the fake accounts and reports of prosperity.

The prosecutors in this case have

argued that as CEO of Bankia, Rato had to have known the true state of affairs of its finances and have called for a five year jail sentence if he is found guilty as charged.

He has already been sentenced to four years and six months imprisonment for his improper use of credit cards and personal expenses during his roles at Caja Madrid and then Bankia.

When he was questioned about the Bankia flotation during this first trial, he declared that all of the decisions concerning the placing of shares were made by the Spanish government which should accept all responsibility for the date of the launch and the subsequent need to support the

The former IMF chairman who was expelled from the ruling Partido Popular in 2014 was found guilty in February 2017, immediately put in an appeal and has spent very little time in prison although he had to lodge large amounts of his personal fortune with

# Ministerial meeting to strengthen ties

Originally founded as a producer of

wooden duck toys, it wasn't until 1949 that the company came up with the concept of producing plastic bricks and from this simple concept, a complex empire was created which has earned a fortune for the family which

Some astute decisions including the creation of theme parks, purchases of licences for movies like Star Wars and Harry Potter and most recently the launch of Lego-based films has seen it become the most financially successful toy company in the world.

Sales are down for the first time in a decade but time will tell whether this is a short term hiccup or if popularity of the plastic bricks is on the wane.

3-2-1 is bulletproof: three backups of your data, on two different types of media, one of them off-site.

Too much trouble? Then download a free backup program, from simple file duplicators like SyncFolders, to full hard-disk copiers like Easus ToDo, Macrium Reflect or the horribly-named Aomei Backupper. Or just use the backup program which came free with your system.

Some are even 'just set and forget': tell it where to backup your data and when, click and hasta la vista baby: automatic backups daily, weekly, monthly into infinity and beyond.

Or you can be thoroughly modern and backup to the 'cloud' - but beyond a certain volume of data you'll pay, and you need seriously good broadband come the day you need it all back again.

# Every hard disk is guaranteed... to crash

Blessed are those who backup, for their data will be safe on the day of failure, says intrepid backer-upper TERENCE KENNEDY.

A MACHO colleague always insisted with a smirk that 'Real men don't backup.' Then he got hacked. Oops.

Sadder was the fate of two friends who lost their family photos forever, simply because their computer crashed.

Whether through exhaustion, a virus or an unplanned act of gravity. devices fail. They even have an official 'MTBF' (Mean Time Before Failure) which used to be advertised but now isn't because it might scare

Human MTBF is about 600,000 hours. You're doing well if your harddisk manages even a 10th of that.

I'm constantly astonished at how many people never even think about backing up their data. Probably because watching YouTube cat videos is more fun. But safe storage really is a

Step 1: Choose it so you don't lose it: 'consolidate' your documents, emails, photos, music and those priceless kitten videos somewhere you can easily locate them on your computer. eg a Documents folder (the default in most systems), E-mails, Photos, Mu-

Step 2: Find something to backup to - a physical device like a USB memory stick, an old SD card or an external hard-drive. Not just somewhere else on your existing hard-drive or computer. That's like keeping your spare front-door key on your

keyring with the existing one.

These days you can pick up an external hard drive for €100 or so, or loads less for a USB flash drive if your needs are more modest.

Step 3: Backup, then backup your backup. Well, okay, that's only for the real pessimists, or the true professionals who insist that you can never have enough backups, with three as the absolute minimum.

It's the work of minutes, with any of the dozens of (free) back-up programs available online, or those built into your device's operating system.

Step 4: Store your backup somewhere safe. Not on or in your desk. Not even, if you are truly anal, on the same premises.

Bitter techno-trauma and tears have moulded my own backup regime: my laptop data gets copied to an SD card as I create it, to a USB stick at the end of every working day. to an external hard drive at the end of every week, and to a second hard-drive kept off-premises every month.

Sadly, there's more. I also clone my entire hard-drive to an identical copy of itself every week so when the wotsit hits the ventilator I can be up and running again in the flash of a screwdriver. But the rest of you probably have lives to live.

# Alcohol limits and penalties

WE answer some common driving questions, kindly provided by members of the Guardia Civil based in Torrevieja, Costa Blanca, who set up the N332 website and Facebook page to help break down barriers.



IT is often not realised that the maximum permitted alcohol limit in Spain is considerably lower than many other European countries, including the UK.

It is also worth noting that these limits are precisely that, a maximum that is permitted. Alcohol affects people differently and the only real safe limit is zero.

