
A FUNDRAISING campaign launched to help a British grandmother fighting for her life after she collapsed while celebrating her 70th birthday in Mallorca has smashed its target.

Carol Tweedy from Blakelaw, Newcastle upon Tyne fell ill three days after jetting to the island for a week-long break with her family including partner Bryan Harding, electrician son Michael Tweedy and daughter Sarah Burleigh, a schoolteacher.

But she lost consciousness in their hotel lobby on May 29 and was taken to hospital after being given first aid by medics.

Doctors first diagnosed her with pneumonia before she suffered a stroke and bleeding on the brain. She remains in intensive care, but her family are keen to fly her back to Tyneside with her children having stayed by her side since the incident

Family hope Gran could be in UK this week



They told local media their insurance firm Alpha Travel Insurance claimed representatives are checking out Carol's medical records, but no flight home or sum of money has yet been mentioned.

But a Gofundme online campaign set up to help the family raise £15,500 to fly her home on an air ambulance soared past its target within three days.

And if Carol remains stable she could be home by the end of the week.

AUTHORITIES in Palma have banned apartment owners from renting out their flats to tourists, with those caught to face thousands in fines.

The rules, set to come into force as of July, state that only detached houses will be able to be let to holidaymakers. Anyone caught trying to rent out apartments could be fined up to €40,000.

Antoni Noguera, the city's mayor, said the council wanted Palma to stay affordable for residents. "There is nothing worse than having residents who can't live in their city nor afford rents," he said.

A spokesperson for holiday letting firm Airbnb said the decision would be a blow to locals who make money from tourist lets.

AN Irish getaway driver jailed for 22 years over his role in a gangland hit will serve time in one of Spain's most notorious prisons.

James Quinn, 35, received the sentence after being found guilty of taking part in the murder of 34-year-old drug lord Gary Hutch at a gated community in Miraflores, near Fuengirola on the Costa del Sol.

And after 22 months in isolation at Alhaurin de la Torre prison he has now been transferred to the infamous Botafuegos lock-up in Algeciras, Cadiz.

The facility houses some of the country's most dangerous prisoners and has been described as 'dangerously overcrowded,' with more than 1,800 inmates occupying 1,072 cells and workers' unions warning of staff shortages.

It comes after state prosecutors demanded a 25-year prison term for the killing plus three years for an illegal weapons rap.

But judge Ernesto Carlos Manzano ruled in a 15-page document he will instead serve 20 years for the September 2015 execution since he was not the assassin and previously had

a clean record in Spain.

The father-of-one was initially accused of donning a balaclava and lying in wait for more than two hours before shooting the victim 15 times during a chase around a swimming pool, including twice in the head at point-blank range.

The jury forewoman said that while they were unable to con-

clude Quinn was the shooter, a baseball cap with his DNA on it found in a BMW X3 stolen from Mijas and later found torched near Marbella proved him to be a 'necessary participant' in the murder.

And the nine-person jury ruled unanimously that he took part in the brutal attack after Jose Barba, prosecuting, offered a last-minute 'option B' indictment that he could have acted as a lookout and getaway driver.

In his ruling the judge said Quinn must cover the court costs and pay the victim's relatives €90,000 in compensation, describing the murder as "execrable."

He added: "Other circumstances need to be taken into account in terms of the crime and the man convicted of it such as the fact he had no previous convictions in Spain and he has not been convicted as the direct material author of the crime."

Defence lawyer Pedro Apalategui is expected to appeal the sentence after he earlier said: "We completely disagree with the verdict and will definitely be appealing once we know the sentence."

Quinn was arrested in September 2016 when his DNA was found on one of two caps recovered from the burnt out car after undercover detectives snatched a bottle of water he drank from on a high-speed train while he was under surveillance.

He had earlier in the trial broken a two-year silence to insist that he was lying hung-over in bed with a prostitute when the assassination took place.

The brutal hit on September 24, 2015 triggered a feud between rival crime families that has claimed at least 15 lives in Ireland and Spain.

Balcony fall baby death

A BABY has died in Son Espases hospital after following from the balcony of a home in Palma. Emergency services called to the house found the baby seriously injured and doctors were unable to save the child, with initial findings of a probe into the death suggesting it was likely an accident.

