A BRITISH dad killed on a Magaluf stag weekend had taken cocaine before being mowed down by a speeding drink driver.

Adrian O'Kane of Acocks Green, Birmingham, died after being hit by a car as he walked towards his hotel.

And an inquest has heard that the 40-year-old construction worker was so intoxicated that he was in a 'semi-standing position, almost on all fours' as he tried to cross Carrer Pinada in the early hours of April 23 last year.

A post mortem examination confirmed that the victim suffered a severe head injury during the collision with a dark-coloured Ford Focus driving 'at excessive

Witnesses said they heard the car "skidding" along the Punta Ballena party strip before it turned onto Carrer Pinada.

Senior coroner Louise Hunt read out a toxicology report which said: "The subject had ingested large amounts of alcohol, 2.86 grams per litre, together with the consumption of cocaine immediately prior to the accident.

"The consumption of toxic substances around the time of his death was therefore very likely to have contributed to the accident."

Known as Swanny to his

friends, the victim leaves behind two daughters, aged 12 and 10.

His body was flown back to the UK after his family raised more than €34,000 from donations in less than a fortnight.

In the wake of the hearing Adrian's mum Mary said: "Everyone loved Adrian and we've been overwhelmed with support from family and friends.

"He will be greatly missed and he would have been touched by the impact he has had on so many people.

"We now want to see justice against the driver as it's just horrible to think that someone taking drugs and drinking while driving has taken Adrian away from us."

Water torture

Brit holidaymaker sues over horror injury

A BRITISH mum who almost lost her leg after a waterslide accident saw the limb infected with flesh-eating bugs is suing a Benidorm hotel.

Helen Priestly, 42, cut her leg in two places and was twice forced to have surgery.

And the mother-of-one from Rochdale, Greater Manchester, has filed charges against the hotel for its 'death trap' chute as she battles to get it shut down.

She said: "The slide I was on is a potential death trap. It's only a matter of time before an adult or child is seriously injured on

The incident came after she forked out more than € 950 on a four-star break in the Costa Blanca resort with husband Leon, 40, and 15-year-old daughter Danielle.

Helen rode on the slide without knowing that someone had broken their leg on it earlier the

She explained: "I didn't stand a chance really as the gap to go through wasn't really big enough to get through.

"The water current was really strong and it slammed me into the opening. I was in agony."

After fighting against the flow to get off the attraction she realised how badly she was hurt.

"I started nearly passing out from the shock and blood loss. I had a big massive hole in my leg like an indent," she added.

An ambulance took her to a private hospital where medics x-rayed the leg and put her on an IV drip before letting her go.

The hotel refused to cover the cost of a wheelchair, leaving the family to pay, and they were not visited by a rep for two days.

She continued: "I was in constant pain but they wouldn't help us at all from then on. I was in intense pain and couldn't

wait to get home."

But things took a turn for the worse six weeks after they arrived home, when she was admitted to the Rochdale Infirmary in massive pain before being diagnosed with necrotising fasciitis, commonly known as flesh-eating disease.

She said: "A cloudy, milky liquid was pouring out of my

leg, it was disgusting.

"One time I woke up and my bed was soaking from all the liquid and it was so bad the nurse thought I had spilled a glass of water on the sheets.

"But as the poisons were gone I felt a bit better."

Doctors then performed two emergency operations in a bid to save the leg after a transfer to Royal Oldham Hospital, where she was admitted to the high dependency unit.

She added: "I actually felt better and had a cup of tea. But then the doctors looked at my leg and said I might lose my leg and told my husband and daughter I could also die.

"I was hysterical I couldn't believe all this had come from a water slide. It was like something out of a horror film.

"There were massive holes and gaping wounds in my legs and you could see the bone."

tor Jet2 said: "The health and safety of our customers is extremely important to us, we are exploring Helen's claim fully.

"As this is part of an ongoing legal process, we are unable to comment further at this time."

Helen's legal representative Paul Stevens added: "It defies belief if the same slide that severely injured Helen is open and still causing injuries."

The law 'addresses the problem of excess vehicles' and also guarantees the needs of people who live, work or have a residence on the island, Armengol added

Ban rejected

A PALMA City municipal citizens group has rejected the prohibition of multi-family dwellings being rented to tourists. Patricia Conrado, a councillor representing the group, said the zoning is "unfair, probably illegal and does not solve the housing problem" and she added the restrictions are likely to give a reason for illegality.

White gold

IT must be collected at night to protect its delicate colour

And the asaparagus dubbed 'white gold' is now being harvested by temporary workers in northern Spain.

Within a few hours of being picked, the delicacy is either sold in local markets or boiled and placed into tins or jars, otherwise its high water content - considered critical to its distinct flavour - can be lost.

And if exposed to the sun, the pricey veg can quickly turn purple.

Those responsible for picking it must move quickly, and a dozen people can harvest up to 1.5 tonnes in a single night. And there is another reason for their haste, since salaries for the seasonal workers, here pictured in Caparroso, Navarra, are partly based on the amount they col-

The region's climate, comprised of cold winter and spring nights, is said to be ideal for producing top quality asparagus, which receives a special label of geographical origin under European rules.

A kilo typically sells for €2.90 if bought directly from farmers, with the price doubling or tripling in food markets elsewhere.

Locals eat the asparagus by holding it with two fingers upside down above the head and lowering it slowly into the mouth.

Lesbian agent torment

A LESBIAN police officer has given evidence against colleagues who allegedly persecuted her for being a homosexual.

Sonia Vivas was welcomed by crowds of supporters before answering questions for three hours in court.

The officer accused three colleagues of tormenting her because they did not want a homosexual in the Local Police's motorised unit. And the problems began the moment she entered the unit, the courtroom heard.