That said, in Spain the maximum legally

permitted alcohol limit is in general 0.25 mg/l (or 0.15 mg/l if you are a learner driver / professional drivers). If the amount of alcohol exceeds this limit, the driver will be heavily fined and lose several points from their li-

In the event such amount of the breathalyzer exceeds 0.60 mg/l, the driver becomes subject to a criminal proceeding and will be arrested.

# The fines

Professional / novice drivers - 0.15-0.30mg/l - €500 + 4 points, from 0.30mg/l - €1.000 + 6points. Other drivers - 0,25-0,50mg/l -  $\leq$ 500 + 4 points, from 0,50mg/l -  $\leq$ 1,000 + 6 points.

A blood test is only available when you have finished the alcohol test and you disagree with the result. Refusal to co-operate is also considered a criminal offence.

# Can only Agenda items be voted?

Is it correct that Spanish community AGMs do not have an official section for Any Other Business, that they have instead a sort of Ouestions period at the end of the meeting? Is it correct that anything in this section is not an Agenda item, and so cannot be the subject of a proposal, resolution or vote? Items must be on the Agenda to be voted in the meeting? Can items not on the Agenda be put in the Minutes?

Article 19 of the Law of Horizontal Property regulates the official Book of Minutes. The minutes must give the time and place of the AGM. They should list the names of all in attendance or by proxy, with



their cuotas, and it must contain the Agenda. The book must record the results of the votes on Agenda items and it may need to list the names and cuotas of those who voted for or against a proposal. Any other matters can certainly be recorded in the Minutes, but it is not a legal requirement.



## Hernias

### WHAT is a hernia?

A hernia is nothing more than a weakening of the muscles in an area in the body which allows an internal part to pass through. Most typically these occur in the groin and abdominal area.

### How do hernias occur?

The weakening of muscle walls or physical strain can force internal parts to move from one place to another. For example, an inguinal hernia can occur when fatty tissue or a part of your bowel pokes through into your groin at the top of your inner thigh.

#### What are its symptoms?

The main symptom is the appearance of a lump in the groin or abdominal area. This lump tends to be soft and can sometimes be simply pushed back in. Sometimes they can be painful and in certain cases they can cut off the circulation to the intestine which will require surgery.

### How do you treat them?

In general hernias need to be operated on to avoid complications. If you decide not to undergo surgery, compressive straps and avoiding physical strains can prevent them from appearing, or growing larger.

### Should you seek medical help?

You should always go see your doctor if a hernia appears so they can refer you to a surgeon.

### Do they tend to come back after the first time?

After a hernia has been operated on it is difficult for it to appear in the same place, however they can appear elsewhere.

### Are there ways of preventing them?

Avoiding heavy lifting and other strenuous activities, as well as core muscle exercises which can prevent them from appearing, however they can still form despite these measures.

### What a pain

AS the weather cools we increasingly tend to cover up our feet more with socks or closed-toe shoes. While this change helps keep us warmer it can also increase the risk of suffering an ingrown toenail.

This painful condition can also be exacerbated by high-heeled or tight shoes we wear at parties during the festive season. Other risk factors include improperly trimmed toenails which cause the nail to dig in to the surrounding skin, trauma to the nail or a fungal infection.

Symptoms include a reddened, warm and painful toe end, extra skin growing around the corners of your nail or occasionally a white or yellow discharge. In serious cases, the skin around the nail may become infected.

So what can you do to avoid or treat an ingrown

Luckily, there are plenty of things you can do to help prevent one developing in the first place. The most important one is to clip or trim toenails well in the first place ensuring they are cut in a straight line, not a curve.

Also take care not to over file the corner of your nails as the curved shaped is more likely to dig into surrounding skin. It is also important to keep feet clean and dry and wear shoes with enough room for your toes.

If you are unlucky enough to suffer from one, there are several home remedies which might help. The Mayo Clinic advises soaking your feet in warm water for 15 to 20 minutes three or four times a day to reduce pain and swelling. It also recommends putting dental floss or clean cotton under the affected nail, after soaking, to separate it from the skin. Finally, apply an antibiotic cream to prevent infection.

If all else fails, though, a doctor will be able to give you the best advice or treatment to have you on your feet again in no time.

OUR heart is arguably our most important organ, ensuring oxygen is pumped around our bodies, keeping everything functioning as it should.



## Pearly whites

TOOTH damage happens to us all at one point, either through injury, natural wear and tear or occasionally tooth decay.

While it is always best to see a dentist, if you are struggling to get an appointment or don't have the time, there are some things you can do to treat a tooth before you see a profes-

If the tooth just has a minor chip and no nerves are exposed. it may just be that you need to cover a jagged edge before you see a dentist. You can fill a chip temporarily yourself to avoid lacerating your tongue on the broken edge.