Bodies found

THE remains of what were believed to be two squatters have been found in a building in Sa Pobla within less than a month of each other. Forensic specialists with the Guardia Civil have found that the two died of natural causes according to a report based on initial findings.

Kidnap probe

NATIONAL POLICE officers have arrested a 45-year-old man in Manacor in connection with the alleged kidnapping of his one-vear-old son from a nursery. The man has since been charged with child abduction and family mistreatment order over the claims said to have taken place last Friday at 1pm.

Laid to rest

THE funeral of a pilot who died after he and his plane went missing off Mallorca took place last Saturday afternoon in his home town of Moguer in Huelva Province. Antonio Alfaro's body was found alone in the wreckage of his Air Tractor AT-802 plane about 62 metres below the water

Warrant out

PROSECUTORS in the Belgian region of Flanders have confirmed to Spanish media that they have received the arrest warrant for rapper Valtonyc. Josep Miguel Arenas fled Spain following the expiring of a deadline to voluntarily enter prison in May after being convicted of slandering the monarchy and glorifying terror groups.

Trial open

A 33-YEAR-OLD man has appeared along with other defendants before a court in Palma on charges of forcing women into prostitution. The Nigerian national could go to prison for 25 years if found guilty, with him accused of human trafficking, forcing women including those under age into sex work and obstructing justice.

THE state of Spain's beaches in the wake of the annual Noche de San Juan celebrations has sparked outrage.

Green activist group Ecologists In Action spoke out about the 'environmental neglect' in a stinging statement, while Greenpeace called the situation a 'disaster.'

It comes after many local councils reported that more plastic, glass and other rubbish was left behind by revellers than during last year's party.

Taking place on the weekend closest to Midsummer's Eve, the event sees hundreds of thousands of

Spaniards head to the beach, building hogueras, or bonfires, and eating dancing and drinking before the traditional midnight dip in the sea.

But the hordes tend to leave behind tonnes of rubbish, much of which washes into the water before cleaning crews move in the next day.

And after this year's fiesta, 40 tonnes of waste was removed from sandy strips in Malaga City alone, with 15 tonnes in Marbella, 20 tonnes in Barcelona, 19 tonnes in Valencia, 18 tonnes in Elche and more than 12 tonnes in Palma de Mallorca.

THE head of the Consell de Mallorca has put forward a motion to be debated next month declaring United States President Donald Trump unwelcome on the island.

Miquel Ensenyat said Trump represented the "opposite" of what people in Mallorca stood for, citing a previous policy which saw children separated from their parents at the US border.

"Here we are a host land sensitised to the grave situation of immigrants,"

Pulling out the stops

HOTELS and restaurants in Mallorca have begun slashing prices by up to 40 per cent in some cases with profits having taken a hit this year.

The firms, which also include transport companies and others linked with tourism, have reportedly claimed earnings are down in comparison to summer 2017.

Many cited the recovery of rival destinations such as Turkey, Egypt and Greece and the new tourism tax as among the reasons for the fall. Gabriel Llobera, from the Asso-

ciation of Hotel Chains of the Balearic Islands, told Spanish media the eco-tax had also added to the woes of firms

"The situation is very different from the one in 2017, which we can describe as the record year. Business profitability will fall compared to last year, but not as much as hotel occupancy," Llobera said.

'Stolen babies' case

AN 85-year-old doctor has become the first person to stand trial in Spain's decades-old 'stolen babies' scandal.

Gynaecologist Dr Eduardo Vela appeared in a Madrid court over his alleged involvement in a criminal network which is believed to have seen hundreds of thousands of babies taken from their mothers and sold under the regime of dictator Francisco Franco.

He worked at the Spanish capital's San Ramon clinic and is accused of separating Ines Madrigal, 49, from her birth mother in 1969.

She was given to a 46-year-old woman alongside a forged birth certificate, and the doctor faces an 11year jail term for illegal detention, falsifying official documents and certifying a non-existent birth.

Madrigal's adopted parent told her the truth when she turned 18, and the railway employee has since become president of the SOS Stolen Babies Association in Murcia.

Vela had tried to block the start of the hearing until the last moment, citing ill health, but his appeal was overturned by a doctor.

And when quizzed he replied "I don't know, I can't remember," apparently struggling to hear the questions put to him.

He denied handing over the baby and said the

signature on the forged birth certificate was not his despite previously admitting it was.