Colleagues humiliated and ridiculed her by breaking eggs on her bike saddle, deflating its wheels and tampering with its suspension, Vivas said.

"My presence in the unit annoyed him because I was a lesbian. They treated me like rubbish," the court heard.

The three officers - including one excommissioner who allegedly consented to the behaviour - denied the acts but refused to answer prosecutors.

They face 20 years' of combined prison sentences.

Bargain-hunting Ibiza tourists offered beds for €50 a night

SKYROCKETING holiday rental prices have led to locals offering creative accommodation such as bunk beds on a balcony for €50 a

Tourism chiefs were stunned by the offers, appearing on holiday let sites such as Airbnb.

One apartment has been advertised as 'turning into a mini hostel each summer' and offers nine beds in total, with bunks squeezed into tiny spaces including the balcony.

The Platja d'en Bossa flat even had a security camera in the living room to monitor the tenants.

Local newspaper Diario de Ibiza claims one week's rent in Ibiza costs the same as a whole month in

Other unusual rentals include wooden shacks and even vans.



The right note

A 500-YEAR-OLD letter written by Christopher Columbus has been returned to Spain by the United

It comes after a seven-year international probe which reached as far afield as Paris and Brasilia.

Written in 1493 and addressed to King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella of Spain, the letter describes the notorious explorer's discoveries in the New World.

It was among 16 original copies, of which several were stolen from Barcelona's National Library of Cataluña archives in 2004 and 2005.

They were replaced with forgeries, but the switch was only discovered in 2011 when experts received a tip off about the plot from an informant.

Spain's US ambassador described the repatriation of the letter as 'a showcase of the ties that bind the United States and Spain together' when receiving it during a ceremony in Washington, DC.

"We are truly honoured to return this historically important document back to Spain, its rightful owner." US Attornev David Weiss added.

The letter was a manual copy of the original, written in Spanish to the monarchs who paid for his journey to the Americas.

It covers the people, landscape and wealth that the navigator found between his August 1492 departure from Puerto de Palos in Huelva, Spain, and return to Lisbon in March 1493, seven months later.

It was at the time translated into Latin before being sent to kings and queens across Europe.

Investigators said the document was sold by two Italian book dealers for €600,000 in 2005, before a Brazilian businessman snapped it up for €900,000 in 2011. And it is believed they were alerted to the scam by an expert employed by the latest owner to check its authenticity.

An agent was then dispatched to Spain to check that the archived version was a fake, sparking a joint enquiry by US Homeland Security Investigations, a division of the Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency (ICE), and the Department of Justice.

The unnamed owner reportedly agreed to hand the letter over after being contacted by the authori-

ICE said in a statement that it has recovered 11,000 stolen artefacts from 30 countries since 2007, and that a second copy of the same letter was in 2016 returned to Italy.





STREET TALK

Are you a mossie magnet?

A WET spring has created ideal breeding conditions and raised fears of a summer mosquito explosion as the heat kicks in. But with holidaymakers and residents warned to be on high alert by public health experts, how many of us are really terrorised by the bloodsucking pests?

Sandra Canero, 33, and Rocio Gallego, 31 both traffic wardens from Malaga.

Sandra: "Yes, we do. We wear thick black trousers for our work as traffic wardens and they still manage to bite our ankles. It is worse for some colleagues though. One is allergic and comes up with swollen red boils when bitten. She scratches the bites, they get infected and then she can't work.'

Rocio: "At home we use the liquid plug-in devices, which do the trick. We have even tried to get our fluorescent work tops changed because they attract bugs, and also because people mistake us for police."

Miguel Angel Nadal Pedrosa, 35-year-old bar worker from the Costa del Sol.

"At home I have mosquito nets everywhere. It is a kind of fabric you can easily find in the shops. I use to cover my windows and even my balcony to stop them coming in. It works! But they don't bite me anyway. I'm not sure why. Maybe it is because of my skin or my blood type."

Silvia Edwards, originally from Berkshire, resident in Fuengirola for 12 years.

"Mosquitos aren't a problem, it's the flies in October that bother me. They are a real nui-

sance. If you go out to a restaurant they swarm over you, especially if you are eating fish. We have mosquito nets at home but the odd one occasionally gets in so we use the anti-mosquito plugs just in case."

Ronaldo settles €19 million tax bill

CRISTIANO RONALDO has reached an agreement to pay the Spanish authorities €19 million to settle his tax affairs.

The Real Madrid and Portugal star has been trying to resolve the situation for some time, after being accused of tax fraud.

Stink 'n' swim

Locals slam 'disgusting' tourists

MALLORCA locals have slammed the 'disgusting' state of the island's most famous

The four-mile Playa de Palma was shown to be far from an idyllic paradise in viral video footage posted on social media that claimed to show the 'truth' about the area.

The clip - which has been viewed more than 70,000 times - shows drunken holidaymakers sprawled on the beach, drinking and smoking surrounded by rubbish both on the sand and promenade.

Cans, bottles and plastic are strewn across the ground in a zone described in brochures as 'the perfect place for families.'



The Facebook group which posted the video, Mallorquins fins els ous de satuación ('Mallorcans want an end to saturation'), aims to keep track of rowdy behaviour on the island, and its members claim that authorities are failing to tackle anti-social behaviour despite fines being threatened to anyone who litters, causes noise or disturbances or behaves drunkenly in public spaces.