According to Sarasota Dentistry, ask your pharmacist for temporary filling material to cover the gap for a short time or alternatively use wax. If your tooth is in a lot of pain, however, you may have a more serious chip and should see your dentist immediately to avoid damaging the dental pulp and potentially losing the tooth.

If you have knocked your tooth and it is now loose, see a dentist as soon as possible.





Your dentist may be able to put it back in its original position. According to Mamaroneck Oral Surgery, the longer you leave it, the higher your chance of needing root canal.

If your tooth comes out completely, you may be able to save it if you respond quickly. Make an immediate appointment at your dentist and pick up your tooth by the crown without touching the roots. Clean it with saliva or cold water and place it back in its socket, holding it in place with a clean cloth until vou get to the dentist.

If you are unable to place it

back in position, put it in a glass of milk or saliva. If you get to a dentist within 30 minutes you have a good chance of saving the tooth.

## Spending income to the benefit of all

NOW that we enter an AGM free period, Stephen Lewis, Managing Director of LPL Commercial Services takes a breath to look back on what it all means in his world of Community Management Fees Debt Collection.

For most residential communities in Spain we have just come out of perhaps the busiest time for Management Committees and their appointed Administrators - the AGM. Dreaded by many, relished by some, stressful for most.

For expats and holiday owners alike it is an opportunity to air grievances, discuss the poor quality of gardens, litter, decoration, should we pay for security gates and on and on it goes. But nearly everything discussed at any AGM always comes down to one question - How much money does the Community have to spend?

Then the real discussion and arguments start. Who owes what, how much and for how long and more importantly: Why are those residents that pay their management fees subsidising those that do not? It is a sad fact that for years many communities suffer this problem, shout about it at the AGM and discuss the very same subject at the next AGM and often about the same debtors at the next AGM and the next



ties in Spain or businesses elsewhere it's the same story. Unfortunately we have seen in our lifetimes what can happen when we get too complacent about monies owed on the balance sheet, as was proven through the European and almost world wide banking crisis of 2008

One of the biggest problems besetting communities is not the fact the money does not always come in on time, it's the fact that many are actually too hesitant to do anything about it. By the time a decision is made the property owner, living outside of Spain, may have moved or incurred other circumstances making it far more difficult to contact them and collect. Worse still some debts are so old that they then become uncollectible because of the Statute of Limitations, which in Scotland is five years and England and Wales in particular six years, as an example.

There is no good reason to delay strong collection action on debts of one year, or even sooner. After all why should the well intentioned prompt payers suffer for the misdeeds of those that really don't care about their Community or worse still are deriving income from renting out their property and are still shirking their payment responsibilities.

Wouldn't it be great to discuss how we can spend Community income to the benefit of all as we have the money in the bank... or better still reduce next year's charges for a change!

They'd rather just rely on re-writes and hope that enough people have been born who can't remember the old series and will be presented with something 'different.'

Basically, recycling old themes rarely works; shows that were popular by default not merit then, rarely 'ignite' now. There are plenty of new concepts to exploit, but everyone's too frightened of 'offending' the easily offended, so nobody takes chances anymore.

Which reminds me, the arctic blasts currently hitting the UK must be due to Global Warming, right? Or possibly Brexit? (Though my money's on Putin!) But it's not all bad it should suit the snowflakes, provided they've some safe spaces where the temperature's mild and nobody's allowed a platform to talk about this. umm, 'offensive' weather.

## Best ways to heat your casa


HOMEOWNERS across Spain are turning to new techniques to help warm their houses in winter. Home reform platform, Habitissimo reports more and more Spaniards are seeking help in bringing down the bills and staving off the chilly weather.

More than 15,000 homeowners requested information on heating their home last year, suggesting a huge appetite for sound advice.

The average family in Spain spends €1,454 per year heating their home. Those using natural gas average between €760 and €928, while those using electricity stump up around €2,000. Most people can easily cut their expenses by 20 per cent by being smarter in their choice of heating sys-

Habitissimo offer advice on the smartest ways for homeowners to keep warm. Programmable thermostats can slash electric bills by 10 per cent. Paying an engineer to adjust the boiler is a sound investment, which can reduce costs by 15 per cent in the long run.

The most in-demand heating system among Spaniards is gas. More than one in three prefer gas, compared to the 19 per cent who favour the sim-

plicity of electric.