The practice of baby theft began after the Spanish Civil War ended in 1939 and continued until after the former leader's death in 1975.

Children were taken from families considered to be Republican - those who supported the government overthrown by Franco's Nationalists after a military rebellion - and handed to others supporting the fascists. Single or working class mothers, or women with 'degenerate' political views were the typical victims.

The trafficking remained largely out of the public eye until two men, Antonio Barroso and Juan Luis Moreno, revealed in 2011 how a priest from Zaragoza sold them to their respective fathers.

They formed an association to help victims, who they believes number up to 300,000.

Madrigal had earlier said she does not expect the trial to serve up the answers she has spent three decades searching for, but hopes it will trigger the reopening of thousands of closed cases.

In 2013 Maria Gomez Valbuena, an 87-year-old nun who worked with Vela at the clinic, died just

before she was due to appear in court. The verdict on the Vela trial is expected today (Thursday).

Michael's partner Debra Hodgson, from Wallsend in Newcastle, said: "We just want to say how absolutely blown away and overwhelmed we are by the kindness people have shown - it's really hit our hearts.

"We don't know the people donating but they have been so kind. We just want to say thank you.

"Carol has to be stable for another few days before we can fly her home so, we're just waiting for a further few days for her to hopefully carry on being stable and then we will be able to arrange for her to be flown by air ambulance by the end of the this week.

"We didn't expect to raise so much so quickly, we thought we might raise a couple of grand, if we were lucky, so we were unsure when we get her home.

"But, for this amount to be raised in under three days, is just brilliant and we can start making plans."

Debra explained Michael is likely to fly back with Carol in the ambulance while Bryan and Sarah travel separately on a normal flight.

Spanish doctors reportedly told the family the best thing would be to transfer her to a British hospital where she can be near friends and family.

An official from Emer-

gency Assistance Facilities speaking on behalf of Alpha Travel Insurance earlier said: "We are aware of Mrs Tweedy's admission to a hospital in Spain and understand this is a distressing time for her family.

"This is a complex case and we will not make any decisions that in the opinion of our travel and aviation medical specialists

could add further complications to Mrs Tweedy's recovery or general health.

"We appreciate that Mrs Tweedy's friends and family are keen for her to return to the UK which we will fully support at a time that is medically appropriate. We never put our customers in situations which could lead to unnecessary risk.'

The show is set to begin filming before reaching BBC One in 2019. Casting is yet to be confirmed but it will air in the day time, the broadcaster said.

Dan McGolphin, the corporation's Daytime Programming Controller, said viewers of BBC One and iPlayer were in for a treat.

"I'm delighted to be working on an enjoyable and action-packed series following two very different police officers thrown together in a Mallorcan melting-pot," he said.

Ben Donald, the founder of the company commissioned to make the show Cosmopolitan Pic-

OUR VIEW The die is cast

JUST a few days more than two years after the Brexit Referendum vote was announced, the Queen has given royal assent to the European Union (Withdrawal) Act.

Tory Brexiteers cheered as Speaker of the House John Bercow announced the decision which also allows for EU law to become UK law and which will allow the government to 'dump' any piece of EU legislation that it doesn't want to keep.

If the Referendum split the United Kingdom in mainly geographical sections with much of the South, Northern Ireland and Scotland (plus Gibraltar) wanting to remain in the Union, it also saw a major split within the political parties and also between the Houses of Commons and Lords.

More than 100 hours of debate took place in Parliament and the Lords endeavoured to make 15 changes to the legislation but in the end Prime Minister May managed to ensure that her minority government won the day without any significant defections.

In the weeks leading up to the final decision to transfer the 12,000 EU laws into British Law there has been much external debate about the financial wisdom of gaining 'independence' with both Airbus Industries and BMW indicating that they would be likely to move production outside of the UK if they are not convinced that the agreement with the EU will be beneficial.

The border between Northern Ireland and Eire is still a major bone of contention and should Britain make a 'hard' exit or indeed be unable to agree terms with the EU, the future for those of us living or in business in Spain must be unsure.



One held in death probe







Hero dad saves children Love Island star dies

A BRITISH holidaymaker saved two young children from drowning after he deemed a bungling Spanish lifeguard "too relaxed" to respond in time.

Merseysider Steve Tartt, 32, was enjoying a week in Menorca when a seven-year-old boy and girl, six, got into trouble while playing on a lilo.