Forget the past

NO matter what anyone may think about the leaders of North Korea and the USA, their meeting in Singapore on Monday is without doubt of historic importance. It has been suggested that Chairman Kim Jong-un has actually outfoxed President Trump by appealing to his vanity as the first US President to establish a 'friendly' relationship with North Korea. The North Korean economy has been significantly disadvantaged by the sanctions imposed upon it and if these are to be eased as the two countries discuss nuclear disarmament then Kim will be able to take the credit whilst making promises of things to come.

The Americans had demanded 'complete, verifiable and irreversible denuclearisation,' but there was no mention of this following the meeting and whilst the two parties have signed a document of understanding, full details of the content are awaited. At the end of the day however, when one considers that technically North and South Korea are still at war (there is only a ceasefire in place) any move to lessen the tension in the area has to be positive and will also come as a relief to neighbours including China.

According to President Trump the pair have forged "a special bond" whilst Kim said "We've decided to leave the past behind."

The next few months will determine whether this is a game of smoke and mirrors on the part of either side, but any action that helps to make the world a safer place cannot be criticised.

Two week review

Commentary by Moneycorp

IT was mostly a good start to June for the pound. Retail sales for April went up by 1.6%, manufacturing PMI came in at 54.4, and the service sector PMI came in at 54.0. Britain's GDP expanded by just 0.1% in the first quarter. Brexit, the gathering storm of the major vote in parliament on the issue and rumours of a split Cabinet are harrying the pound.

Next Tuesday the prime minister wants parliament to debate 15 amendments to the EU withdrawal legislation before scrapping them and voting the bill through unchanged. In addition, the new trade tariffs from the US now need to be factored in to future forecasts, having taken effect at the beginning of June.

Sentix reported a halving of Euroland investor confidence from 19.2 to 9.3. The euro has been struggling due to the uncertainty in Italy. The political situation has already sent Italian government borrowing costs higher and prompted

Moody's credit rating agency to put the country on negative watch. There are rumours that the European Central Bank might bring forward to next Thursday the policy announcement that had previously been expected to come in July.

That announcement is supposed to shed more light on the winding down of the bank's asset purchase programme. Trump's new trade tariffs and the EU's swift retaliation are likely to have some impact in the coming months.

President Trump's decision to levy an import tax on steel and aluminium from the EU, Canada and Mexico was met by furious criticism and is making waves. There was an expression of 'unanimous concern and disappointment' by G7 finance ministers and central bank governors regarding Donald Trump's new trade tariffs. Although some analysts argue that US import tariffs will be positive for the currency, the overall picture

will not become clear until America's victims pull the trigger on their retaliatory measures.

As expected, the Bank of Canada kept its benchmark interest rate unchanged at 1.25% for a fifth month at the end of May. However, the statement implied that an increase is in the offing, perhaps in July. Investors feel that analysts were perhaps too optimistic about the number of times the Bank of Canada (BoC) can raise inter-

est rates during the months ahead because of the increasing levels of uncertainty about the future of the North American Free Trade Agreement. While many feel the long-term outlook is optimistic, in the short term the Loonie may be in for something of a bumpy ride.

It has been relatively quiet down under - although with such large scale geo-political and domestic drama elsewhere, this is no surprise. Australia showed building permit issuance falling by a monthly 5.0% and a 0.4% monthly increase in Australian retail sales.

More good news in the service sector for Australia: the PMI came in at a healthy 59.0. Australian first quarter GDP growth came in at 1.0%, beating the forecast 0.9%. Annual growth also exceeded expectations, at 3.1% instead of 2.8%. As expected, the Reserve Bank of Australia held interest rates at 1.5% for the 20th straight month.

any circumstances tolerate this type of disgraceful behaviour on board our aircraft," said Mr Ward.

"We will be taking further action in support of our crew to ensure [the passenger] is held accountable for his actions and indeed [he] has already received a lifetime ban from future Jet2 flights."

And the royal family suffered further controversy after a court in Palma de Mallorca gave Felipe's brother-in-law Inaki Urdangarin five days to turn himself in after Spain's Supreme Court ruled he must serve five years and 10 months in prison for tax fraud and embezzlement.

player, 50, has been married to the King's sister Princess Cristina for 20 years.

€ 1bn plunge

THE fall in supply of tourist rentals in Mallorca following the 2017 Tourism Law could result in losses of nearly €1 billion for the island's economy this year.

Regulations 'make it practically impossible' for some 20,000 families to continue renting their homes and second homes to tourists, according to Habtur, the Balearic Islands property rental group.

And the law's negative effects also hit restaurants, shops or supermarkets, Habtur

The Pimem, Pimeco, Afedeco and Restauracion Mallorca business associations have also criticised the new law.

Pimeco vice-president, Jaume Ribera, said the regulation of tourist rental has resulted in a "significant drop in sales."

The legislation is "muddied and confusing" and to blame for huge financial consequences, according to Habtur president, Joan Miralles.

Businesspeople assure May revenues are

'worrying' although they did acknowledge last month's bad weather did not help the tourism

The Restauracion Mallorca association said in some areas, like Palma, where tourist rent has been limited to single-family homes, there has been a 20 to 40 per cent drop in restaurant

"This year our associates hired 700 less waiters than last year," said the Restauracion Mallorca president, Alfonso Robledo.

Authorities enforced regulation "with their back to the sector" and without addressing the kind of tourism sector business associations want, Habtur's Miralles said.

The laws redirect custom to the "underground economy," he added.



pointments to his Council of Ministers, with more women given cabinet briefs than ever before. Sources close to Sanchez claimed he has ruled out a snap election meaning his left-leaning Partido Socialista (PSOE) will have to work with other parliamentary parties to get legisla-

Congress and the Senate

THE PSOE currently has 84 seats in the 350-strong Congress of Deputies and 62 members out of 266 in the Senate. Sanchez struck an agreement with smaller parties such as the far left Podemos and Basque and Catalan nationalists to unseat Rajoy. He will need their support to get laws passed until another election is held, due on or before July 2020.