A trend growing in popularity is for heated floors. These provide uniform heat throughout the house and don't create a dry or stuffy environment. Heated floors offer long term savings of between 10 and 30 per cent. Installation costs around €6,500 on average, but can rise to as much as €15,000 if the floors have to be raised.

One in five who ask for help from Habitissimo end up choosing heated

This is a biofuel formed from compressed sawdust that offers a greener way of heating the home.

It can be expensive though, with heating a big house possibly demanding a kilo of pellets be burned every

## Rented homes on the rise

PROPERTY rental prices in Spain are rising because young people are finding themselves frozen out of the housing

Iñigo de la Serna, the Minister for Development, noted that rental prices in Spain were growing 'notably' and that the property sector as a whole was performing well.

Although Spain has traditionally been a country of owners, not tenants, the number of people now living in rented accommodation is now reaching the levels of other EU countries.

According to Adolfo Ramirez-Escudero, chief executive of property services company, CBRE Spain, roughly one million new apartments have been added to the rental market in the past decade.

According to de la Serna, the average cost of renting a home is still 17 per cent less than it was in 2007 when the financial crisis struck and prices are rising faster in certain areas, such as Madrid and Barcelona.

A report published by Casaktua concluded that more Spaniards are renting a place to live, particularly in the 25 to 35 age group, because they can't afford to

take out a mortgage. Fifty seven per cent of the people who rented their homes revealed they did so because they could not afford to buy.

Others revealed that they were worried they would not be able to keep up with the repayments if they committed themselves to a mortgage.

The trend of renting homes instead of buying looks set to continue as rising house prices are also causing rents to soar in popular areas; making it harder for tenants to save money towards a deposit so they can buy their own place.



## Autumn leaves are falling down

## A perfect time to remake your garden

THE onset of the colder weather brings a lot of changes to the garden.

It is much easier to work in the glorious autumn sun to clean up the garden by pruning the summer flowering shrubs and preparing the soil for winter herbs, flowering annuals, new shrubs and

It is the perfect time to plant new additions to the garden and start off new plants in pots so they can be well established before the next summer's heat.

If you are plagued by autumn leaves falling, it is useful to know that you can take

**Curtains** Hard floors –

advantage of this natural annual event to improve your garden with richer soil from the autumn leaves which are a free source of organic materi-

The simplest way to manage autumn leaves is to rake or blow them into natural soil garden beds to act as a mulch. It can look attractive and breaks down quickly over winter to add humus and other nutrients to the soil.

I also gather the leaves to surround newly planted trees and shrubs to provide insulation from the cold in winter while they are getting established. It works well even though it has usually broken down by the next summer and I have to use additional mulch for summer water conservation and heat insulation of the

If you have stone mulches on your garden beds this method of mulching does not work as the stone mulches are better left without buildup of organic material as it will en-

Instead you can make a simple pen in a corner of the

garden to pile the collected leaves and allow them to break down naturally over winter or add them to your compost as fresh layers with additional organic material between each collection of the leaves over autumn. The composted material can be added where it is needed lat-

If you are preparing new garden beds that require cultivation, the leaves can be added to the soil and dug in. Leaves decompose very rapidly in the soil so they will improve the texture and organic content quickly to make the soil better for establishing new plants.

The leaves help to keep the soil aerated, with better drainage over winter and gives the soil greater water holding capacity in summer after they have broken down into humus.

So for the gardener, the autumn leaves are a blessing in the annual cycles of the seasons to prepare for the changes to come. Gathering the autumn leaves up from the terraces and paths, to add



to the soil and protect the plants, makes them an asset rather than a burden.

I love to see the fresh autumn leaves as they fall and

decorate the ground so I usually only collect them weekly. The warm autumn sun on the coloured leaves in the brisk autumn breezes, provides a different aspect of the garden from other seasons that can be enjoyed and worked with to improve the quality of the garden year round.

### Growing in pots IF you have limited space in your garden or want to protect some of your plants

ing in some stylish pots. Potted plants really brighten up a space and allow you to have a garden that blooms all year round. You can use them

when temperatures drop, it's worth invest-

to grow anything from climbing and flowering plants to vegetables and herbs. They also allow you to have a portable

garden, as they allow you to bring plants which are susceptible to frost inside during colder months. Generally speaking, the bigger the

plant, the bigger the pot but you need to make sure that it drains well and won't overheat your plant. You can also get creative, by using anything from old teapots and welly boots to wooden barrels.

Also make sure you keep in mind what the downfalls might be of using pots made from certain containers. Although ceramic pots drain well, they also dry out quickly, especially under the hot sun, and require constant watering.