The dad-of-two said: "I was putting some suncream on, when I saw a little boy and girl struggling in the water. She was trying to help him and she was going under. Their heads were bobbing up and down, I was looking at the lifeguard who saw it all, but did nothing.

"I hurdled over the front row of chairs, and dived in. It was 2.4 metres deep and the children were at the bottom. I carried them up to the surface, I don't know how I did it, looking back."

Mr Tartt confronted the lifeguard, who was "listening to music," to ask him "what the hell he was doing" before complaining to travel firm TUI, who run the hotel.

He says he has not heard back from the operator but a bottle of sparkling wine was later sent to his room as a thank you.

A TUI official said: "We were sorry to hear about this incident and a full review would always be undertaken in rare situations such as this."

It has since emerged that the lifeguard in question has been sacked.

FORMER Love Island star Sophie Gradon spoke out against internet trolls driving people to suicide weeks before she is believed to have taken her own life.

The 32-year-old was last week found dead at her parents' home in Ponteland, near Newcastle upon Tyne, which she was house-sitting while they were on holiday.

In March, she appeared at a cyber-bullying conference in March where she told onlookers online abuse drove her "into a dark place" after she left the ITV2 reality dating show.

The 2009 Miss Great Britain said that action was needed because "children as young as nine are taking their own lives."

She added: "Online bullying is as destructive as face-to-face bullying, sometimes worse.

"Trolls leave you feeling vulnerable, unsafe and upset. "No one anticipated the

show's success and in an instant I was catapulted from

everyday life into the limelight. We became public property overnight and everyone had an opinion, both good and bad.

"On leaving the show I descended into quite a dark place owing to the amount of negativity focused towards me."

She had been invited to speak at the Leeds event with Love Island co-star Zara Holland, 22, who has also battled depression after her appearance on the show.

Tributes flooded in for Sophie after she was discovered by 'devastated' boyfriend Aaron Armstrong.

Presenter of the show Caroline Flack, currently in Mallorca filming this year's edition, said on spin-off Aftersun: "She was a gorgeous person both inside and out, and everyone's thoughts here at Love Island are with Sophie's friends and family at this really terrible time."

"The airport staff have been really helpful, it's not their fault in the slightest that this has happened."

"I was really surprised as previously there had been no indication that anything was wrong.

"We used the same firm last year and everything ran smoothly so for this to happen is really surprising."

Mum-of-two Katie Weymes, 33, had also been on the island for a family break with husband Peter and sons Dylan, four, and Finlay, two.

She said: "This is the first time we used BOMO and it is frustrating

"We were in the taxi on our way to the airport when we found out they had folded and it does not really help the stress of travelling with two young children.

"In fairness to the airport they have been really helpful and took my husband to pick the car up in a 4x4."

BOMO said in a statement that it had folded after a 'sustained attack online and offline' by an unnamed individual had a 'catastrophic effect.'

It continued: "All vehicle keys have been hand delivered to Bournemouth Airport information desk for customers to collect on their return from holiday."

It comes after vandals last month caused thousands of pounds worth of damage to cars and security cameras parked at the company's premises, with Dorset police probing the incident.

Euro quite quiet Commentary by Moneycorp

THE latter half of June saw trade relationships change and deteriorate dramatically. An intense end to the G7 summit saw little change to the foreign exchange market and even the fervently anticipated summit in Singapore between President Trump and North Korean leader, Kim Jong-Un did little to change the foreign exchange market.

But Trump's announcement that he would be placing 25% tariffs on billions worth of goods from Europe, Canada, Mexico and China, partnered with China's retaliation of 25% tariffs of their own actually saw the American dollar strengthen to an 11-month high, softening the euro, pound and Canadian dollar simultaneously.

The US dollar's strengthening was also bolstered by the US Federal Reserve vote to raise the target for its benchmark interest rate by 0.25% as a result of solid economic expansion and a reduction in unemployment. The ongoing deterioration in US-Canada trade relations saw the Canadian dollar hit a three-month low against the US dollar and continued to feel the strain as the fate of the North American Free Trade Agreement became increasingly uncertain.

The pound was not helped by concerns over votes in parliament over the Brexit Bill. Rebel Conservative party members threatened Theresa May's leadership going forward but were pacified. Backbencher, Dominic Grieve, put forward an amendment that would give parliament the power to seize control of Brexit negotiations should the outcome appear to be a hard-Brexit.