Congress of Deputies

THE Congress of Deputies (Congreso de los Diputados in Spanish) is the lower house of Spain's Parliament, the Cortes Generales. Deputies cover some 52 multi-member constituencies and are elected to serve four year terms unless snap polls are called. The Plenary of the Congress refers to the meeting of all members for debates and votes. There are also Commissions made up of a smaller number of members to examine legislation and govern-

Senate

THE Senate (Senado in Spanish) is the upper house of parliament. Senators represent each of Spain's Autonomous Communities or regions, with larger provinces such as Andalucia having more members. A total of 208 of the members are elected to serve four year terms while a further 56 are appointed by regional assemblies. Senators are tasked with debating and voting on legislation, as well as approving some government appointments and members have the power to suspend regional governments.

Political parties

PRIME MINISTER Pedro Sanchez's party the current ruling party of Spain. It is led by Sanchez and its name in English is the Spanish Socialist Workers' Party. The PSOE is the oldest political party currently active in Spain and it has enjoyed historic ties with the country's trade unions. It is centre-left and progressive, with a liberal social outlook and a preference on higher public spending and for state intervention in the economy.

PODEMOS translates as 'We Can' in English and the party was founded following protests against inequality and corruption. It is headed by Pablo Iglesias, a left-wing academic, and is currently a part of a broader coalition of far-left parties in Parliament known as Unidos Podemos. They have a liberal social outlook and economically they have proposed taking key industries into government ownership and providing citizens with a basic income. Unidos Podemos have 67 seats in the Congress and 20 seats in the Senate.

CIUDADANOS, or Citizens in English, was formed in Cataluña in response to what they claim is the failure of Spain's two main parties and the rise of Catalan nationalism. It is led by Albert Rivera and rose to become the largest party in the Catalan regional parliament following a snap election this year. They emphasise Spanish unionism, are socially liberal and promote business-friendly policies such as lowering corporation tax and cutting red tape. It has 32 seats in Congress and four in the Senate.

Partido Popular (PP)

THE party of former Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy, the name of which means the People's Party. Rajoy remains the caretaker leader of the party with a new leader due to be elected later this year. Its roots lie in the now defunct Alianz Popular, a conservative party founded by politicians sympathetic to dictator Francisco Franco. The modern day PP is socially conservative and promotes policies friendly to the Catholic Church, and it tends to favour less intervention in the economy. The PP has 134 seats in the Congress and 148 in the Senate.



And an estimated 22 per cent of the culprits are employees stealing while at work, according to the 2017 data.

The food and drink section of the analysis shows Iberian meat products

are singled out by 73.3 per cent of peckish raiders, with wine, beer and spirits chosen by 86.7 per cent of thirsty

Jams and marmalade are the secondmost popular foodstuffs pilfered.

In textiles, clothing including shirts, trousers, underwear, jumpers and socks are looted by 81.8 per cent of shoplifters, with hair bobbles, earrings, bracelets, rings and other accessories also taken during 54.5 per cent of swoops.

Creams are the most desirable cosmetic product for criminals, being stolen in 86.4 per cent of cases, with make-up and perfumes picked out 69.2 per cent of the time.

Tools and batteries are top of the list for 70 per cent of hardware villains, according to the AECOC statistics, while consoles and video games, computer accessories and mobile phones are earmarked by 60 per cent of electronics

The report reckons that most of these items are chosen for 'their physical characteristics, monetary value or the ease with which they can be resold on the black market.'

OKAY I'll finally own up. Guilty as charged of broadcasting without a licence m'lud.

In mitigation you'd have to be just a few metres from my home to pick up my illegal transmission on a standard FM radio.

You'd also have to be a fan of the BBC's unrivalled speech station, Radio 4, because that's all I'm pirating. And technically I'm narrowcasting, not broadcasting.

It's just one way of several today of bringing the world's radio stations into your home.

If your purse can stand the pain you could buy a dedicated internet radio for upwards of €100, and then devote your entire life to the thousands of stations it pulls in. A smart speaker like Amazon's Echo or Google Home now does the same, as indeed can your smartphone or tablet with an app like TuneIn Radio.

FM TRANSMITTER: Start your own station.

You could use a sledgehammer to crack a nut, as a homesick friend of mine has done. His computer pumps out BBC radio constantly through a little Bluetooth dongle, but most Bluetooth speakers like the one he then moves around die a death just a few metres from their source. FM

My solution has simplicity on

ability to listen to your programme of choice from any old FM radio, anywhere.Well, anywhere w i t h i nabout 10 me-

tres, which puzzled the heck out of our Spanish neighbour suddenly hearing 'The World At One' where Radio Nacional should have been.

(Tip: for cross-cultural harmony, don't choose a frequency already ocupada).

Here's my recipe, and it's definitely not rocket surgery.

1) Choose your signal's source. The easiest is a radio station streamed from your computer (though I used my UK-tuned satellite decoder instead because I just love making life difficult

2) Buy any one of the dozens of tiny personal FM transmitters offered on Amazon and elsewhere, the kind normally plugged into a smartphone to play music through the car radio. Plug it straight into the computer's headphone socket.

(If you do prefer my more challenging decoder route, you'll need something like a SCART [or RCA plugs] to 3.5 mm stereo jack socket adapter, plus a common 3.5 mm male-to-female stereo extension cable).

- 4) Choose an empty channel on the transmitter so as not to obliterate your neighbours' favourite Spanish station.
- 5) Fire up your radio source and the transmitter, pick up any FM radio, tune it to the chosen

And bingo, there's Britain's unofficial second national anthem every weekday at two. Dum-ti-dum-ti-dum, dumti-dum-ti-daah-dum....