The soil you use in pots is also very important. You should avoid using soil from your garden as it is often too heavy and could contain diseases or insect pests.

However, because specialised potting soil tends to be lighter, you will also need to check your plant's moisture levels more often and make sure they are receiving enough nutrients.

## Winter garden

SPAIN has one of the best winter climates of Europe. So why not take advantage of this fact to get some winter gardening in?

According to Permacul turenews.org, winter can be the best time to grow some crops because of the natural rainfall.

While fruits including tomatoes and peppers should still be saved for summer as they need to ripen in the sun, many vegetables can be grown at this time of year.

Carrots can easily be planted in winter in mild Mediterranean climates and can be harvested in early spring, just in time for all those soups and roast din-

Other crops you can plant now include rhubarb, artichoke, chayote, lemon balm, currants, fennel and gooseberries. Or why not try broad beans and snap

A longer term project will be garlic and shallots which will be ready in the summer in time to make a chilled gazpacho soup. Bulbing onions, green onions, chives and leeks will also fare well if planted now, as well as asparagus.

Permaculturenews.org recommends sowing your seeds as soon as possible to make the most of the warmer weather and planting some less hardy crops indoors in a window sill planter. Brussels sprouts, cabbage and lettuce will all thrive indoors at this time of year, as will fava beans, lentils, cauliflower and cel-

So why not make extra time this winter and make the most of Spain's great weather and grow your own? They'll be ready to harvest in the spring.

### Top tips for growing your own fruit and vegetables

EVERYONE has thought about growing their own fruit and vegetables at some point in their lives but may not necessarily have succeeded. When contemplating whether to start a fruit or vegetable garden, here are a few tips that may help on the road to home-grown fruit and veg-

Firstly, it is important to have a good, neutral, freely-drained loam soil that is light and airy. This will make it easier to feed the plants and is essential for producing healthy fruit and vegeta-

Make sure to choose the best varieties of plants available, which have been tried and test-

ed to ensure that the fruit or vegetable not only has fantastic flavour, but will also grow pest and

When growing crops, they need to be protected from insects and animals, especially in Spain. There are a number of options to consider in order to accomplish this, including companion planting or using a natural pest control method such as beer, copper tape or even egg shells.

A final way to ensure growth is to make sure that plenty of organic matter is mixed into the soil and use as mulch on top as it will provide the fruit and vegetables with more nutrients and give them a better chance at survival.

## Volvo Ocean Race update

### Cheap cruising

RESEARCHERS have shown that cruising at 55mph is optimal for emissions and wallets. In a lifetime of driving, the average motorist could save more than 3,000 in fuel costs by doing 60mph rather than 80mph.

The figures come from Click Mechanic. They show that drivers who typically cruise at 80mph emit more than five tonnes extra over 20 odd years than those who cruise at 60mph

The average British driver travels 7,800 miles a year. Around 1.600 miles are notched up on motorways. Click Mechanic researchers took a Fiat 500 as their test model and found that, on the motorway, it cost 500 more over a lifetime to drive at 65mph compared to 60mph.

The cheapest speed to drive on the motorway is 55mph, though other road users probably won't appreciate the cost cutting.

THE Q2 is Audi's smallest SUV yet offers cool styling and badge kudos that most rivals cannot match. The O2 maintains the distinctive Audi look, a sculptured shape hallmarked by a deep front grille and the unmistakable four-circle badge which all combine to present potent kerb appeal.

Q2 models start at €23,884 (£21,360) for versions with basic kit, but for features such as connectivity, larger alloy wheels and more sporty looks, you have to move up the range, and most buyers do just that.

My test model was the Q2 2.0 litre diesel Ouattro S Tronic and laden with options including LED lighting, technology and comfort packs, leather sports seats and much more. boosting the price to € 3 9 , 1 1 3 (£34,990).

Its Quattro all-wheel-drive system keep the car well-planted on the corners and despite stiffer sports suspension, still delivers a very comfortable ride. And the S Tronic gearbox is

The interior accommodates four adults with ease, with even six-footers getting enough headroom in the rear. There are plenty of oddment stowage spaces and boot space is 355 litres, boosted to 1,000 litres with the rear seats folded.

Standard features on the test model include power windows, remote locking, climate control, virtual cockpit (virtual instruments instead of actual dials),

There are plenty of safety features too, including Audi's Pre Sense safety kit which is standard across the range, with Autonomous Emergency Braking which will put the brakes on if the sensors detect a pedestrian stepping out in front of the car.