Grieve decided not to vote for his own amendment because of a last-minute government concession to pro-EU backbenchers. The amendment was rejected by a 319 votes to 303, a majority of 16. The pound rallied as a result. This was

bolstered by a Bank of England vote to maintain interest rates at 0.5%. The surprise switch from Haldane to vote to increase rates was seen as a bullish signal and strengthened the pound as a result.

Euro news has been relatively quiet in the penultimate week of June. The ECB's announcement of a definite end date to the QE programme, together with confirmation that no interest rates were scheduled for the near future saw the euro lose ground. The subsequent conferences headed by Mario Draghi was a consistent reminder of the ECB's announcement and did nothing to help the euro recover.

Down under, the Australian dollar fell to a one-year low after the Reserve Bank of Australia appeared to downgrade its outlook for domestic interest rates. The following release of minutes from the policy meeting omitted a key statement saying "members agreed that... the cash rate would be up rather than down."

The exclusion of this information saw a slight strengthening of the Australian dollar, making up some of the huge losses the Aussie has made this year so far. New Zealand's sluggish economic growth resulted in a struggling New Zealand dollar. The annual rate growth dip from 2.9% to 2.7% demonstrated a soft economic expansion and as a result, the currency softened alongside.



THE European Court of Human Rights has dismissed a complaint by Norwegian neo-Nazi terrorist Anders Behring Breivik that his prison conditions were 'inhumane,' as he presently serves a 21-year sentence for the mass murder of 77 people in July 2011.

Intermediary

THE Norwegian government has reaffirmed its commitment to facilitate peace talks between the Philippine government and the National Democratic Front (NDF), days after media in the Philippines reported that Norway would no longer play a role.

"The banana harvest was early due to the weather so production has dropped a month early.

He added: "There are days when there are no Canary Islands bananas and this has translated into stratospheric prices compared to what we're used to.'

Plane talking on new wings

AERONAUTICAL giant Airbus has warned it could pull out of the UK in the wake of Brexit, with Spain one of the candidates being considered to mop up future contracts.

The France-based company said in a statement that current plans for a transition period ending in December 2020 do not offer enough time for it to modify its supply chain.

All wings for the planemaker's passenger jets are currently made in Britain, but the memo explained that there would be 'severe disruption and interruption' in terms of production should

the country leave the European Union (EU) single market and customs union

without any further transition agreed. Chief operating officer of Airbus Commercial Aircraft, Tom Williams, said: "Put simply, a no-deal scenario directly threatens Airbus' future in the UK.

It comes two years after the controversial referendum in which British citizens narrowly voted to leave the EU.

Airbus employs around 14,000 people in the UK, but supports 100,000 jobs in total.

It also confirmed that it is unable to make a decision on new investment in the country until the nature of the Brexit deal becomes clear.

"We have to come to the point where we have to make decisions, quite often those decisions are long term in nature and without clarity then it's too dangerous for us to proceed," Williams continued.

The official added that the firm is already evaluating alternative solutions for building its next generation of wings, with Spain, South Korea and Germany top of the list.

Bank cleared as probe dropped

SPAIN'S National Court has revealed it has called off a probe into banking group Santander over its €1 purchase of former rival Banco Popular.

The judge heading the enquiry said that allegations made against the country's largest bank amounted to 'a list of incriminating statements' with no supporting documentation or other evidence.

Santander had been accused of wrongdoing over the deal, including manipulation of stock markets to trigger a crash in Popular's share price.

SPANISH tourists spend an average of €719 per person on their summer holidays, although one in three families cannot afford to go anywhere and drag the figure down, according to tourism watchdog Observatur.

INVESTIGATORS have seized €8 million in bank notes stuffed into plastic bags and held 13 suspects in Spain, Portugal and Romania in the year's biggest money-laundering case so far.

The money was found hidden in drawers and shoe boxes during a series of raids coordinated by the Guardia Civil, Spanish tax agency and Europol, with evidence of fraudulent bank transfers totalling €31 million also seized.

Those held have been remanded in custody and charged with crimes against the public treasury and consumer market, police said in a statement

The gang reportedly imported fake toys, footwear and clothes from China and used fake companies to avoid paying tax before selling the products cheaper than legitimate firms.