London calling

FINDING an FM transmitter rather than Bluetooth is becoming trickier but they are available, like the one shown here, at around €10.

Running it constantly will hammer the batteries, but rechargeable units can normally be left plugged into a power source. The audio plug goes directly into your computer's headphone sock-

If you decide to use a decoder instead you'll need a 3.5 mm stereo cable with a male plug at one end to go into that SCART adapter mentioned earlier, and a female socket at the other to take the transmitter's audio

Run an internet search for 'Hama SCART adaptor' (other brands are available, most around €10), and although this is an equal-opportunity column, do make sure you get the male one.

PEDRO SANCHEZ, Spain's latest president, immediately took advantage of the Partido Popular's disarray following the Gurtel verdicts by calling for a vote of no confidence in Mariano Rajoy.

That it succeeded, thanks to Podemos, the Basque nationalists and the Catalan secessionists flummoxed everyone. The motion had little chance of prospering and everybody said Sanchez should have gone along with a general election, but that was the last thing he wanted.

As party leader he led the party to its worst-ever defeats in 2015 and 2016 and has consistently repelled PSOE voters although not the paidup party members who twice handed him the primaries.

That's why Sanchez, who looks so imposing but has until now sounded so unconvincing, couldn't risk a general election.

THE Spanish nationalists, who can be found in all of Spain's political parties, were not happy that Pedro Sanchez accepted the support of the Catalan secessionists to become

They were even less happy that he promised dialogue or - heaven forbid negotiation. It's not accidental that Catalan secessionism began to gather momentum once Rajoy became president in 2011 and instead of seeking a political solution turned the problem into a colossal court case.

Dialogue and consensus are the only way out of the Catalan labyrinth and these are what Sanchez is

His work will be cut out for him,

with only 85 PSOE MPs in the national parliament, but at least things can't get any worse in Cataluña than they were with Rajoy.

June 1 when Rajoy was given his marching orders, but is already throwing a wobbler.

Sanchez, who intends to govern alone, has not brought Podemos into the government and Iglesias warned: "If we aren't partners, we're the Opposition."

Felipe VI didn't look ecstatic when he signed Pedro Sanchez's nomination as president, but perhaps he was reflecting that Spain's is a constitutional monarchy and it's just a job, really.

But Pedro Sanchez who drove a stake into the heart of the PSOE and split it down the middle with his 'No means no' refusal to give the presi-

> dency to Mariano Rajoy in October 2016, has made everybody happy.

He has given the party back its hope and selfconfidence so if you see a smiling face in the street, that's a PSOE voter. Until the next general election, anyway.

CIUDADANOS leader Albert Rivera might have won if a general election had been called immediately after judges censured the PP as institutionally corrupt.

Rajoy knew it, too, and this knowledge was his undoing.

Rivera refused to back the no-confidence vote because Pedro Sanchez had the support of the Basque nationalists (bad) and the Catalan secessionists (infinitely worse).

Instead he wanted elections but must now

bide his time while making life as difficult as possible for the PSOE and the Partido Popular.

Rivera, whose party helped Rajoy become president in October 2016, knows he has lost out. However much he tries to upstage Sanchez he remains the understudy who won't be called on to take the starring role.

No-one is above the law

I SOMETIMES find it difficult to understand why people stick so stubbornly to an idea or path of action even when everyone is telling them they are wrong and at the end of the day it is going to cost them a lot of money.

Money that could better be used for the benefit of our own family for example. Stay with me this week because the outcome of a recent case could impact on all our communities with similar problems.

I want to share with you a situation that came to an end only last week in the English

Of course it concerned an owner of an apartment in Spain. The owner bought it off plan 12 years ago. For the first few years he and his family used it and enjoyed it, then it was rented out to various families and then for the past eight years it was left empty. Throughout the whole period Management Fees were hardly paid, a few Euros occasionally to keep the Community from taking strong action and as we know that is not unusual in Spain.

Finally in 2016 my firm was instructed to collect € 19,000 from the owner. The owner lived in England and we approached him for payment. He gave us the usual answers, basically refusing to pay. He also quoted the English Statute of Limitations stating that debts over six years old could not be sued for, although there was nothing to stop us asking. Fortunately for the

community the property 1978-2018 was repossessed by the Bank, as the owner had also defaulted on his mortgage. Under Spanish Law the bank paid the last three years, but this still left a large sum still due. The community instructed us to sue for the balance that remained, but it had to be for the Statement amount left within the last six years, which amounted to just €6,000.....

.....But now the interesting part happened.....

We had a long think about the Law and realised that all contracts regarding Management Fees are made in Spain under Spanish Law. In Spain The Statute of Limitations up until a few years ago was actually 15 years, although now

changed to five years. Spanish law also stated that any amounts due under relevant contracts before 2015 could still be chased up to 2025 (now recently changed to 2020).

As EU law dictates that these rules can apply on any legal

action taken in another EU state, we pointed this out to the Judge. He had to agree and let us amend the proceedings to include ALL outstanding amounts plus costs. Despite vigorous defence arguments, to no avail, this month the Community was awarded Judgement for over €23,000. This amount was duly paid under further threat of Judgement Execution.

Several lessons can be learnt by us all on this matter. Owners should never assume that they can just walk away from their legal obligations and communities should not let them. In this case it did take a leap of faith to pay out legal costs but the result still gave back a healthy return and at least nearly all legal costs were repaid by the debtor.

Even though we await the dreaded Brexit, our legal advisors are confident that the current EU/UK legislation that led to this great result will remain on the UK Statutes together with thousands of other laws.