Cash was then funnelled out of Europe a suitcase at a time by Chinese accomplices.

No panic over pensions

SPAIN'S new socialist government has said it has 'no reasons' to believe it will miss its European Union (EU) deficit target, despite pledging to increase spending on pensions.

It comes after the Eurozone's finance ministers discussed Spain's 2018 budget, passed before former Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy was ousted and drafted by his conservative People's Party.

The lawmakers concluded that the country is set to miss its deficit target of 2.2 per cent of GDP by at least half a point.

Spain is the last country remaining under the EU's Excessive Deficit Procedure, which can see nations fined for unsustainable spending, after the action was last week lifted from France.

A little hope

A RECENT study carried out by Cancer Research UK has shown that aspirin can help block tumours from being formed.

The research is published in the journal Nucleic Acids Research, shows that aspirin works to help hinder the development of bowel cancer.

It was previously known that the painkiller reduced the risk of developing colon cancer, but its properties to fight off other tumours wasn't entirely under-

stood before.

This same process is linked to diseases such as Alzheimer's and Parkinson's and so further research could prove invaluable for the future prevention of these diseases.

Cells grown in the lab and on tumour biopsies removed from colon cancer patients were tested to see what effect aspirin had on them.

Scientists involved in the research found that the painkiller impedes a key process in

the formation of tumours.

However, the results were not universal and it was found that not all bowel cancer patients responded to aspirin.

But the hope is that the new research will help to identify those who are most likely to benefit.

But don't start popping aspirin as a preventative measure. The long-term use of this drug is not recommended because of some of its side-effects.

Cancer treatments PET scans

SEVERAL studies have shown the great clinical impact of the PET technique in oncology.

It is a highly tried and tested imaging technique for studying the spread of cancer because it identifies where the disease is located and how widespread it is.

Palm honey is worth a gold medal

SINCE my last missive, we've sung, dressed up, danced traditional dances, eaten and drank too much, and generally enjoyed Canaries Day, as we do every May 30.

It's a celebration of all things Canarian, marking the Canary Island parliament's first session, which was on May 30, 1983, since which time the islands have constituted one of Spain's autonomous regions.

The then Provisional Parliament had to choose a date for Dia de Canarias which: 'Has a historical, but at the same time contemporary, significance, with a future focus'(!) This, understandably, created lots of argument and near fracas for the fledgling parliament. Commemorating the date of the first Canarian Parliament then saved the day. Politicians like a bit of immortality.

Dia de Canarias has become an institution, featuring national dress that's rocketed in popularity over the last 35 years, with each island boasting its own. There are romerias, fiestas, sporting events, concerts, school parties, performances of Canarian legends and history.

To mark the date, worthy Canarians are award-

ed the Canarian Gold Medal. The list of winners is long and dignified, but let's skip to the 'Los Guaraperos de La Gomera, for keeping alive a 500-year-old tradition' award.

These guaraperos (palm sap tappers) climb tall, swaying palms to work with sharp tools at the top. It's risky. The award, sadly, comes too late for father-of -three Jesus, a leading guarapero who was found dead under a palm tree in March.

"On the islands, the indigenous population made honey from palm trees. This liquid looks like cloudy lemon water and has a very agreeable flavour. When concentrated by boiling, it pro-

duces a syrup known as miel de palma (palm honey) used in the confection of desserts and sweets," said A J Benitez in Historia de las Islas Canarias.

When the Spanish arrived in the 15th century, the native populations of all seven islands were tapping guarapo and drinking it, or boiling it down to make palm honey, and had done so for millennia. Since then, the practice has disappeared everywhere but La Gomera.

The guarapero climbs to the top to clean off greenery and expose the crown. He uses a chisel to gradually form a hollow there, inserting a hori-

zontal length of cane to drain the guarapo off into a bucket suspended below. Early next morning, it's collected and filtered. Once a palm's been tapped, the delicate, exposed area needs protecting from sunlight. New fronds quickly sprout. The palm mustn't be tapped again for three or four years. The guarapero's work is sustainable. Palms aren't harmed.

Today, guarapo's poured into stainless steel cauldrons, slowly cooked for several hours and gradually becomes thicker, darker and sweeter. When a thin, continuous string of boiled guarapo falls from a spoon, it's miel de palma and is left to cool before bottling for sale. Try some if you can get it. It's delicious! Congratulations to all Canarian Gold Medal winners, especially Los Guaraperos de La Gomera. Rest in peace Jesus.