The most important lesson is that no one should be above the law and if we are going to enjoy the benefits of our Spanish communities then we should all take a deep breath and sometimes take a legal leap to collect

As promised last week, I've been catching up on Versailles, which is back for a third, and has rumour has it, final series on BBC2 on Mondays.


This isn't a show for historical buffs or for anyone who doesn't like an obscene amount of nudity and frolicking in their dramas. They can't

But if you reframe the question as, 'Do you want to not have the option to use cash?' and people are more hesitant. We like new options, but we don't like having options removed.

A society without cash is a society without on-demand, easily accessible money. It is a society that relies entirely on the banking sector and the vulnerability that comes with digital wallets. Although there are obvious benefits to digital cash, we cannot live without a balance of both.

Ok a quick revisit to some of the things I've mentioned before, but which this week have ticked me off again. Why do motorbikes not have to pay for parking spaces? Why do they insist in parking right in the middle of a space or on the edge of disabled bays? They will cross over the centre line when there's a traffic jam and head towards you in a way that you have to swerve to miss them, even though they are on your side of the road. Zebra crossings do not even exist in their world. Why?

Eat Well to Live Well by Andrew Harding

IT is the start of summer and also the start of the barbecue season, this week and next I will include two of mine, my relatives and my friend's favourite recipes.

First of all, a few words about barbecuing. The characteristic flavour of barbecued food comes from juices and fats dripping on to the heat source creating smoke and undesirable flames (quench with a water spray) when the fats and oils catch fire.

Whether the heat source is burning charcoal, an electric element, or lava rock heated by a gas flame the flavours are all the same. I have never used an electric barbecue, but have used charcoal and gas, my personal preference is for bottled gas, because it is quicker to reach the required temperature, is more controllable and it is much cheaper especially if your domestic water is heated by bottles of butane.

You can use the last dregs of butane heating the barbecue instead of gambling on a

shower that may or may not be hot, as you rinse off the soap and shampoo. The following is my original recipe, enjoy!

Andy's ultimate beefburgers

Serves 4

- 2 small onions, chopped
- 3 whole garlic cloves, skinned and
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 700 grammes good quality minced
- 4 teaspoons mustard powder
- 2 teaspoons black (or green) peppercorns, coarsely ground
- 2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese, grated

- 3 whole beef stock cubes, crumbled
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1. Fry onions in olive oil until golden, add garlic and continue to fry until cooked through, place to one side to cool and then liquidise in a blender.
- 2. Add to ground beef together with all the other ingredients, mix by hand until mixed thoroughly.
- 3. Leave in fridge for two hours in a cov-
- 4. Using kitchen roll and a cheap cooking oil, coat the barbecue grill plates with a thin film of oil to prevent food from sticking. Light the barbecue, when hot, take a tangerine size piece of beef mix and flatten, then cook until crisp on outside and cooked on inside (or, pink if you prefer and you trust the source of the meat to avoid foodpoisoning), put to one side and keep warm. If you want cheeseburgers, place thinly sliced cheese on top of the almost-cooked burgers and pull the hood down on the barbecue and leave until the cheese has melted.

Hint: I hate lettuce, tomato and gherkins added to hot burgers, this destroys both the taste and texture of all four items. I serve the burgers in a bun, spread with olive oil and placed cut side down on the grill for about a minute, until slightly toasted. Fried onion, mushroom and cheese on top of the burger takes it to a new level! Salad and gherkins should be a side dish

Hint: Don't overwork the beef when mixing with the other

ingredients, the texture of the beef, as well as its flavour, needs to be just right. Most propriety burgers fail on all counts, but especially on texture.

Hint: Liquidising the onion/garlic is not essential provided they are finely chopped.

Tip: Peppercorns need to be freshly ground, when bought finely ground it loses flavour very quickly.

THE transformation of Palma de Mallorca in recent years has been dramatic.

In the days before the likes of easyJet, most tourists would bypass the city on their way to one of the many coastal resorts.

American tycoon lands € 3.2 million island

AN American-Cuban entrepreneur has bought the Illa d'en Colom islet, off the coast of Menorca in Spain's Balaeric Islands, for €3.2 million.

The purchase was made through the company Meruelo Investments, and the new owner, Alex Meruelo, had to negotiate with the 16 heirs to the property to secure the deal.

Meruelo, a businessman born in New York to Cuban parents who had left the Caribbean island in the 1960s, also had to outbid a French businessman who made offers up to the last minute.

The 16 heirs and their family members will be allowed to use the islet until October.

This 58-hectare islet has spent three decades on the market, and in 2010 was on sale for as much as ≤ 6 million.

In the mid-1980s, Alex Meruelo started his business ventures, acquiring a pizza chain before expanding into the construction and property sector in southern California.

Meruelo's holding company currently encompasses electricity companies, television and hotel chains like SLS Las Vegas and the former Trump Plaza Hotel and Casino in Atlantic City.

He is also the first American of Hispanic origin to acquire an NBA team with a majority shareholding: the Atlanta Hawks.

The islet is located 200 metres from the northeastern coast of Menorca, and features a beautiful landscape with two beaches.

There is a country house running on solar power, as well as a summer home and wooden cabin.

HANGING BASKETS are very much a part of the tradition of gardening in Spain.

Balconies decorated with abundant geranium flowers are a hallmark of Spanish village homes

When space is limited at your home, the imagination is still able to create inspiring ways to create a wonderful garden using containers and hanging baskets to achieve a garden on the walls and in open spaces.

The value of a hanging basket is that they can be placed to use space that otherwise is not used. On a balcony they can be placed to provide shade in summer instead of using blinds by making a row of baskets that capture the sun so that the balcony stays shaded. In winter they can be taken down to allow more of the sunlight to warm the zone.