I THOUGHT I would share two Chinese recipes this week. I know there are some excellent Chinese restaurants and takeaways in Spain, but these recipes are very easy so you can impress your family and friends with your culinary skills!

Aromatic Crispy Duck

- Serves 4
- 4 whole duck breasts, skin on 1 25 litres of water
- 2 whole chicken stock cubes.
- crumbled
- 250 ml sherry
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 tablespoon ginger powder
- 20 pieces star anise
- 4 whole cloves
- 1 litre of vegetable oil

1. Add all ingredients to a pan except for vegetable oil and bring to boil.

2. Simmer for 90 minutes.

3. Remove duck from pan and dry with kitchen roll, discard all the liquid and spices.

4. Pour oil into wok or pan and heat until it starts bubbling and a cube of bread browns in a few minutes.

5. Place duck in oil and deep fry for

five minutes or until crisp.

6. Remove duck from oil, place on kitchen roll to absorb excess oil. Using two forks shred meat and skin.

7. Serve with hoisin sauce, Chinese pancakes and spring onions, shredded lengthways.

Chicken Fried Rice

Serves 4

100ml vegetable oil 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts, sliced lengthwise about 1cm thick 3 medium sized eggs, lightly beaten

1/2 teaspoon salt 800ml cold cooked white rice 125ml frozen peas, defrosted

Freshly-ground black pepper to taste

2 teaspoons soy sauce

1. Heat the oil in a saucepan or wok. Add the chicken and stir-fry, stirring once or twice, for one to two minutes, or until the meat is almost cooked. Remove the chicken and reserve.

2. Season the eggs with 1/4 teaspoon of the salt. Scramble the eggs for 30 seconds to one minute, then add the rice and peas. Stir-fry for two to three minutes to evenly combine the rice, eggs, and peas and to heat through.

3. Add the chicken, the remaining salt, and the pepper, and stir-fry for 30 seconds. Add the soy sauce and stir-fry for another minute, or until all the ingredients are hot.

Market recovery goes on

THE Spanish property market is well and truly on the road to recovery. And the upswing is backed by a slew of recently-published data.


The Spanish Land Registrars' Association has confirmed prices soared by 9.39 per cent on average in the first quarter of 2018, while the Spanish government's official data shows that valuations shot up by 2.7 per cent.

A March index from the Association of Spanish Notaries increased by 0.4 per cent and April figures from valuations firm Tinsa rose by 5.4 per cent.

And registrars' statistics demonstrate that house prices have climbed by 26 per cent since the low point of December 2014, although they remain 18 per cent down compared to the height of the construction boom in 2007.

The Tinsa data also shows prices in Spain's major cities displayed year-on-year growth of 8.7 per cent, those in the Balearics 5.6 per cent and on the Mediterranean coast 0.3 per cent.

Mark Srucklin of Spanish Property Insight said: "These national indices don't tell us anything about local markets, but they do give us some idea of where we are in the property market cycle. Spanish house prices are back in positive territory,



whichever index you choose."

And holiday homes are also back on the march, with British buyers leading the way as Brexit fears ease.

Speaking exclusively with *Euro Weekly News*, Taylor Wimpey Espana's Sales and Marketing Director Marc Pritchard used the Costa del Sol as an example.

"The Costa del Sol holiday home market has provided scope for cautious optimism over the coming months. Prices there have risen by 9.3 per cent so far in 2018, but there are still good prices to be had compared with 2007, which many buyers find encouraging," he said. "Foreign buyers in the Costa del Sol are currently running at 13.8 per cent, with British buyers being the largest group. Together, Brits account for 15 per cent of total sales at present. While British interest wavered in the immediate aftermath of the Brexit referendum, demand has grown again over the past year."

He added: "Of course nothing is certain in this day and age, but it seems that buyers may have already accounted for Brexit and moved on - in much the same way that the financial markets nowadays often price in expected mergers in advance, so when they actually happen their impact is limited. We anticipate this could be the same with the UK's departure from the EU; essentially, the Costa del Sol won't see much of a change from its current trajectory of increasing sales to British buyers."



Stadler arrested in 'dieselgate' probe

AUDI CEO Rupert Stadler has been arrested in relation to the



emissions cheating scandal. A spokesman for parent

company, Volkswagen confirmed the development and said:

"The hearing to determine whether Mr Stadler will be remanded is ongoing.

"We cannot provide more information about the investigations in progress, and he is still presumed innocent."

The Munich prosecutors said Mr Stadler's arrest was not made at the behest of US authorities.

A judge in Germany has ordered Mr Stadler to be remanded in custody to apparently prevent him from obstructing or hindering the diesel investigation.

Police searched Mr Stadler's home as part of an operation against suspected fraud and impropriety with documents.

A total of 20 people are un-

der suspicion in the probe, which focuses on cars sold in Europe that were believed to be equipped with software which turned emissions controls off during regular driving.

Mr Stadler has been under fire since Audi admitted in November 2015, two months after parent company, Volkswagen, that it also installed illegal 'defeat device' software to cheat US emissions tests.

Volkswagen has pleaded guilty to criminal charges in the US and nine managers, including former CEO Martin Winterkorn, were charged there.

Two managers are serving prison terms. Although Winterkorn and others in Germany are unlikely to be extradited.

Audi had said in a statement that it is 'co-operating with the authorities.'

Hunt for 007's car continues

IT is a mystery worthy of the pen of Ian Fleming himself, featuring a high stakes theft, shady middle men and a 20-year hunt for the bad guys responsible.

When the 1964 Aston Martin DB5 that featured in the James Bond film Goldfinger was stolen from a Florida airport hangar in 1997, there were fears it would never be seen again.

Its location, according to those supplying the information, is classic espionage territory, the Middle East.

Art Recovery International (ARI) which was hired by an unspecified insurance firm to help track down the stolen Aston Martin, has now been told that it is being held at a specific location in the region.

A six figure sum is being offered for information leading to its safe return, but ARI are wary of the possibility that the vehicle is simply one similar to the actual Aston Martin used in the Bond film.

The stolen Aston Martin was one of two used in the filming of Goldfinger, with another deployed for the scenes featuring Connery behind the wheel.

ARI says that some auction houses believe the missing DB5 could now be worth between $\in 8$ and $\in 11.5$ million, given its iconic status as a 007 vehicle.

The DB5 was designed for Aston Martin by the Italian coachbuilder Carrozzeria Touring Superleggera, and named after Sir David Brown, Aston Martin's owner from 1947 to 1972.

GARETH SOUTHGATE is ready to give star striker Harry Kane the chance to pull ahead in the race for the Golden Boot against Belgium tonight (Thursday).

The England manager will make changes to the team who thrashed Panama 6-1 on Sunday, and admitted he would leave out Kane if he felt it would benefit the team.

However, Southgate is mindful of his prolific marksman's ambition to finish as the World Cup's top goalscorer, and is preparing to start Kane in Kaliningrad.



"It is a really complex balance in any business where you are managing people," said Southgate. "I am sure we can get the

selection right." The manager accepts that

captain Kane's poaching prowess offers England the best chance of winning the game, which will decide who finishes top of the group.

The 24-year-old leads the goalscoring charts with five, ahead of Portugal's Cristiano Ronaldo and Belgium's Romelu Lukaku, both on four.

But with Portugal having already played three of their group games and Lukaku set to miss the clash with England due to an ankle injury, Kane has a chance to extend his lead.

His Tottenham team-mate Danny Rose is also set to play, having so far been used for just 20 minutes against Panama.

The fact Kyle Walker and Ruben Loftus-Cheek have picked up yellow cards and risk suspension will also be considered by Southgate.

Kane is already only behind Gary Lineker (10) in terms of World Cup goals for England, and highlighted his ambition to win the Golden Boot before this year's tournament started.

Some have discussed whether England might be better off finishing second, to avoid Brazil or Germany in the next round.

But Southgate dismissed the idea as "dangerous terri-

tory" and said:

Kane to kick off

"I don't know how we would go into a game not wanting to win and not wanting to play well."

There is certainly room to make sensible selection changes, and still field a strong England side.

The squad has plenty of ability that has yet to be used and game time for fringe players could be important as the World Cup progresses.

England's 6-1 demolition of Panama was their biggest win ever at a World Cup, and the clinical finishing on show was a very positive sign.