The flexibility of hanging baskets makes them very versatile to always have the best flowering plants on display in prominent positions so that your hanging garden always looks its best. There is also the advantage of growing a wider range of different types of plants as they can be moved to shelter when adverse conditions prevail.

The choice of plants will depend, to a degree, on the time you can devote to your plants. Hanging baskets do need attention as they need regular watering and occasional feeding with liquid nutrients to stay healthy.

HANGING BASKETS: Can look beautiful anywhere

Succulents and low water use plants such as the ever popular geranium require less attention but many annuals such as lobelia, petunias, marigold, pansies, primroses, polyanthus and forget-me-nots do need to be

looked after. Flowering annuals will provide an abundance of flowers with a little more care than succulents.

You can grow bulbs such as freesias, crocus, iris and anemones that flower less but are hardier. If you wish to grow herbs, thyme, weeping rosemary, oregano, parsley, sage and many more can be grown in hanging baskets. Herbs may only last a season but you can enjoy them fresh and replace them the next year.

Hanging baskets are not really for larger growing plants or plants with a long life expectancy as the pot size will limit growth and the soil can become depleted of nutrients quicker than garden grown plants. They may seem to need frequent attention but the work is not heavy or difficult and does not require much bending. So placing them at a good height suitable for your care is important to make care easier.

The right container is important. There is a great variety of different types available. Ceramic pots give a good choice to select from. Some ceramic pots are made to be hung on walls with simply a hook installed on the wall or you can use wire to attach them to an existing support.

Ceramic is better than plastic for the plant as they allow the pot to breathe but they do evaporate more moisture. Wire baskets with coco fibre work very well, they are light to handle but do need more water than ceramic and plastic pots.

For the best success it is best to use a deep pot rather than shallow ones to hold more moisture, nutrients and reduce evaporation. Whatever you choose they can brighten your balcony or terrace.

WITH summer just around the corner now is the time to start those interior decorations to be sure that you bring a sense of summer sensation

The best flowers to decorate your home in summer include roses, daisies, petunia, sunflowers, lavender and geraniums.

den. This gives you a great opportunity to breathe fresh air into a select area of your home. Paint the flower pots different colours to introduce some colour and striking tones.

An additional advantage of creating such a space is that it can offer you a novel space to retreat to when you need some 'me-time.'

Your dog and exercise

DON'T exercise a dog strenuously straight after feeding. Always wait for a minimum of one hour. otherwise it can be extremely dangerous and result in stomach torsion, a twisting which prevents gasses from escaping. Unless prompt veterinary attention is sought, this condition can be fa-

Likewise, do not feed your dog directly after exercise as stomach torsion can also result.

However, gentle exercise after eating burns up more calories by raising the body's rate of metabolism. It is better than allowing the dog to lie down to digest its food, for while sleeping a pet will burn up only a few calories, just enough to keep its heart and lungs going. This can result in weight gain.

It makes sense to take your dog for a walk of not more than a half-hour after the two meals of the day. This very gentle exercise will also stimulate its digestion.



KEEPING FIT: It is important to regulate your dog's exercise.

Then, after a few hours have passed, you can let the dog enjoy more strenuous exercise.

For smaller breeds, simply tak-

ing a dog outdoors to relieve itself gives a certain amount of exercise. This assists but does not cause defecation, for a dog does

not need exercise to loosen his bowels unless it is ill.

Taking a dog on a daily run is not necessarily in its best interest. Dogs should never be run on hard surfaces such as pavements or payed roads but on earth, and certainly should not be made to run behind your car. If you insist on having your dog jog with you, then make the pace a fast walk or

trot rather than a run, but don't do this in hot weather and always check the dog's feet after a run for cuts and raw-

Medium and large breeds should not be allowed excessive exercise, or do agility work, until at least 18-months old, and even then with caution.

Often a weakness will remain dormant in young bones if they are subjected to extreme exercise. Throwing a ball in a park for an hour could bring on a problem. Dogs do not need as much exercise as many think.

A dog should never be allowed out alone even if it has a name tag on its collar. It is an offence in most European countries for it to be roaming on public streets or highways where it can still be classified as a stray dog and impounded by the police or a dog

Dog owners are legally responsible for any damage caused by their dog. If your dog's actions result in a traffic accident you may well have to pay compensation for damaged vehicles or injured persons and this could be substantial. No dog can ever be 100 per cent reliable when walking along a road off its lead.

A sudden noise, a car back-firing, or the sight of a cat could cause the dog to bolt. Only luck will determine if the dog runs out in front of a car. So don't show off by walking your dog without a lead besides a busy road.

A living dog on a lead is better than a dead one off it.

Keeping the cat at bay

IT is actually possible that you don't like cats. Or perhaps you only like your cat and you want to deter your neighbour's furry feline from overstepping the mark into

vour territory.

Well, there are steps you can take to discreetly mark your boundary and stop other cats from prowling onto your

The very first step is to clear away any cat excrement around the place, as this attracts more cats to foul in that

Once this is done, block gaps in the boundary with prickly plants or prunings such as holly. You can fit string or wire to the top of a fence to make it more difficult for cats to walk on it.

Then half fill some plastic bottles with water and place these along your boundary. Along the same lines, dangle some old CDs as the reflecting light will deter the cats.

Cats love to dig up exposed soil, so cover your ground soil with a layer of mulch as cats hate a moist surface.

Finally, a little known secret is to drop tea bags which have been infused with Olbas oil around the edges of your area.

This is known to keep cats at bay.

But remember, whatever option you chose, be sure to cause the cat no harm.



PORSCHE'S first fully electric sports car has been named the Taycan, with production set to begin in 2019.

The name can be roughly translated as 'lively young horse,' referencing the imagery at the heart of the Porsche crest, which has featured a leaping steed since 1952.

Oliver Blume, Chairman of the **Executive Board of Porsche AG** said:

If anyone can Taycan

"Our new electric sports car is strong and dependable; it's a vehicle that can consistently cover long distances and that epitomises freedom."

The name was announced as part of Porsche's 70th anniversary celebrations since it started making sports cars.

It will be Porsche's first all-electric car, and was previewed by the Mission E Concept, although the brand has been building plug-in hybrid models of some of its cars for several years.

The power figures are certainly

impressive, with 592 bhp and 0-60mph in 'well under' 3.3 sec-

Porsche is also being ambitious with its range estimates too, and claims the Taycan will be able to achieve 310 miles on a single

Elsewhere, the sports car maker has committed to a €6 billion investment in electromobility - including new versions of the Taycan, electrification of its current cars, expanding production sites and developing charging infrastructure.

The Taycan will also lead to 1,200 new jobs being created at a new factory for the model in Zuffenhausen, Germany.

ROAD TEST

WHEN first launched in 2007, the Nissan Qashqai was one of the crossover pioneers, paving the way for the welter of SUV models now dominating the new car market.

Revamped a few months ago, the latest Oashqai is still able to compete with newcomers to the sector thanks to its blend of outstanding driving dynamics, spacious cabin and cool looks.

There are petrol and diesel options, with prices starting at \leq 22,140 (£19,300), but a topspec version such as my Tekna+ test model, laden with extra kit and with a 1.6 litre turbo-petrol engine, costs €34,410 (£29,995).

You get a lot for the money highlights include premium BOSE sound system, sports seats, leather trim, panoramic glass roof, front, rear and side cameras, alloy wheels, park as-

front and rear parking sensors, touchscreen entertainment and navigation system, connectivity features, and a raft of safety kit including blind spot warning, moving object detection and lane departure warning. It also has LED lights, chrome detailing, roof rails and rear privacy

The 1.6 litre 163 hp petrol engine has a 0-100 kph time of 8.9 seconds, top speed of 200 kph (124 mph), emissions of 134 g/km and fuel economy of 17.2 kpl (48.7 mpg).

On the road, the Qashqai is

smooth and refined, helped by revised suspension providing a more composed ride. The precise steering and slick manual gearshift give the driver a feeling of complete

Externally, Qashqai has revised sharper-looking front and rear styling and inside, upgraded materials give the cabin a smarter appearance.

The dashboard layout is well designed for easy use and there is good occupant space front and rear and lots of oddment stowage places. The 410- litre boot, while not largest in the class, easily accommodates normal needs, and can be boosted to 1,569 litres by folding the rear seats.

The Qashqai competes in a vastly enlarged crossover/SUV sector which includes the likes of the Peugeot 3008, SEAT Ateca and the Skoda Karoq, but the Britishbuilt Nissan holds enough ace cards to ensure it stays firmly with the pack leaders.



World Cup 2018: England unfazed by great expectations

THE biggest sporting event on the planet begins today (Thursday) in Russia, where 32 national football teams will compete for glory and sporting immortality.

England's World Cup preparations concluded with a promising 2-0 victory over Costa Rica at Elland Road, and Gareth Southgate's squad will approach the tournament with quiet optimism.

It has been an unusually tranquil build-up for England, so far devoid of injury dramas, tabloid scandals or selection sagas.

There are signs that Southgate knows the style of play he wants his team to adopt, and that he has the personnel to deliver it.

Gone is the iron grip of the Fabio Capello regime, or the muddled selections and positioning of players under Hodgson

Southgate's men were all happy to take part in an open-media session that would have been unthinkable not so long ago.

The England manager has talked about learning the art of 'calm leadership' from Euro '96 manager Terry Venables, and has grown visibly in his role.

"Pressure is what you perceive it to be and is influenced by what you read and watch," said Southgate. "We had some guys in from the Marines who had lost limbs. What is the pressure on us?

Southgate has a squad with plenty of youthful enthusiasm, not scarred by previous failures, and one that seems to be growing in confidence.

"We are mates going to play in a World Cup, the highlight of everyone's career," he added.

"It's fantastic."

Spain meanwhile, tore their way through World Cup qualifying, scoring 36 goals while winning nine out of 10 games.

They have also been outstanding in

friendlies, beating Belgium, France, drawing with world champions Germany and smashing Argentina 6-1.

Above all, manager Julen Lopetegui has restored the excitement and joy which typified the teams that won the European Championship in 2008 and 2012, and the World Cup in 2010.

This can be seen in the speed at which they recover the ball and their desire to keep searching for more goals even when the games have been won.

"Most of all I've been impressed by the passion of the players to be a team, their desire to use their individual qualities for the collective good," said Lopetegui.

Only 11 players from the squads that flopped over the last four years have made it into the 23-man group, and linchpin Andres Iniesta will want to finish his international

"He is a player who pushes you to the limit."

Nadal's victory means that the past six Grand Slam titles have been won by either him or Roger Federer, with the next generation of players struggling to break their dominance.

Nadal is only the second player in history to win the same Grand Slam 11 times after Margaret Court, who won 11 Australian Open titles between 1960 and 1973.

The Spaniard had been the hot favourite to win at Roland Garros, after warming up with three clay-court titles in Monte Carlo, Barcelona and Rome.

Against seventh seed Thiem he was at his destructive best. "What you have done - to win this tournament 11 times - is one of the greatest things in sport," Thiem said to Nadal afterwards.




